

State To Act Against ROTC Withdrawal At Two Schools

SALISBURY (AP)—The State emergency board, scheduled to meet here next Monday, will be asked to act to prevent withdrawal of ROTC units from the University of Oregon and Oregon State College.

Sen. Douglas Hits 83rd's Failures

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Douglas (D-Ill.) today criticized the first session of the 83rd Congress for failing "to act on a number of issues of central importance to labor and the American people."

Douglas, a member of the Senate Labor Committee, termed "desirable and long overdue" a series of possible changes in the Taft-Hartley law listed by the White House for consideration. The list went to chairmen of the House and Senate Labor committees three days before Congress adjourned on Aug. 3, but ensuing protests forced its withdrawal, reportedly for good.

The proposals, the substance of which became public, were said by the White House to be only a working paper of possible changes in the law.

Naguib Off To Mecca

CAIRO, Egypt (AP)—President Mohammed Naguib put on the traditional white robes of a Moslem pilgrim today. Then he took a modern airplane for the holy city of Mecca and important political conferences in Saudi Arabia.

After completing the pilgrimage to Mecca, holiest of the Moslem shrines, the Egyptian soldier-chief of state will meet Saudi Arabia's King Ibn Saud at Taif, near Mecca, on Saturday.

They are expected to confer with Pakistan's Governor General Ghulam Mohammed, also to be a guest in Saudi Arabia, on problems of the three Moslem countries.

Mexicans Attack Missionary

TOLUCA, Mexico (AP)—Officials reported today that an angry mob attacked a Protestant missionary in nearby San Francisco Tepexucua and fired on a Protestant church in which he took refuge for four hours.

The missionary was identified as Felipe Vasquez Aguirre. Police finally drove off his assailants. Officials said they did not know what touched off the attack by the residents of the strongly Catholic town 50 miles southwest of Mexico City.

Oregon and Oregon State College as threatened by the army, Gov. Paul L. Patterson said Monday. The Army's threat was contained in a letter to Rep. Walter Norblad which was made public Saturday. The threat was based upon failure of the two institutions to provide a bond to protect the government against loss of equipment in the training of the future officers.

Cost of the required bond is estimated at only \$3,500 but no provision was made in the budgets of these institutions for such an expenditure.

"There is no possibility that the state will allow the ROTC units to be withdrawn from the two institutions," Patterson said. "We will take whatever steps are required at the proper time, but certainly we will explore every avenue before we agree to pay out state money to an insurance company for a bond."

The Governor said this matter had been under consideration prior to the meeting of the last Legislature so that it is nothing new. The Ways and Means Committee had refused to provide money for the bonds on the ground that the state is as responsible as any bonding company.

In discussing the situation Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton pointed out that the state constitution prohibits incurring any debt in excess of \$50,000 except with specific approval of the voters. Equipment provided by the Army at the two institutions is understood to be valued at approximately \$600,000.

Two More Oregonians Listed as POW Dead

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Defense Department Monday identified 207 additional Americans reported by the Communists to have died in enemy prison camps.

With Monday's list, the Pentagon has made public the names of 795 of the 1,022 U.S. servicemen said by the enemy to have died in Communist hands.

The families of all Americans on lists supplied by the Reds have been told the information given them can not be verified and that the men are still officially listed as missing in action.

Price Attacks Timber Bill

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Price (D-Ill.) Monday attacked a timber bill, which almost came to a vote in the House this year, as a "thinly disguised raid on the national forests."

The measure, sponsored by Rep. Ellsworth (R-Ore.), was held up at Ellsworth's request on July 30 after the House Rules Committee had cleared it for a vote.

Price made his attack in the congressional record Monday, calling the measure a "special interest bill to benefit the big timber operators."

The bill would provide that when the government acquires a tract of forest land being operated on a sustained yield basis, the owner should have the privilege of claiming an equally valuable area of government timber land as compensation.

Price was one of a group of House members who fought the bill in the Rules Committee and promised to fight it on the floor of the House.

In Monday's statement Price asserted the measure was spearheaded in Washington by the National Assn. of Lumber Manufacturers with backing of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. He continued:

"It would authorize and direct a federal agency acquiring private timber lands, in cases where those private timber lands are alleged to be under sustained yield management, to give the owner in exchange other timber lands from federal holdings."

"The bill is obviously aimed primarily at the national forests, be-

cause that is where most of the valuable timber now in federal ownership is located. Under the present form of the bill, the timberland might come from a national park of wildlife refuge. But primarily its a grab at the national forests, which are owned by the people of America."

Price asserted "there is nothing in this bill to protect the thousands of little sawmills and little loggers who are dependent for their living on timber sales from the national forest. There is nothing in this bill to protect the communities that are dependent upon the sus-

tained yield management of the national forest—the regular cutting of mature timber growth from the national forest."

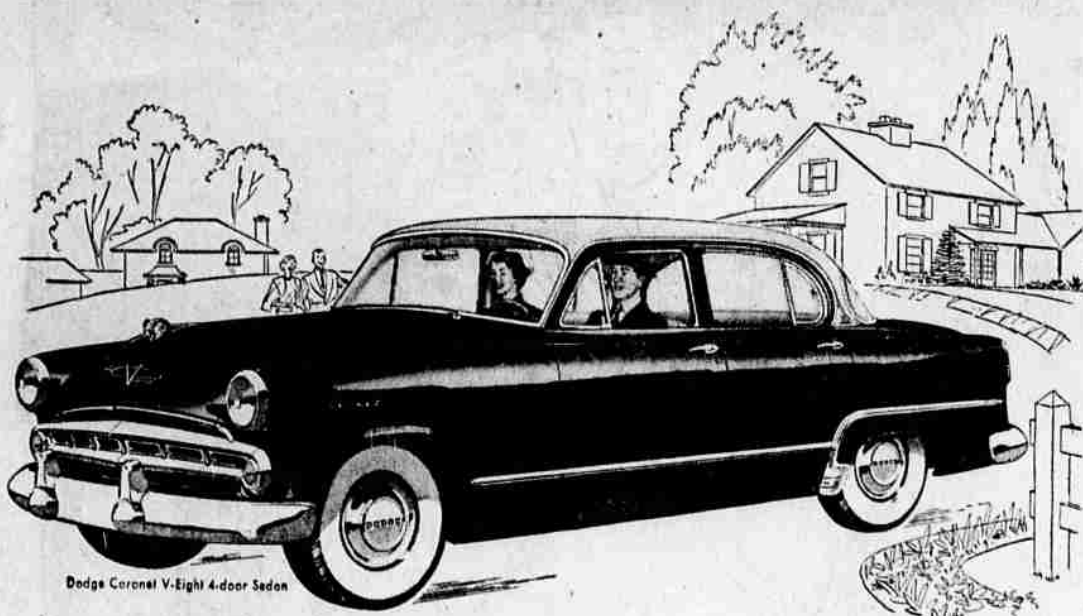
