Copco To Link Sam's Neck

MACDOEL—The California Oregon Power Company is making plans for a power line to the Sam's Neck area as the next step in its expansion in Butte Valley. Members and guests of the Butte Valley Farm Center learned Tuesday night at the regular meeting at the Macdoel school house.

J. T. Runyan, assistant Copco manager at Klamath Falls, told the group that estimates so far show the cost of power service to Sam's Neck to be about \$1195 for each of the 18 prospective users. Runyan emphasized that the plans are still in the preliminary stages and the cost figures may change.

Power to the Red Rock district may depend on the outcome of the irrigation well now being drilled on the L. D. Parson's ranch; he said. If the well proves to have a good volume, other bores may be sunk by other ranchers and then the power demand could be enough to warrant building a Red Rock line.

Runyan said the power demand in the Sheezy creek district is too

small yet to make a line feasible there.

Runyan was introduced by S. L. Ritchey, Klamath Falls Copco manager.

Sheriff Al Cottar of Yreka told the group that in law enforcement he believed an ounce of prevention was worth a pound of cure. He declared the mere presence of an officer in an area helped to deter crime and that it is actually cheaper to pay wages to officers than to hold men in jail. The sheriff declared himself opposed to any county budget cuts

that would force him to remove his deputies from Tulelake and Happy Camp.

Cottar listed 10 points for citizens to follow in aiding law officers and stated that his office exists to help the public.

With Deputy Sheriff John Smoot, he showed a film on juvenile delinquency. Farm Center Chairman William Clement reported that the spray rig given to the Center by the county, was missing and asked members to try to find it. The group voted that in the fu-

ture the rig will be housed at Ellen Cordis' Macdoel garage. Cordis will maintain the rig. A fee of \$1 daily will be charged to its use, with the ranchers being responsible for any breakage.

Members voted to underwrite Mrs. Vena Gilmer's project of supplying the national postmasters' convention at San Francisco in Oc-

tober with some 2500 souvenir bags of Butte Valley potatoes. Mrs. Gilmer will furnish the apuds, each to be placed in a small net bag with a tag or label extolling their virtues. The members agreed to furnish the bags and labels.

Mrs. Gilmer is on the souvenir committee for the convention.

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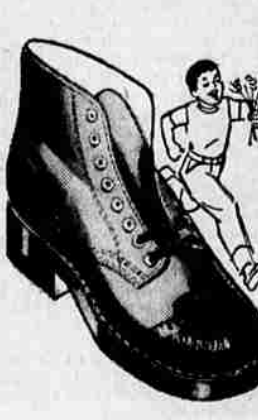
