STOCKS

WALL STREET

NEW YORK (U)—The stock market was lower Tuesday, but a recovery movement erased a great part of the extreme loss. Losses seldom went past a point. At one time early in the day minus signs of major fractions to between 1 and 2 points were frequent throughout the list. Trading was heavy at an estimated 1,800,000 shares, the busiest day since early in June. Monday's total was 1,320,000 shares. The market started lower and continued to slip until early afternoon. Most of the selling was centered in the railroads, as it was Monday. When the recovery movement got underway, the railroads began to post plus signs almost immediately, and all sections of the market marched along the recovery trail.

City On TV Hearing List

WASHINGTON (U)—Two Washington and two Oregon cities were included Monday on a Federal Communications Commission priority list for future hearings on competing television applications. The priority list for group A shows Salem as No. 24, Klamath Falls as 65 and Wenatchee as 70, out of the 73 total. Seattle is ranked No. 5 on a group B list. However, the listings carry one major loophole, right off the bat. Rival applicants from some cities far down in the new list already have received written notices that their applications will be heard. Officials said such hearings would come up first—ahead of cases in higher priority cities that haven't received any notifications. The FCC actually left the door wide open to deal with the contests in any order it desires. None of the Pacific Northwest cities was listed as having received hearing notices which would set any of them ahead of the spots on the priority.

'I Can't Hear You, I Won't Pay It' Says He

DETROIT (U)—A wealthy Detroit beggar turned a deaf ear on most of his arraignment Tuesday before recorder's Judge W. McKay Skillman—what he heard, he didn't like. The beggar, arrested at a downtown corner, had \$337 in cash in his pockets and a bankbook showing a balance of \$4,700. "Where did you get the money?" the judge asked. "I'm deaf, I can't hear you," the beggar responded. "Where did you get the money," the judge shouted. "I can't hear you," the beggar repeated. "I'll fine you \$150," Judge Skillman muttered. "I won't pay it," the beggar shouted. Judge Skillman sentenced the panhandler to a 90 day term.

Anti-Icebox Law Drafted By City

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich. (U)—The City Commission is drafting an ordinance to prohibit the abandonment of intact ice boxes. The commission is acting on a housewife's letter complaining over a recent nationwide wave of children suffocating in abandoned ice boxes and refrigerators. The ordinance would prohibit anyone from leaving hinges on doors of unused ice boxes and similar appliances.

TERRORISTS SENTENCED

SARAFAND ARMY BASE, Israel (U)—An Israeli special military court sentenced 13 persons, including two young girls, to prison Tuesday after convicting them on charges of committing terrorist acts. The court mentioned two incidents with international repercussions—the hurling of a hand grenade at the Czechoslovak legation in Tel Aviv last December, which caused no damage or injuries, and the earlier burning of a Soviet legation car.

Grains

CHICAGO (U)—Grains moved ahead several cents in another brisk trading session on the board of trade Tuesday.

Wheat was aided by continued relatively light receipts of new crop spring wheat in northwestern markets, plus moderate export business.

New crop corn contracts provided an exceptional strong spot. Prospects of continued dry weather in the corn belt over the next five days stimulated demand.

Lard ran into considerable profit taking after its spectacular advance of the past few weeks. Wheat closed 2 to 3 cents higher, September 1.88 1/4-1/2; corn 1 1/2-1 1/4; oats 1 1/2-1 1/4; soybeans 1 1/4 to 4 cents higher, September 22.54 1/4-1/2, and lard 2 1/2 to 62 cents a hundred pounds lower, September 45.55.

CHICAGO LIVESTOCK

CHICAGO (U)—An overrun of hogs, matching Monday's highest numbers of the month, forced prices another 50 to 75 cents lower Tuesday. Cattle ranged from weak on some lower grades and classes to 50 cents and occasionally \$1.00 higher on better steers. Sheep were mostly steady to weak.

Most butcher weights of hogs sold from \$22.50 to the top of \$25.50, while most sows brought \$19.50 to \$23.25. A few sows were worth as much as \$23.50.

Good to prime steers generally broadened their range to \$19.50 to \$23.00 with several loads extending to the top of \$23.00. Good to prime heifers were \$18.00 to \$22.75, cows topped at \$13.00, bulls at \$15.50 and prime vealers at \$22.00.

Good to prime native spring lambs sold from \$21.00 to \$23.50. Receipts were 9,000 hogs, 8,500 cattle and 2,000 sheep.

Greenland Votes For First Time

COPENHAGEN (U)—The people of Greenland, Denmark's huge Arctic colony, voted Tuesday for the first time in their history.

About 9,000 voters are to pick two members of Denmark's first unicameral parliament, provided for in the new constitution adopted last May. Seven out of eight candidates are native Greenlanders. The eighth is a Danish woman doctor.

Because of the long distances and slow communications, it may be a week before all returns are in. General elections for the new parliament are to take place in Denmark next month.

Non-Stop Flight Of B36s Arrives

TOKYO (U)—A flight of B36 heavy bombers landed at an American base here today after a nonstop trip from bases in the United States. The flight was made with "maximum security" in force.

The number of the monster bombers was not disclosed.

The planes landed at Yokota air base used during the Korean War by B29s bombing Communist targets. The B29s were moved out yesterday to Okinawa to make room.

Special guards were ordered for the field. Restrictions protecting details of the arrival of the B36s even included bans on telephone calls.

The bombers had taken off Sunday. Even their points of departure were kept secret. A B36 can fly at least 10,000 miles.

In Washington, the Air Force had said only that the flight was a training mission.

The intercontinental bombers, built to carry the atomic weapon, were making their first visit to Japan.

U. S. Against Morocco Action

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (U)—The United States will oppose an Asian-Arab demand for consideration of the Moroccan situation by the U. N. Security Council, a spokesman said Tuesday.

This virtually dooms the proposal to defeat Britain and France already are known to be against consideration of the question and one or two other members are expected to vote in the negative or abstain. Seven affirmative votes are required to put the question on the 11-nation council's agenda.

The council meets Wednesday afternoon.

The Asian-Arab bloc sought unsuccessfully in 1951 to bring the issue before the Security Council. On that occasion, the United States abstained and the question failed to get the required seven votes.

The Asians and Arabs blamed the United States for their failure.

OKLAHOMA CITY (U)—The Oklahoma City school board has found another way to make going to school almost painless for protesting youngsters.

The board voted to use a giant circus-type tent as an assembly hall for the 500 students at the new U. S. Grant School.

The new building is still under construction.

Scooter Driver Wins Over Trucker

OKLAHOMA CITY (U)—A truck loaded with eight tons of stone collided with a small motor scooter yesterday.

The truck driver suffered a mashed foot.

The motor scooter driver was not hurt.

Mamie Having 'Wonderful' Rest In Old Home Town

DENVER (U)—Mamie Eisenhower is having "a wonderful rest" here in her home town, an old friend reports, but Denver is seeing very little of the First Lady.

So far as is known, the President's wife has been away from the 750 Lafayette St. home of her mother, Mrs. John S. Doud, only once since she arrived there with the Chief Executive Aug. 8.

The next morning she attended services at the nearby Corona Presbyterian Church, where she went to Sunday school as a girl.

A girlhood chum who asks not to be named says the First Lady has been turning down all sorts of invitations to social affairs and to informal get-togethers with old friends.

But she has been doing a lot of talking on the telephone to friends she has known for years, and some of them have been dropping by in the afternoons to talk over old times.

It's no secret that Denver's altitude — they call it the mile high city — bothers Mrs. Eisenhower, as it does some others. It tires her, so she has been sleeping late in the morning and generally getting to bed quite early at night.

During the day when she isn't visiting with her mother or friends,

Reformatory Riot Probe Ordered

A full scale investigation to ferret out and prosecute ringleaders in last week's riot at the Washington State Reformatory at Monroe was demanded Monday by acting Gov. Emmett T. Anderson.

Anderson called for the probe as state engineers at the reformatory completed a survey of property damage caused by last Thursday's uprising, which also left one inmate dead and three wounded.

Engineers of the State Department of Public Institutions were making a building-by-building check of burned-out shops and wrecked cellblocks to determine the full cost of the riot.

Unofficial damage estimates ranged up into the millions of dollars.

Anderson, acting for Gov. Langley, who is in Europe, urged the investigation in a letter to Atty. Gen. Don Eastwood. The letter said the ringleaders "... must be swiftly brought to justice for the extensive property damage done."
