Mrs. Dale West, from the hostess club, Lost River, was program chairman for the day.

The morning session began with invocation and devotion by Mrs. Joe Schuh, Mrs. M. A. Bowman, president of the hostess club at Merrill, gave the welcome.

Mrs. Wanda Edmonds gave a con-

sage demonstration in the Recreation Hall. Corsages were on display following.

Club presidents gave their reports. Mrs. Will Wood, state yearbook chairman, presented the gavel for the best yearbook. Mrs. Rajanus, president of the winning Malin club, accepted.

Merrill Moose Get Award

Navy Band Here Oct. 24

Klamath Falls will have its first opportunity to get on the navy band wagon when the Famous United States Navy Band will be presented in concert here October 24 at the Pelican Court, Klamath Union High School. The band is conducted by Lieut. Com. Charles Brandler.

Sponsored by KUH's for the benefit of the high school band, the navy band has long been acclaimed "the world's finest."

The band has a history dating back to 1925 when an Act of Congress made it the official U.S. Navy Band, and it has played its way into the hearts of millions since. In 1938, when Martin Van Buren was president, the pay table of the navy registered and recorded the first Navy band to be compensated for its efforts. This small beginning marked the first of many bands organized throughout the navy during the years preceding World War I. In the Washington Navy Yard a group of 21 musicians had endeavored themselves to official Washington, and this group was recognized as the foremost band of the navy. By 1923 it had swelled its ranks to 63 artists.

On his inauguration day, March 4, 1925, President Calvin Coolidge signed a special act of the 68th Congress, which designated this band as the official U.S. Navy Band.

In the fall of 1925 the band left on its first annual tour, authorized by Congress and approved by the President, to bring to all America, as well as official Washington, its fine music. Its tours are now broken into two annual tours, each of around 35 dates, one in the spring and one in the fall, to different sections of the U.S.

Masonry Authority To Be Here Sept. 28

Frederick M. Hunter, one-time chancellor of University of Oregon, educator, world traveler and author of many books on Freemasonry, will be the guest speaker at a meeting of Southern Oregon Masonic lodges here on September 28. Hunter, who has made a hobby of the history of the Masonic order, will speak on the "History of Freemasonry."

The Klamath Falls lodge will be host at the big dinner which is expected to draw members from all over the southern part of the state.

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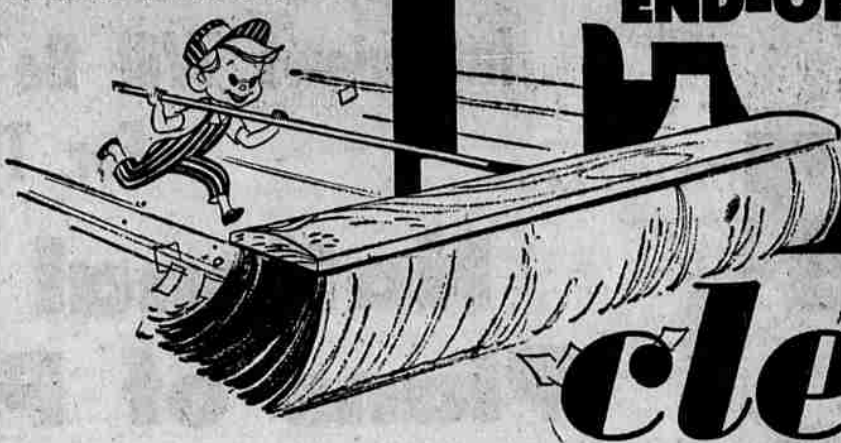
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
