

End Appears In Sight For Russell-Hughes Association

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—The long and fabulous association of Jane Russell and Howard Hughes is due to end in December and the chances are it won't be renewed.

"We've been talking," said the brunette beauty, "so far they made an offer, which we thought was fantastic. Then we made an offer, which they thought was fantastic. Now we're both simmering and nothing's happening."

Jane has spent 12 years under exclusive contract to the Texas millionaire. She's now of a mind not to sign all her services away to him.

"I'd like a one-picture-a-year deal," she said. "That would be enough to give me security. But I could also do some of the exciting things that have been offered me."

Security appears to be important to her. Even though she can draw \$200,000 per picture on loanous now, she is concerned about how she will fare on her own. "No, I have no regrets about having been under contract to him this long. You can't beat the old man when it comes to publicity. He can take somebody and keep them alive five years, even though they never make a picture. I know, because it happened to me."

WASHINGTON (AP)—Lt. Gen. John E. Dahlquist was named yesterday to be chief of Army field forces, with headquarters at Ft. Monroe, Va. He has held the post on an acting basis since June 30.

In other shifts announced by the Army:

Maj. Gen. Floyd L. Parks, Army chief of information since 1946 with one brief interruption, will take command of the 2nd Army at Ft. Meade, Md.

Lt. Gen. I. D. White, former commander of the 10th Corps in Korea, will take command of the 4th Army at Ft. Sam Houston, Tex.

Parks will be succeeded as chief of Army information by Maj. Gen. Gilman G. Mudgett, now deputy chief of staff of the Far East Command.

Soldier Listened To Red Lectures Out Of Curiosity

NEW YORK (AP)—An American soldier, who said he voluntarily attended Communist lectures in a North Korean prison camp, said Monday he was not a Communist and "I never will be."

Cpl. Harold M. Dunn, 23, of Baldwinsville, N.Y., said his fellow prisoners used to curse him for attending the lectures.

I wanted to get the other side of the picture—wanted to hear what they had to say," the tall youth explained as he arrived here by plane among the first group of prisoners freed by the armistice.

"Now I know, it isn't so good," he continued. "Since my return, I found out that they did quite a bit of lying. I know some people are saying things about me, but I know what I was doing. I'm not worried about it. I knew nothing of politics, one side or the other."

He said he realized "what I was risking, but we have freedom of thought in America and I intended to use it."

He said that at first prisoners were forced to study Communist doctrines and he resented this.

"I didn't go for that, I don't like force," he said.

When the lectures became voluntary, Dunn said he went to them.

About six months before his release, he said, the abuse from his fellow prisoners stopped and now he has "quite a few good buddies" among the men who wouldn't listen to the Communist line.

Freed Vogeler Sues Employer

NEW YORK (AP)—Robert Vogeler is suing his former employers, the International Telephone and Telegraph Co., for a half million dollars. An official of the firm says he is at a loss to explain why the one-time prisoner of Hungarian Communists brought the suit.

Vogeler, who spent 17 months in charge as an executive of I.T. and T. during that period and left the firm the first of the year.

Jacob Rosenberg, attorney for Vogeler, said he had filed papers and served a summons in the suit against I.T. and T. and a subsidiary, the International Standard Electrical Corp.

Rosenberg said he had not yet filed a complaint and declined to disclose details of the suit. He said only that it dealt with the period of Vogeler's imprisonment and was not a salary matter.

A.M. McClennan, assistant vice president of the company, said he knew of nothing in Vogeler's relations with the firm to "justify a suit."
