Are you old enough to remember the days when in touchy situations such as the present one in Korea the British fleet would peer in its appearance at some spot in the world where trouble was possibly brewing?

That was usually enough to fix things up without any shooting. Those were wonderful days. They were days when there was responsible leadership in the world. When there was a balance of POWER in the world.

It was Britain's responsibility then. It's OUR responsibility now. That is a sobering thought. The consciousness of responsibility is always a sobering thought.

But enough of grave situations. Ex-Queen Maryam of Egypt is suing Ex-King Farouk for the tidy sum of 4000 pounds (\$11,530) a month in alimony. She hasn't been divorced. She wants money enough to live on in the style to which she has become accustomed.

Who says nobody loves a fat man? If she requires \$11,000 a month to compensate her for the loss of Farouk, she must love him a lot.

Second thought: Maybe it's his money she loves.

Karl Ritter, a glittering figure of the gay nineties and the even rarer early 1900's, died today in Bad Homburg, in Germany, near Frankfurt.

Ritter's fabulous hotel in Bad Homburg was a favorite rendezvous around the turn of the century for the royalty of Europe and for European bluebloods generally. Edward VII of England, whose reign is known as the Edwardian era, loved Ritter's hotel when he was Prince of Wales, and it was at Bad Homburg that he designed and introduced the Homburg hat. Bad Homburg ("Bad" is German for "bath") has its history, you see.

That was back in the days when the appearance of the British fleet at some troubled spot in the world was enough to quiet the disturbance and restore tranquility.

It was also back in the days when the royalty and the nobility of Europe ate good food and drank good wines until their eyes bugged out and they could no longer get into their clothes. When that time came, they went to one of these spas and boiled themselves out in the hot springs until they could again get their belts buckled around their middles.

They went back to their accustomed way of life and did it all over again.

The world has changed. I wouldn't know whether or not it has changed for the better.

Adenauer Has Truman Train, 2 Mercedes Besides

BONN, Germany (AP)—West Germany's tough old Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, fighting for reelection at 77, is making his political opponents squirm with some campaign methods borrowed from the United States.

Taking a leaf from American presidential candidates, the Chancellor is crisscrossing the nation on a "whistle-stop" tour to let millions of German voters see and hear him.

His traveling in a bright red special train replete with all the trimmings of a U. S. presidential special—press agents, harried advisers, a radio telephone, bodyguards, teletype printers and a separate car for reporters.

So far, Adenauer has covered 3,384 miles. He is going 3,000 more before the election on Sept. 6.

This doesn't count side trips by car. In a baggage car, the Chancellor carries two black Mercedes limousines. He roars off in these on frequent side jaunts.

Lawyer Suggests Fund To Pay Off Cheated Clients

Livestock Show Climaxes Tonight

The Klamath County Fairgrounds is a beehive of business today as the 18th annual FFA and 4-H Junior Livestock Show moves into the final round of activities to be climaxed tonight by the big outdoor barbecue and the auction that will put many hundreds of dollars into the jeans of young exhibitors.

Judging of sheep and hogs has been completed and sometime this afternoon Harry Lindgren, Livestock Specialist, Oregon State College, who has put the stamp of approval on many a grand champion fat animal, will tag a blue ribbon on the grand champion steer of the show.

The 1952 winner, 9-year-old Smokey Pritchett, Fort Klamath, was the youngest exhibitor to ever win a grand championship in the local show. Smokey was a 4-H Club member. Bill Serruys paid \$150 per pound for the 988-pound animal—\$1462—then returned it to the ring for resale for the benefit of the Shrine Crippled Children's Hospital in Portland.

Auctioneer Charles K. Wiese, Tulalake, drummed up \$38,477.69 in last year's show, and Rotary sponsors are hoping to top that total tonight when more animals than went over the block last year will enter the sales ring.

Five halves of beef were covered in the barbecue pit at 2 a.m. this morning and the menu will follow the usual pattern of beans, baked potatoes, relishes, cheese, coffee, soft drinks and ice cream.

Young exhibitors will be served promptly at 4:30 p.m. followed by Rotarians and their wives, stock buyers and their wives, families of exhibitors, invited guests and long-time supporters of the show. Committees expect to serve 1800 persons.

The grand entry and awarding of prizes will continue during the adult dinner hour.

Animals will begin entering the sales arena promptly at 6:30 p.m. Lee McMillen will serve as chairman of the sales clerk, assisted by Bob Chilcote and Harold Ashley.

Lloyd Prock, chairman of the sales detail, will be assisted by the ring by Nelson Reed, Andy Collier, Bill Huggins, Red Bussman, Dick Hensel, C. A. Henderson, Frank Tarr, Tom Watters, Bert Hall, Delos Mills, Hank Semon and Ed Geary.

Reclamation Changes Made

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of the Interior McKay Tuesday abolished one of the three posts of assistant commissioner in the Reclamation Bureau.

He wiped out the job held by Kenneth Markwell, assistant commissioner in charge of design and construction.

McKay also reduced Goodrich W. Lineweaver from assistant commissioner in charge of programs and finance to the status of an assistant to the commissioner. The change reduces Lineweaver's civil service rating and means a pay cut from \$13,000 a year to about \$11,800.

The secretary's action leaves Harvey F. McPhail as the only remaining assistant commissioner of the three who hold the offices when the Eisenhower Administration came into power. McPhail is from Santa Barbara, Calif., and has been with the bureau since 1919.

Markwell, of Oklahoma City, had been an assistant commissioner since 1944, and Lineweaver, of Harrisonburg, Va., since 1950.

Reclamation Commissioner Wilbur A. Drexler said McKay's changes are effective Oct. 1.

A new assistant commissioner to succeed Lineweaver will be named, but Drexler said no choice for the post has yet been made.

Lineweaver's principal duties in his new job as assistant to the commissioner will be to advise on legislative and finance matters.

Drexler said Markwell had told him he wants to stay in the bureau but that no job has yet been found for him.

Drexler added that Markwell has civil service status and veteran's rights should he decide to try to "bump" some one from another job in the bureau.

Plumbing Rift to City Council

Retention Of Housing Asked

Fifty delegates from the Naval Housing Unit asked City Council last night to see what it could do about keeping the housing open a while longer, or as long as needed.

Doyle Edwards, 1608 Halsey, spokesman for the group, told Council members that there were 125 to 135 families who would be evicted by January 1 under the present arrangement. Edwards pointed out that many landlords in Klamath Falls were charging prices the families could not afford to pay. Their attitude in part is "take it or leave it—if they close the housing unit you'll have to take it," he said.

Mayor Paul Landry assured the delegation that Council was aware of the problem.

"We are studying the problem," he said. "I am leaving Tuesday night for San Francisco to discuss the situation with federal authorities."

Landry reminded the citizens that the housing was temporary and was built to last six years.

"There is not too much life expectancy left," he commented. "But," he reminded them, "the City of Klamath Falls is a government and fundamentally it is not in the housing business."

The housing delegates had plenty of verbal support at the meeting. Dick Gallagher of local VFW Post 8 assured Council that the local post would do all they could to help keep the housing unit operating.

Mayor Landry asked Gallagher if he would keep that stand if it came to finances. Gallagher replied: "I personally would do all I could. Our job is to help the veteran and most of these men are vets."

Fire Truck To Be Fixed

Russell Avery, airport manager, got Council's authorization last night to get a mechanic from Portland to come down and fix the airport's fire truck in working order for an emergency.

Mayor Paul Landry agreed that, since the airport was depending on the equipment, it should be reliable.

Street Paving Gets Go-Ahead

Citizens of the 1200 block of California Avenue got the go-ahead signal at Council last night for the proposed paving project.

Most of the home owners concerned have agreed to put up money for the project. The area not taken care of by this will be financed with money from the State and tax fund since it is a thoroughfare, according to "Tex" Thomas, city engineer. The money will be replaced in the fund when the lots are sold.

The proposed paving will extend from Upham to Delta on California Ave.

Householder Hits Charges

J. V. (Joe) LaClair appeared at the City Council meeting last night to answer charges made by Herb Waits and others regarding certain plumbing conditions in Klamath Falls.

At the Aug. 17 Council meeting, Herb Waits, as spokesman for the plumbers' Joint Industry Board, described a remodeling job at 1208 1/2 and 1209 1/2 Pine as being against a city ordinance. The property is owned by J. V. LaClair.

Waits, supported by Jack Dyer, plumbing inspector, said the work was being done by a local man on an overtime basis, that there was no plumbing permit for the job, that the job was not up to city and state plumbing codes, and that the owner had covered up at least part of the job contrary to the inspector's request.

The plumber also testified that fixtures were improperly vented and the sewer lines were improperly installed.

Last night LaClair, a supervisor in the Klamath school system, assured the group that he believes all the plumbing laws should be strictly enforced and that plumbing should follow the code strictly. He said he would be willing to pay a fine or go to jail, but so far no one had told him what was wrong.

Without calling names, LaClair lashed out for "presuming the work was done by a local man on an overtime basis and not knowing."

LaClair said, "It was done by a local man—it was done by me."

LaClair denied Dyer's charge that he had sworn, and said he had three witnesses to prove it.

Referring to the Plumbing Inspector as a "wild man," LaClair said he ordered that man off the property, "but," said LaClair, "he didn't tell me he was the plumbing inspector."

The school official called Dyer "an absolute dictator," and he said, "there isn't a thing you can do about it."

LaClair charged Dyer with delivering what he termed a "snack attack" through newspaper and radio. "Since then," LaClair told the Council, "I have had 143 calls and letters from people who don't believe so much power should be in a man's hands with the title he has."

Dyer repeated his charges, but LaClair answered, "Everything he is saying is a lie!"

Mayor Paul Landry got into the verbal hassle then and asked Dyer if he showed people what was wrong on a job and how they could correct it. Dyer finally answered, "I do, but I didn't want it to get out or I'll have the master plumbers down my neck."

To this Landry replied, "You are not working for the Master Plumbers; you are working for the City of Klamath Falls." He added, "Your criticism should be constructive. You should be able to tell them what is wrong and tell them."

Henry Perkins, city attorney, stated that as the present ordinance is worded, LaClair is in compliance as regards permits. Apparently the ordinance is improperly drawn since it requires a man purchase a license before he obtains a permit; but an owner may do his own work without a license.

Perkins said an owner should get a plumbing permit as well as a building permit.

On a motion by Councilman Frank Tarr the problem was referred to the Council for further study and a decision.

Identified As Harry Joslin; Face Bruised

Foul play was suspected today in the death of a Weyerhaeuser timber mill worker, whose body was found floating in D irrigation canal on the northern outskirts of Malin.

The victim was tentatively identified as Harry Porter Joslin, 46, Sprague River. A driver's license was found in the clothing. He was wearing a pair of blue bib overalls and a cap commonly used by railroad engineers.

The body was discovered floating in the canal by Fred J. Walters, ditch-rider for the Bureau of Reclamation shortly before 6 a.m. today. Half an hour later, the corpse was pulled from the water by Sheriff Murray Britton, Deputy Dal Reed and Deputy County Coroner Bill Mills.

According to Sheriff Britton there were bruises on the man's face which could have resulted from a beating. He added that the bruises also could have resulted from scraping on the sides or bottom of the canal.

Dr. George H. Adler, county coroner, announced that he would make a post mortem examination of the body Tuesday afternoon. It was taken to the Ward's Funeral Home.

"We are investigating the possibility of foul play," Sheriff Britton said. "But it is more likely that the victim fell into the canal. We are trying to locate friends of the man. We do not know what he was doing in the vicinity of Malin. He could have fallen into the canal at some other point and the body floated to the place where it was found."

Britton said he was informed that Joslin had been employed recently at the Weyerhaeuser mill as a knot bumper. He also was reported to be a native of Milwaukee, Wis. Besides a driver's license, two dollars in small change was found in the clothing.

Italy's Admitted Do-Nothing Rate Seated Firmly

ROME (AP)—Italy took a vacation from political crisis today with its new government firmly—but temporarily—backed by both houses of Parliament. The regime is pledged to do nothing about such controversial questions as European unity, the European army and land redistribution.

Premier Giuseppe Pella, a Christian Democrat financial expert and a steady friend of the West, won a confidence vote in the Chamber of Deputies last night by 100 votes.

Previously he had won a decisive victory in the Senate.

With this hurdle safely passed, the 51-year-old Pella went to work to give Italy what he described as a "business" government, and the Chamber of Deputies began a month's vacation.

For the rest of the summer, at any rate, it appeared the nation might enjoy a semblance of political calm.
