Laniel Cabinet Begins Tottering

PARIS (AP)—France's most serious postwar strike entered its second week today with a million workers still out, railroads and communications still paralyzed and Premier Joseph Laniel's government tottering.

Negotiations between the government and non-Communist unions broke down Monday and there was no prospect of a resumption in sight.

Socialist party leader Guy Mollet told Laniel that any savings he might realize through his touted government financial reforms—which touched off the walkouts—already have been surpassed by the huge losses to the French economy from the strike.

Nobody contradicted Mollet. It was expected Parliament would be called back from its vacation for a special session next week. Laniel may be thrown out of office in the bitter squabble certain to develop.

These still were the main strike areas:

1. The railroads—Only a handful of trains operating, industry and trade hard hit, and hundreds of thousands of Frenchmen unable to travel.
2. Post offices and telephone exchanges—Millions of letters piled up, many businesses slowed to a standstill. Frenchmen reduced to putting personal notices in newspapers to communicate with their stranded families.
3. Coal mines, building and textile trades, some metal working factories, the Paris subway and bus system, and streetcleaning services.

Garbage continued to pile up in many cities.

The walkout began as a protest against government plans to cut public payrolls and up retirement ages. Now the unions are pressing for all kinds of general wage and bonus rises as well.

Laniel's financial plans, which he said also would be aimed later at the tax-eating rich, appeared definitely wrecked.

Fake Perfume Making Still

MIDDLETOWN, N. J. (AP)—A still for making fake perfume for use in bottles with the counterfeit labels of several of the leading perfumeries of the world was uncovered yesterday by federal agents.

The raid was carried out by Special Investigator Joseph E. Lannon of the Alcohol and Tobacco Tax Unit of the Internal Revenue Bureau and Inspector John J. Hannon of the Food and Drug Control Administration.

Lannon said that in addition to a 15-gallon still they also seized a large quantity of perfume bottles, some filled and some empty but all carrying the counterfeit labels of expensive perfumes.

Lannon said also the counterfeit perfumes had been sold in New York, Washington, Cleveland, Detroit, Chicago, Fort Lauderdale, Fla., and Havana, Cuba, "for as much as \$10 an ounce."

A federal warrant was sworn out after the raid against Robert Goldman, 52, last reported in Detroit. The warrant charged Goldman with operation of an unregistered still.

Lannon said alcohol was mixed with colorings and extracts and run through the still to produce the fake essences.

Ashland Residents Reject Twin Plunges

ASHLAND (AP)—Ashland voters Tuesday decisively defeated a ballot proposal to purchase the Twin Plunges swimming pool for municipal operation. The vote was 1,486 against and 150 for.

The special election was initiated by Owen Gragg, owner of the pool. When the city council refused to consider the purchase last spring, Gragg circulated petitions and obtained 600 signatures, forcing the special election.

Purchase price of the pools and bathhouse facilities was \$55,000.

NOTHING ON FIRE

No news was good news this morning when KPFA and the U.S. Forest Service stated all fires were cleaned up and no new ones reported. Humidity is fairly high and this condition sometimes brings on more electrical disturbances, according to Hal Ogil.

Accused Malin Knifer Charged

John F. Thomas, 26, accused of stabbing a Malin bartender, was ordered held for the County Grand Jury Wednesday by District Judge D. E. Van Vactor. He is charged with assault armed with a deadly weapon.

The victim, Howard D. Butman, who incurred several serious stab wounds, described the fracas to the court.

Under questioning by Deputy District Attorney Joe Thalhofer, Butman declared that Thomas came into the Malin bar, ordered a drink and refused to pay for it.

"Then he ordered a drink for the house," the bartender declared. "I told him to get out. He said he'd like to see me put him out. I did. When we got outside he pulled a knife and stabbed me in the back."

Thomas was represented by Attorney Donald A. W. Piper. The defendant is held under \$2000 bond.

Idaho's Fire Under Control

THE BIGGEST forest fire of the summer in North Idaho—1,500 acres of grass and timber 50 miles south of Grangeville—was reported under control Wednesday.

But the 500 fire fighters who checked the blaze in the Nespeper National Forest were kept on the scene as a thunderstorm with new danger was building up.

Meanwhile, nearly 500 other men were battling forest fires in other parts of Idaho.

The Nespeper fire was brought under control early Wednesday. A morning wind blew it across a fire line into another 18 acres of grass but the new outbreak was quickly checked.

Crews feared that the thunderstorm might bring down drafts that could spread the flames again. Little or no rain was expected. There was a chance lightning strikes might cause new fires.

Foreign Divorce Papers Served

Sheriff Murray Britton said Wednesday that he had served divorce papers from New Zealand on Edward E. McWilliams, forestry service worker at Sprague River.

The action, according to the sheriff, was brought in the Supreme Court of New Zealand, Canterbury District, Christchurch Registry, by Anna McWilliams, who said she married the defendant on May 4, 1943. At that time, the information states, McWilliams was a member of the United States Marine Corps stationed in New Zealand.

Mrs. McWilliams says a daughter Angela Gail McWilliams, was born on Dec. 7, 1943.

Sheriff Britton reported that McWilliams is married again.

Now Ungagged Bradley Says of Arms Cutback: 'Coasting Before You Reach Top of The Hill'

WASHINGTON (AP)—Gen. Omar Bradley says he is fearful lest this year's slash in the military budget grow into "a habit as tempting as the habit of dollar extravagance."

Bradley, five-star general who stepped out four days ago after two 2-year terms as chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, said of the Eisenhower administration's decision to cut more than five billion dollars from the Defense Department budget.

"At first glance this looked to me like coasting before you reach the top of the hill. Personally, I would be inclined to keep the pressure on—until we reach a higher level of readiness and security."

These statements, in an article written for the Saturday Evening Post and made public last night, were Bradley's first direct criticism of the new defense budget. During hearings while Congress was considering the matter, he limited himself generally to state-

9 Months For Taking Old Shaver

Jimmy Garrison, 47-year-old ex-prizefighter, humiliated, who says he made \$200,000 in the squared circle, ruefully admitted Wednesday in the County Jail that he couldn't make crime pay off.

Garrison, who battled such stellar pugilists as Henry Armstrong, was sentenced to 9 months at hard labor at Rocky Butte Jail in Multnomah County when he was found guilty of petty larceny in District

Judge D. E. Van Vactor's court Tuesday afternoon.

He was convicted of stealing a used electric razor from Weisfeld's Jewelry Store.

After he hung up his gloves, Garrison established a long criminal record. In 1933 he was sentenced to 25 years in prison for kidnaping in Sacramento, Calif.

"That was a bum rap," he declared. "Some nutty dame got me in a jam."

While discussing a checkered career, Garrison put on a boxing exhibition in the courtroom.

"I feel as good as dead," he declared. "I made a comeback and 204 fights. My last big fight was in Cleveland when Henry Armstrong kayeod me in the seventh."

Garrison was arrested last week after he was reported to have taken a used electric razor from a washroom in the Weisfeld jewelry store.

"That's a bum rap, too," he commented.

Tom Connelly Snorts Disapproval Democrats' Bragging of Supporting Ike

WASHINGTON (AP)—Tom Connelly, a gray-haired political warrior who has retired to the sidelines, but the fiery Texan is snorting his disapproval these days over the conduct of some of his fellow Democrats.

Retirement has dulled neither the mind nor the tongue that kept him in Congress for almost 36 years and made him an international figure. He is observing his 76th birthday today and has this to say about his party:

"The Democrats can overdo this business of bragging about their support of President Eisenhower. That sort of thing may be no help in the years to come."

"Besides, they should make it clear they will vote for a program on its merits alone—not whether Eisenhower is for or against it. Most things the Democrats have supported were programs which were initiated by the Democrats in the first place. They've just been voting for what they believed in all the time."

Connelly made the statement as

he sat on the pleasant tree-shaded porch of the home here where he lives with his wife and his memories of the years when he was an actor in history-making events.

Speaking of Eisenhower, he said: "I think Ike's capital stock is his personal popularity as a war hero. I think his popularity is still holding—maybe not as strong as it was, but it's still there. And there's no doubt the Democrats in Congress have helped him with their support on several measures."

"I think he's shown very clearly that he has an extremely conservative viewpoint. Many of his important appointments have gone to men with no practical experience in government or politics—though they may have had experience in big business and monopolies."

"If this trend continues, it's going to hurt him. People don't want a big business to dominate us."

During the years he was chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, Connelly was a strong advocate of a bipartisan foreign policy. But he said too often bipartisanship runs amok of partisan interests.

He added: "Bipartisanship depends a great deal, too, on whether the majority party really wants a bipartisan policy."

Connelly is spending part of each day dredging up old memories and putting them down for a book he is writing—a book that will span his 36 years in Congress. It is scheduled for publication next spring.

He is up at 8 a.m. daily and works on his book until noon. Then he takes things easy or visits with old friends to argue politics.

"I didn't have a real vacation for 36 years," he said, "so I'm taking my rest now."

"I get a little restless at times having nothing to do. But the book takes up a good deal of my time and I'm enjoying this vacation."

Although Connelly was a commanding figure on the Senate floor for years, he hasn't been back since he stepped into retirement.

"I'm through with politics," he said. "I think 36 years in the House and Senate were enough for one man."

IWA Rejects No-Hike Offer Of 10 Oregon, Calif. Firms

A proposal by 10 Oregon and California lumber producers that existing contracts be extended to the 1954 or 1955 anniversary dates without change as to wage rates was rejected here late Tuesday by representatives of the International Woodworkers of America, CIO, the Pine Industrial Relations Committee Inc., after a conference. The session was attended by officials of the 10 companies involved and representatives of Klamath Basin District Council and the California District Council of the IWA. The union wants a 8-cent hourly increase.

The lumber operators offering the rejected proposals were Brooks-Scanlon Inc., Bend; Ochoco Lumber Co., Prineville; Red Blanka Lumber Co., Prospect; Eagle Point; American River Pine Co., Forest Hills; High Sierra Pine Mills Inc., Twin and Oroville; Redding Pine Mills Inc., Anderson and Cottonwood; Sacramento Box & Lumber Co., Woodland; Setzer Forest Products (wood operation only) Greenville; Ralph L. Smith Lumber Co., Anderson; Tarter, Webster and Johnson, Inc., Delleker, Calif.

Irving said after the operators' offer was rejected, it was indicated that the union would again approach individual employers. The union representatives were advised that the employer negotiating committee probably would be meeting with local unions.

Following the conference, Irving issued the following statement:

"The employers' committee reaffirmed the position it has consistently taken during five and a half months of negotiations. Already increased labor and supply costs combined with lower sales realizations and increasing inventory makes a cost increase unwise if we are to afford employment."

"The situation has been aggravated in the last few weeks by dropping prices and disappearing order file. This is evidenced by many operations going on curtailed production schedules. The employer offer to extend contracts at present wage rates is risky. It does provide for employers—as well as the unions—an opportunity to discuss wages again upon 60 days' written notice."

The IWA has already struck the American River Pine Co., Ralph L. Smith Lumber Co., and Tarter, Webster & Johnson Inc., plants.

Slower Drinking, Hence Better Indians Foreseen

PORTLAND (AP)—William H. Baillie, administrator of the Oregon Liquor Commission, said Tuesday he believes the state will control liquor sales on Indian reservations.

He based his opinion on a bill signed by President Eisenhower Tuesday which permits the sale of liquor on reservations at local option.

Baillie said the commission probably will have less trouble now that Indians are permitted to buy liquor.

"Under old laws, the Indian would get someone else to buy liquor for him and then drink it quickly to hide it," he said.

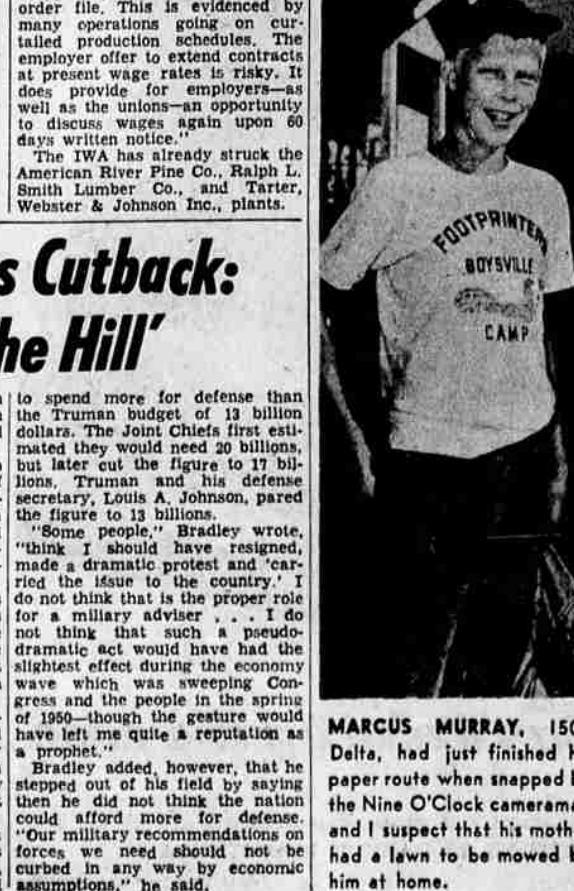

Mossadegh Flees; Shah Asked Back

LONDON (AP)—Tehran radio declared that royalists wrested away control of the Iranian government from Premier Mohammed Mossadegh Wednesday, sent him into flight, and summoned the Shah to return to his throne at once.

A proclamation was read repeatedly over the radio, monitored here, proclaiming Maj. Gen. Feroz Zadeh the new Premier and promising Iranians a new eight-point program of social reform.

Cable reports from the Iranian capital were shut off, or badly delayed, and there was no immediate confirmation of the dramatic radio report, which said Mossadegh's foreign minister, Morteza Fattahi, had been "torn to pieces," presumably by a mob.

The latest cable from Donald B. Schwind, the Associated Press correspondent in Tehran, was filed at 1:10 p.m. Tehran time (2:10 a.m. PST) while the radio broadcast was at 7:38 a.m. Schwind's message said a royalist uprising in the army and police had flared and that there were pitched battles in the center of the city.

"The first determined efforts of police and troops loyal to Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi to capture central police headquarters was beaten off by a hail of shots," the dispatch said. "Hundreds of shots were fired over the heads of demonstrating mobs in Sepah Square."

"Pro-Shah mobs burned at least eight buildings in the center of the city before the demonstrations crystallized into armed attacks by loyalist police and troops on key positions, such as the foreign ministry."

U.S. Embassy reports to the State Department in Washington told of royalist elements driving through Tehran with auto headlights ablaze in celebration of victory. But, these reports said, the aged Premier's residence and the office of the chief of staff were still in the hands of "pro-Mossadegh forces—meaning that resistance still remained alive."

A State Department spokesman said it was impossible yet to form a conclusion as to the outcome. One of the buildings reported burned in these diplomatic reports was the Shadi Theater, frequented by members of the Tudeh (Communist) Party, and a Russian shop in Tehran was reported attacked by mobs.

Dispatches filed earlier from Tehran Wednesday morning told of mob violence and police gunfire in the capital.

But these accounts said the disorders were caused by police efforts to halt nationalist supporters of Mossadegh and Communists from continuing frenzied demonstrations against the Shah.

Iran's handsome 33-year-old ruler fled from the country with his beautiful queen, Soraya, last Sunday when Mossadegh's forces crushed an attempt to oust the old premier and install the Shah's choice—a pro-Western general, Feroz Zadeh. The Shah and queen arrived in Rome Tuesday.

The report from Tehran Wednesday said Zadeh had been installed as the new Premier.

Hawk-nosed, weedy old Mossadegh rode to power in April 1951 on his powerful nationalist demands for government seizure of the vast 30-million-ton a year oil industry from the British, who had controlled the country's life blood for half a century.

His refusal to compromise in his program nationalizing the 1 1/2 billion dollar Anglo-Iranian Oil Co. shut off the flow of oil to the West and caused a bitter break in diplomatic relations between Iran and Britain.

The Shah and his queen were eating lunch at their Rome hotel when they heard the report of the overthrow. Excitedly, the Shah said he was eager to return to his country.

The man who read the invitation to the Shah over Tehran radio said:

"At this time the people have been able to capture the capital. We are eagerly waiting for your return."

A woman's voice called on the Iranian people "to prove that foreigners cannot capture the country," and added:

"Iranians love the Shah. Mossadegh is sending your country to the government of the hammer and sickle."

Mossadegh has kept a vice-like grip on Iran for more than two years. He has repeatedly crushed opposition to his regime, whether it has come from parliamentary rivals, religious leaders or the palace.

The latest revolutionary bid may yet turn out to be a shrewd move because the nationalist-minded Mossadegh still commands tremendous support in the bazaars and in the slums of Iran's sprawling, teeming cities.

Shah Willing To Return

ROME (AP)—The Shah of Iran said Wednesday he would return to his country immediately if reports of the overthrow of the Mossadegh government prove true.

The Shah was eating in his hotel dining room when Tehran radio reports were brought to him.

The 33-year-old Shah jumped up excitedly, bit a cigaret nervously, and said:

"Please let us know more. I want confirmation. I want to fly back immediately."
