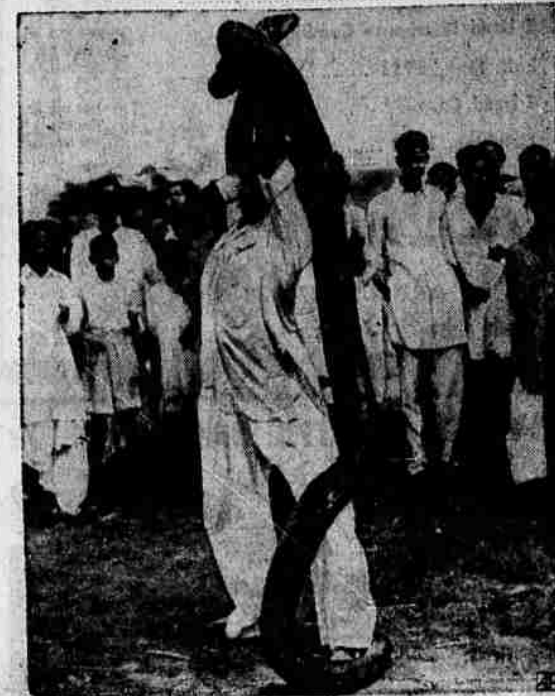

Plumbers Protest Home Repair Jobs

Klamath Falls City Council Monday night heard a group of irate plumbers protest recent repair jobs which are not in compliance with request of the plumbing inspector or city and state codes.

Herb Waits, spokesman for the plumbers' Joint Industry Board, described a remodeling job at 1209 1/2 and 1209 1/2 Pine as being against a city ordinance. Owners of the property are J. B. LaClair, 3239 Summers Lane, a supervisor in the Klamath school system.

Waits said the Plumbing Inspector Jack Dyer visited the work at the time plumbing was being installed; he observed work was evidently being done by a local man on an overtime basis, not as a member of a contracting firm. "But," said Waits, "the owner has taken out no permit where one is called for."

"Contrary to the plumbing inspector's request, the owner or those on the job covered up at least a part of that job, although red tags had been placed on it indicating it was not up to code," Waits charged.

The spokesman said that Monday, the owner called a master plumber in town to correct the work with one provision—the present plumbing inspector would not be allowed to inspect the work when it was completed.

Dyer verified Waits' charges. It was the request of the joint industry board that the mayor and Council heard only one plumber's bid for the job: Bobco Paving Company bid \$818.60 for the work. Completion date is Sept. 15.

Dyer reminded Council that violators of the ordinance are subject to not less than \$5 and not more than \$100 fine; not less than 5 or not more than 30 days imprisonment in the City Jail, or both.

Gun Sneaked Through Jail Shake-Down

Sheriff Murray Britton revealed Tuesday that Richard Lewis Bridwell, 23-year-old air force veteran, held for a Klamath Falls grocery store holdup, smuggled an unloaded automatic pistol into the County Jail.

The sheriff said the weapon was discovered when the accused robber was transferred from one cell to another.

"Two state policemen, one deputy sheriff and a jailer all searched the man before he was locked up," Sheriff Britton explained. "He succeeded in concealing the automatic French pistol up his belt. When he was moved from the first floor to the second of the jail, the gun was found in a bunk."

Britton said he has issued orders that from now on all male prisoners taken to the County Jail must be stripped and searched before they are locked up.

When asked by a deputy sheriff why he smuggled the gun into the jail, Bridwell said:

"You ought to be able to figure that one out."

At the time of his arrest, Bridwell declared the gun, stolen from Schuss Tavern and used in holding up Alex Anderson, co-owner of the Unique Market, had been hidden by him under the seat of an automobile in which he hitchhiked a ride into Chemult.

The accused robber was taken to the office of Deputy District Attorney Joe Thalhofer Tuesday for further questioning.

Thalhofer said Bridwell admitted he was an escapee from a prison farm, Santa Rita in Alameda, Calif. Bridwell, according to the district attorney, said he walked away from the prison farm with another prisoner, Daniel Braxton. He said before leaving they stole a gun from the prison farm office.

"We split up in Redding," Bridwell declared. "Braxton took the gun with him."

Thalhofer said Bridwell was serving one-year at the prison farm for robbery in Oakland.

The suspect said he came to Klamath Falls on August 10. On last Wednesday night he declared he hid in Schuss Tavern at closing time. Later he left the place with the stolen gun and jewelry valued at \$1,000. The following night he held up the Unique Market and escaped with \$218 in cash. Most of the loot was in his possession when apprehended.

Saturday morning Bridwell was arrested in a Chemult cafe by state policemen. He is held in lieu of \$5,000 bond.

Briton Freed By Communists

VIENNA (AP) — Edgar Sanders, British businessman released from a Hungarian jail, was believed to have arrived at the Hungarian side of the Austro-Hungarian frontier today.

A British Embassy car arrived at the frontier town of Nickelsdorf a few minutes before then and left for the no man's land between the two countries.

Andrew Stark, first secretary of the British Embassy in Vienna, and Maj. John White, the embassy's public safety officer, said they believed that Sanders already was on the other side of the frontier.

The Hungarians said last earlier that he would be released across the border at noon.

The Hungarian Foreign Office announced last night that the government had pardoned the 44-year-old Briton, who was convicted of espionage and sabotage along with American Robert Vogel, and expelled him from Hungary.

The Hungarians also said last night they had pardoned and expelled an Italian subject, Vincenzo Sciutto. He had been sentenced to four years in prison for espionage in 1951, a communique said. The communique did not disclose details of the charges against him.

Sanders, cousin of film star George Sanders and accountant for the Budapest subsidiary of the International Telephone and Telegraph Co., and Vogel, East European representative of ITT, were arrested in November 1949 and sentenced after trial the following February.

Malin Teacher 30 Years in Same Building

MALIN—Thirty years is a long stretch to teach boys and girls in one school building but that is the enviable record that Andrew E. "Andy" Street, principal of the Malin high school, can hold up to Malin high school graduates who waver between a career in the classroom and other ways of making their bread and butter.

Learning Gray Statue Irks GAR Women

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich. (AP) — The Champlin Women's Relief Corps No. 41 of the Grand Army of the Republic had city officials pretty embarrassed today.

Lone Bank Robber Gets \$165,000

FLORAL PARK, N. Y. (AP) — A daring gunman grabbed a branch bank manager on the lawn of his Long Island home Tuesday morning and used him as a shield to get into the bank and steal more than \$165,000.

The bank manager was taken along in his own car as a hostage and dumped out a few miles away in a residential section of Queens. His car was found abandoned nearby.

The manager, Eric Gronwall, 44, said the husky, dark-haired young gunman may have gotten away with as much as \$200,000 from the bank vault and teller's cages.

The exact amount will not be known until a tally is completed of remaining funds in the bank, a branch of the Franklin National Bank.

Gronwall told police that as he was leaving his Bellemere home a man stepped out of the bushes.

He had a gun, and a canvas bag. Jamming the gun into Gronwall's side, he warned him not to cry out, adding, "We know all about you and the bank."

They got into Gronwall's car and drove to the bank. Gronwall became aware another car was following, but the gunman said sternly, "don't you dare turn around."

The gunman, about 35, chatted as they drove along, said he had been in the Army and before that had worked in a bank, but didn't say where.

He had planned while he was in the Army to rob another bank, he said, but when he got out found it had closed.

Arriving at the Franklin branch in Floral Park, a prosperous Long Island community, the gunman marched Gronwall into the bank, forced him to open the vault and, after taking the money, marched him back to his car again.

They drove to Bellemere, Queens. Gronwall was told to get out. He never got a good look at the man in the other car, he said.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Edward M. Rothchild refused Tuesday to say whether he is a member of the Communist Party or whether he ever stole secret documents from the Government Printing Office.

Rothchild, a bookbinding machine operator at the government printing plant, said the Senate investigating subcommittee he declined to answer on the ground that he might incriminate himself.

Chairman McCarthy (R-Wis.) told the slightly built, bushy-haired witness that the charges made against him in secret testimony before the subcommittee are perhaps "the most serious charges ever made against any government official."

Within an hour after the hearing, McCarthy announced he had been advised that the printing office had suspended Rothchild.

"We have testimony to the effect that you stole secret documents from the Government Printing Office—among other things that you stole a secret code," the Wisconsin lawmaker said.

Both Rothchild and his wife, Esther, were named as Communists by witnesses who testified before the Senate group Monday.

With a shake of his head, Rothchild declined McCarthy's invitation to comment on the charges.

Then, in a ready voice, he parried all questions about his associations, alleged Communist connections and other activities with the repeated statement:

"Under the fifth amendment I refuse to answer that question."

McCarthy has declared there is every indication the printing office has had an "extremely slipshod" security set up in the past.

The inquiry is aimed to determine whether secret information has leaked from the plant which handles many confidential government documents.

Rothchild declined among other things to say whether he knew one of his printing office co-workers, James P. Phillips, who testified Monday he knew Rothchild to be a Communist in the late 1930s.

More than that, Rothchild refused even to say whether he works at the printing office.

Russia Asks Neutrals In

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — Russia proposed Tuesday that the Korean peace conference be made up of five so-called neutrals and six of the countries which fought in Korea. This challenged the U. S. concept of the conference.

The United States insists that the conference be limited to countries which actually fought in the conflict, with Russia a possible exception. The U. S. position is that Russia can take part—if the Chinese Reds and North Koreans want them.

The Soviet proposal called for participation of the United States, Britain, France, Russia, Red China, India, Poland, Sweden, Burma, North Korea and South Korea.

Before this proposal was made Russia suffered an expected setback. Soviet Delegate Andrei Y. Vishinsky rose at the opening of the U. N. Assembly's 60-nation Political Committee session with a demand that Red China and North Korea be invited to take part in the committee debate. The committee voted him down, 24-14 on China and 34-18 on North Korea.

10-Year Marriage Of Parents Of Five Annulled

BALTIMORE (AP) — The 10-year marriage of the parents of five children has been annulled.

The marriage of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Robbins of Baltimore was annulled yesterday on grounds Mrs. Robbins was not divorced at the time she married her second husband.

Judge S. Ralph Warnken awarded custody of the three boys, 3, 4 and 8 years old, to the father. Custody of the two girls, 1 and 7, went to the mother.

The husband sought the annulment. To protect the five children, Judge Warnken declared them to be legitimate.

Riots Feared By Laniel; Tension High

PARIS (AP) — Defiant union leaders Tuesday ignored Premier Joseph Laniel's threats of tougher action to end France's crippling strikes and continued their nationwide walkout. As tensions mounted, the government moved about 500 parachute troops into Paris to cope with possible violence.

In a surprise broadcast to the nation Monday night, Laniel made an impassioned plea to the workers to go back to their jobs. A critical paralysis of nationally operated industries and public services went into its second week.

The Premier told union leaders he would negotiate with them no more unless there was a return to work Tuesday, and implied tougher action—possibly use of the army—to break the strikes.

The threat brought quick defiance from some union organizations, and as the morning wore on there was no move to return to work.

Although three companies of parachute troops were brought into the city to bolster the capital's police, a government source denied reports that tanks had been rushed into the city. He pointed out that there are always tanks in the Paris area, where a number of army barracks are located.

Authoritative sources, meanwhile, said France's National Assembly almost certainly will be called back from its summer holiday for emergency sessions to deal with the strike situation and other grave problems facing the country.

The Assembly steering committee is to meet Friday, and all indications were that it would reconvene the Assembly, which normally doesn't start sessions until mid-October.

In calling for an end to the walkout, Laniel declared:

"The government has heretofore definitely fixed its line of conduct. There will be no more talks with those who do not return to work today."

"There will be nothing more left but a vast national effort directed toward the necessity of assuring the country's essential services—no matter what the cost."

Another threat to Laniel's strike-best Cabinet developed with a summons by National Assembly President Edouard Herriot for the Assembly steering committee to meet Friday to decide whether the lawmakers should be recalled from vacation for a special session.

The wave of walkouts began in protest against government decrees to standardize and in many cases raise retirement ages of government workers and to cut surplus employees off public payrolls.

Rhee To Give US Two Bear Cubs

WASHINGTON (AP) — Syngman Rhee, 78-year-old President of South Korea, is making a gift to the children of the United States—two bear cubs.

The cubs, caught by soldiers of the Korean 1st Army Corps and kept as pets on the presidential grounds at Seoul, are to go to the Washington Zoo.

Rhee offered the cubs, on behalf of the children of Korea, during the recent visit to Seoul of Secretary of State Dulles, a State Department spokesman said. The Air Force would fly them here.

Red POW's Squawk: Bath, Haircut

PANMUNJOM (AP) — A top Red Cross official from a neutral nation today described Communist prisoners of war as "ridiculous statements by silly boys."

He gave this example by one Chinese POW:

"He talked impassionately for an hour and it added up to the fact that he had been forced to take a bath."

"Then they cut his hair — and with scissors."

Foreign Minister Fatemi warned Iraq in a note last night that playing host to the Shah might cause trouble between the two countries.

"The Iraqi government is expected to take sufficient care to avoid any kind of unexpected political incident between two friendly and neighboring countries," the note declared.

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Mossadegh's Arrests Go On

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) — Premier Mohammed Mossadegh's triumphant government continued to round up today a number of suspects in Sunday's attempted coup.

From a hill hideout the fugitive Shah's appointee as premier, Maj. Gen. Fazlollah Zahedi, defiantly called on Army officers to lay down their lives for the monarchy.
