Tule Growers Contract Camp

TULELAKE — The Tulelake Growers Potato Committee has let the contract for operation of a mess hall and two barracks buildings at the Growers camp at the old WRA site at Newell, to "Whitney" Lancaster, Lamont, Calif.

Lancaster, who has operated here in other years, will bring his own crew of about 100 contracted single men and will operate with Larry Brannon, Tulelake contractor.

The buildings were rehabilitated by Federal prisoners held in Tulelake by the Bureau of Prisons.

Other contractors will be permitted use of other barracks. Much of the single labor that helps in the potato harvest that gets under way here about Oct. 1 is handled by contractors.

The Growers office expects the trailer camp, south of Newell, to be ready about Sept. 15.

Newcomers Enter Soil Conservation
Newcomers to Klamath Falls recently were two families, Mr. and Mrs. John Berg and two boys, aged 1 and 8, from faraway Hawaii, and Mr. and Mrs. Don Baldwin and son, 2, Enterprise.

Both men have been transferred here to work on local Soil Conservation District projects. Berg will be in charge of the recently-formed Poe Valley district, and Baldwin will be farm and ranch planner for the Klamath District, with the northern part of the county his main interest.

Soil conservation is not a new venture for either man. Berg was with the Soil Conservation Service for several years in the land of the pineapple; Baldwin was with the Enterprise district before transferring here.

The men are becoming familiar with problems of the local districts, and are anxious to meet with farmers and discuss their individual problems.

BLM Lists Sale Of 24 Tracts

PORTLAND (R) — Seventeen tracts of O & C timber and seven tracts of public domain timber will be offered for sale next month by the Bureau of Land Management.

The timber is located in Polk, Lane, Lane, Tillamook, Clackamas, Douglas, Coos, Josephine, and Jackson counties.

Sale of O & C timber is scheduled at Roseburg Sept. 2; Eugene, Sept. 3; and Salem, Coos Bay and Medford, Sept. 4.

Public domain timber sales are to be at Coos Bay, Medford and Salem Sept. 4.

The O & C timber totals 62,906,000 board feet and the other 5,065,000.
