CHILDREN LIKE CHORES WHEN MOM SHARES THE TASKS

Children and chores—both are very much with us in late summer. The novelty of no-school freedom has worn off. Little playmates vanish on vacations. Youngsters restlessly ask what to do with the time on their hands. Meanwhile, Mom is hustling harder than ever to keep up with routine chores and the ripening harvest of vegetables and fruits to be canned and frozen.

Perhaps, suggests a consulting psychologist Peter Siegle, the best way to handle the situation is to put children and chores together.

"You'll be doing the children a favor," he told me. His many community studies have convinced him that children enjoy the responsibility and sense of accomplishment of completing a household chore.

I picked up my ears because Mary has been standing around sucking her thumb lately.

But, I learned, there's a big IF in his suggestion. IF chores are geared to ages and abilities. IF the job can be completed in a short time. IF parents lead by persuasion and cooperation, not dictatorial demands. IF rewards are lavish praise. IF leisure gained is spent in family play. Then the idea works to everybody's advantage.

What chores can a child do? Pre-schoolers have an eagle eye for scraps of paper on the floor. Mary enjoys sorting white from colored clothes and counting out three sheets to a load. A clothesline strung within reach makes

Manipulating hot liquids or sterilizing canning jars is an adult's job, however. Keep up their interest, says Siegle, by telling them the night before of tomorrow's job. When a child can read, write the task on the calendar. Pay off promptly with praise and an occasional special treat, like a trip to the playground or a surprise picnic.
