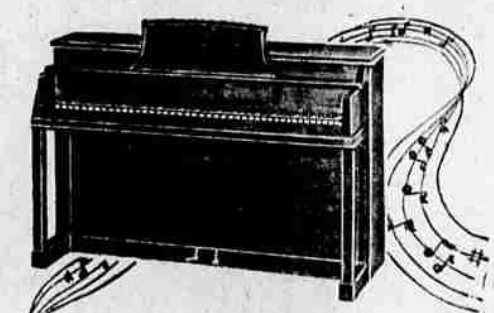
K. F. Couple Married In Reno
