Spud Figure Over Nation Shows Gain

The National Aug. 1, potato estimate of production increased from 376,772,000 bushels July 1 to 382,835,000 bushels or approximately 6,000,000 bushels. Practically all of this increase was in Maine where the July 1st estimate was 63,800,000 and the August 1st was 70,325,000. For the state of Oregon this is an increase of 18,000,000 bushels over the 1952 production.

In the Western States Oregon showed an increase of 600,000 bushels over last year but no change from July 1st. Washington increased 1,200,000 bushels from a year ago but only a light increase of 200,000 bushels from the July 1st. Idaho showed no change from under last year. Colorado another state that affects Western potatoes showed a decrease of 3,200,000 from 1952 with no change from the July 1st estimate.

Growing conditions have been particularly favorable in Maine. In the West growing conditions have been reasonably favorable throughout July and August. Potatoes generally are around two weeks behind. Early shipments for Western States are considerably behind shipments of a year ago. Shipments for Aug. 10, showed 89 cars from Idaho, 118 from Oregon, 94 from Washington, 82 from California, 20 from Colorado with a total of 393 cars.

Oregon motor vehicle registrations reached a total of 412,600 during the first six months of this year, a gain of five per cent over the number licensed during the same period a year ago, according to Secretary of State Earl T. Newbery. All counties shared in the increase. Newbery said. Klamath county's vehicle count was 12,061 as compared with 11,484 during the same period in 1952.
