CHICAGO (U) — Wheat started off with a boom and wound up with a whimper on the board of trade Monday. Early gains ranging to 6 cents were completely wiped out.
Hedging pressure on an increased movement of new spring wheat in the Northwest, plus profit taking on the part of those who had bought during last week's price break, forced wheat down. This outweighed a rush of early buying following farmer approval of marketing quotas.
Other sections of the market also were lower with soybeans showing particular weakness. They never did participate in the early rally and before the day was over had set new seasonal lows. Corn and oats, firm early, quickly retreated under Friday's close.
Wheat closed 2 1/2 cents lower, Sept. 1.58 1/4, Oct. 1.54 1/4, lower, Sept. 1.46 1/4, Oct. 1.42 1/4, lower, Sept. 1.16-1.15 3/4, soybeans 3-3 1/4, lower, Sept. 2.44 1/4, and land unchanged to 17 cents a hundred pounds lower, Sept. 12.00.

Falling Wall Kills Two Men

NEW YORK (U) — An explosion blew down the wall of an officer's home at the Brooklyn Navy Yard last night, killing two men and injuring nine others.
The blast victims included civilian Navy yard firemen and the duty officer who had been summoned to check a short circuit in the frame and mortar house, while looking around they were caught by the explosion.
Dead were two firemen, Francis Conklin, 50, and Frank Licotta, 56. Cmdr. George Greer had called them to investigate faulty wiring in his house. He and his wife and son, George Jr., 19, were standing outside when one side of the building blew up. The Greers escaped serious injury.
The explosion, believed caused by gas that leaked from a water heater, tumbled the wall of a first floor room.
A crane was used to lift the flattened wall off the men, who were rushed to Brooklyn Hospital. None of the injured was reported in critical or serious condition early today.

French Papers Join Strike

PARIS (U) — The French had only a few provincial newspapers and the English-language European edition of the New York Herald Tribune in which to read Monday about the nation's continuing crippling strikes.
Most newspaper workers joined for one day in the walkout in state-run communications and transport fields. Some out-of-town papers published under an agreement with the unions which called for them to lay off Tuesday instead of Monday. The Herald Tribune was exempted from the stoppage.
There was no evidence of a break in the strikes by government workers. Railroads were still practically paralyzed. The postal, telegraph and telephone closure went into its 12th day. Coal mines remained shut.
Premier Joseph Laniel and his top ministers met Sunday to discuss suggestions by Leon Jouhaux, head of the Socialist Trade Unions, for breaking the impasse. Later they handed the labor leader a reply but its nature was not disclosed.
A group of labor chiefs met Sunday night to study the government reply but gave no indication they were about to end the strikes.
Paris bus and subway workers voted today to stay out another 24 hours. Army trucks continued trying to replace the city's usual transportation.

73 More US POWs Freed

PANMUNJOM (U) — The Communists freed 400 Allied war prisoners today—73 of them Americans—and promised their biggest shipment of the Korean POW exchange for tomorrow—450 Allied captives including 75 Americans.
Today's group brought the total of Americans returned to 1,105. Just over one third of the 3,313 the Reds have said they held.
The Reds also freed 75 British, 250 South Koreans, 1 Japanese who had served with U. S. forces as a houseboy, and a Japan-born Korean who said he served with South Korean Army although he was released as a civilian.
The Americans and British jumped quickly for the Red trucks that rolled them down from the Red grouping center at Kaesong. They laughed as they moved into the Allied tents. They appeared in good health.
The sun shone brightly as they stepped into trucks for the ride south to nearby Freedom Village for processing.
A total of 5,177 Allied troops have been freed in 13 days of the exchange. The Reds have said they held 12,763.
As the Allied prisoners were handed over, truckloads of Communist POWs rolled north, singing loudly.
Meanwhile, the POW Command said four ships carrying 2,400 Red prisoners to the port of Inchon from Koje Island were forced back by typhoon winds.
The POW Command said the delivery would not affect Tuesday's delivery but may reduce Wednesday's shipment to 600. The UNC has been sending back about 2,400 Reds at Panmunjom daily.

Capt. Carlsen's Enterprise II Damaged in Port

BOMBAY, India (U) — Capt. Kurt Carlsen, 1952's most famous seafarer nursed another wounded Flying Enterprise Monday. This one, however, was moored alongside a Bombay dock and in no danger of sinking.
The 8,000-ton Flying Enterprise II tangled with the 7,000-ton British freighter Canara as a port tender maneuvered the American ship into another corner of the dock.
The Enterprise's stern was gashed and she got a 10-foot hole above her waterline. Port officials said the Canara was heavily damaged both above and below the waterline on both sides.
Carlsen got his present ship, owned by the Isbrandtsen Co. of New York, after he won world fame by refusing to desert the first Flying Enterprise last year as she lay helpless in the Atlantic after a storm.
The courageous skipper finally was rescued shortly before his ship sank in the English Channel, after being towed almost to safety.

Indian Commissioner Due Next Month

PENDLETON (U) — Glenn L. Emmons, new Commissioner of the Bureau of Indian Affairs, will be in the Pacific Northwest early next month, it was announced here Monday.
Richard Butts, superintendent of the Umatilla Indian Agency, said exact dates of Emmons' visit have not been determined.
Butts said Emmons plans to go first to Portland for meetings with representatives of Oregon Indian tribes and individuals. Emmons next will go to Yakima and Seattle for conferences with Washington tribal representatives.
Butts added that Emmons wants to get on-the-ground opinions from Indians of their problems.

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Elks Lodge Has Picnic

Shade was at a premium at the Malin Park Sunday afternoon when local Elks and their families converged for the Elks' annual picnic.
Free beverages and all the beef and trimmings you could eat were the high lights of the day. Barbecuing of the meat was under the expert direction of Glib Fleet, assisted by Jack Taylor and Bill Carter and others, who did a perfect job at the pits, the beef being not too rare and not too well done, but just right.
Seven halves of beef, 80 gallons of salad and huge quantities of beans were consumed by an estimated 3,000 people. In addition to the food, 145 cases of soda pop and 175 cases of other beverages helped to quench the thirst of the picnickers.
Games for the small fry consisted of races, shoe-throwing contests, straw scramble and other contests—all well attended.
The pool was so crowded that swimming was difficult and should have had a SRO (standing room only) sign nearby. The wading pool for the youngsters was also crowded.

Italy's Cabinet Takes Over

ROME (U) — A new cabinet of Christian Democrats led by Giuseppe Pella was sworn in Monday, giving Italy a breather from political crisis.
President Luigi Einaudi administered the oath of office to the 51-year-old premier, a financial expert, in the presidential office.
Other cabinet members were sworn in in the neighboring hall of the Madonnina.
Missing from the lineup was the dominant figure of postwar Italian politics, eight-time Premier Alcide De Gasperi. Anxious for a rest and also to avoid controversy, he turned down the foreign minister's portfolio in a government which is committed to make only an administrative housecleaning and push no major policy measures.
The new cabinet will go before the Chamber of Deputies Wednesday. It seems certain to win a vote of confidence. The only parties pledged to vote against it are the Communists and Pietro Nenni's party-line Socialists, who between them control only 218 of 500 seats.
Pella's new cabinet is made up of veteran administrators, all members of his own pro-Western and middle-of-the-road Christian Democrat party.
Pella himself is known as a firm friend of the U. S. and a believer in the Atlantic Alliance.

Maudy Wilson's Ankle Fractured

Maudy Wilson is in Klamath Valley Hospital with a fracture of the ankle suffered in a two-car accident Sunday evening about 7 p.m. at the corner of Wentland and Division.
According to nearby residents who saw the accident, one car hit the side of another car in which four teenagers were supposedly riding. The second car was overturned against a telephone pole. Reports are that the youngsters were riding four in the driver's seat and did not have an operator's license.

PARIS (U) — The death of Gen. Andre George Corap, 75, was announced Monday. He was in command of French troops when the German army made their big Western Front breakthrough in 1940.

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Armed Robbery Charge Made

Richard Lewis Bridwell, 23-year-old air corps veteran charged with armed robbery in connection with a Klamath Falls grocery store holdup, waived preliminary hearing when arraigned Monday before District Judge D. E. Van Vactor. Bail was set at \$5000. He was ordered held for the County Grand Jury.
Bridwell was captured by state police 24 hours after he was alleged to have held up Alex Anderson, co-owner of the Unique Market, and fled with \$216 in cash Thursday night.
State police nabbed him as he sat in a cafe at Chemult early Saturday morning. He had \$185 in his possession and a dozen watches and miscellaneous jewelry stolen in a break-in at the Schuss Tavern Wednesday night.
The gunman told arresting officers he hid an automatic pistol, taken in the market burglary, under the seat of an automobile in which he hitched a ride into Chemult.
Bridwell is reported to be on parole from California. Police say he was convicted of robbery in Oakland.

Four Sleeper Fires Reported Controlled

Four small sleeper fires reported this morning by KFPA were said to be under control. The largest, north of Bear Flat and near Tobins Cabin, covered about a half acre before being controlled. It was necessary to send out a pumper to complete the mopping up.
Two small fires in King's Cabin area were out and a small blaze near the California state line on Grizzly Mountain was under control.
Two fires on Pelican Butte, one location so inaccessible as to require jumpers to reach it, were reported by the local U. S. Forest Service. Two parashooters were sent in from Medford yesterday and quickly extinguished the small blaze, while the other Butte fire was being mopped up today by a four-man fire crew from the Seven Mile Guard Station.
