'Color On Parade' 1953 Fall Flower Show Theme

"Color On Parade" is the theme of the 1953 fall flower show sponsored by the Klamath Falls Garden Club, to be held Monday, Aug. 31, in the city library auditorium.

The doors will be open between 2 and 8 p.m. and the public is cordially invited to attend and view the wealth of blooms and artistic fall gardens.

The schedule for exhibitors follows:

Classification of Entries—In decorative division foliage may be used in all classes unless otherwise stated.

1. Table arrangements less than 12 inches wide or high; 1. Red predominating; 2. Yellow or orange predominating; 3. White predominating with a minimum of foliage; 4. Fruit, vegetables, flowers alone on in combination.

2. Arrangements over 12 inches in height or width; 1. Rose or pink predominating; 2. Yellow or orange predominating; 3. White predominating with a minimum of foliage; 4. All green—no restriction as to materials.

3. Small arrangements, 3 to 4 inches overall; 4. Snazzy-free arrangements; 5. Foliage and berries—no other material; 6. At the beach—arrangement featuring driftwood; 7. Happy days are here again—A radiating line arrangement featuring gladiolus; 8. Within your own board fence—patio arrangement; 9. Charm of the Orient—arrangement showing Japanese influence; 10. New Moon—a crescent arrangement of yellow-toned flowers in black container; 11. Dried arrangements; 12. A desert sunset—an arrangement using at least three adjacent colors in several values of these colors.

Horticulture—Annuals: 1. Single Petunia—3 stalks, 8 to 10 inches; 2. Double Petunia—1 stalk, 8 to 10 inches; 3. Sweet Peas—6 stems;

4. Asters Single—3 blooms on 3 stems; 5. Asters Double—3 blooms on 3 stems; 6. Marigold Single—3 stems with as many flowers as possible; 7. Marigold double—3 stems with as many flowers as possible; 8. Calendula—6 blooms; 9. Perennials: 9. Snapdragon—1 spike; 10. Carnation—1 stem; 11. Sweet William—1 stalk; 12. Michaelmas Daisies—any type, 3 sprays; 13. Gladiolus—any color, 1 stalk; 14. Gladiolus—any color, 1 stalk; 15. Roses: 1. Hybrid Tea—3 blooms, 1 variety, any color; 2. Polyantha—1 stalk, 1 variety, any color; 3. Any other type of rose—3 stalks.

16. Zinnias Dwarf—3 stalks; 17. Zinnias Giant—1 bloom; 18. Dahlias: 1. Cactus—1 bloom, 1 variety; 2. Decorative—1 bloom, 1 variety; 3. Pompon—1 bloom, 1 variety; 4. Miniature—1 bloom, 1 variety.

Competitive Specimens—For the purposes of this flower show, the following definitions have been adopted: Stem: shall bear only one completely open flower. Any bud on a stem must be counted and any that shows color is considered a

flower regardless of the development. Stalk: A stiff stem which may or may not branch and with one or more flowers and buds. Spike: A flower structure with flowers stemless on a common lengthened stalk. Spray: Portions of plants with a number of flowers on one stem. Entries must contain the exact number of stems etc. specified.

Open to all flower lovers of the Klamath Basin. Entries will be registered from 9:00 to 11:00 a.m. No entry will be registered if not in hall by 11:00 a.m. Exhibitor to place only one entry in each division. No ribbon will be awarded in any class having less than two entries unless exhibit is especially noteworthy.

Flower show committee will not be responsible for loss or damage to any container or other property. Containers will be furnished by show committee for specimens only. The committee in charge shall determine the eligibility for the class. All specimens must be correctly, legibly and attractively labeled. All horticultural specimens must be grown by exhibitor.
