CIO Strikes Firestone

CLEVELAND (AP)—The CIO United Rubber Workers union struck the big Firestone Tire & Rubber Co. throughout the nation today. Negotiators failed to reach a new wage agreement before a midnight deadline.
 Union and company representatives talked far into the early morning and scheduled another session today.
 The strike involves 24,000 production workers in eight cities, including 10,000 in Akron, Ohio.
 Most of the union locals went out about midnight (local time), with the first walkouts reported at Akron, Pottstown, Pa., and Fall River, Mass.
 The other Firestone plants are in Los Angeles; Noblesville and Newcastle, Ind.; Memphis, Tenn.; and Des Moines, Iowa.
 Union and company spokesmen continued a long-standing policy of not commenting on the progress of the negotiations.
 "While it never has given specific details of its demands, the union says they include a 'substantial' wage increase and better pensions. It also is seeking adjustment of what it calls inequities in wage rates for some classifications."

Spud Marketing Committee Determines 1953-54 Rules

TULELAKE — Potato grading regulations on U. S. No. 1 minimum potatoes, maturity standards and cull shipment rules were determined for 1953-54 at a meeting last week of the Oregon-California Potato Marketing Committee at Redmond.
 All regulations hinge on the provision that the neighboring potato-producing states of Idaho and Washington agree to the same crop restrictions.
 A report of the meeting, that drew eight of the ten-member board, was released this week by Dick McDougal, Tulelake's handler-representative on the committee. Pottinger, grower alternate, and Paul Macy, member of the board.
 Other board members from the Klamath area were Clayton Reber, John Short and John Ginchin.
 Minimum grades on U. S. No. 1's were set at a two-inch minimum, or 4-ounce minimum with U. S. No. 2's at a 6-ounce minimum.

Maturity regulation certificates must read "slightly skinned" with not more than 10 per cent of spuds in any one lot showing more than 25 per cent of the skin missing, or feathered. This same regulation, in effect last year, was generally favorably accepted by growers.
 U. S. No. 1 B's, if shipped, must sell for export only.
 Culls can be shipped anywhere for livestock feeding purposes but the feeder will be required to show an affidavit that the shipment is being used for feeding only. In the office of the Potato Committee in Redmond, prior to acceptance of the shipment.
 Other details, to insure efficient enforcement of this provision which carries a penalty for violation, are being considered by the executive board of the committee.
 The percentage of the minimum grade that any individual grower can ship in a season was set at 83 per cent, the same as last year. This is designed to protect the grower of minimum sized potatoes.

However, McDougal stated, since the potato crop in this area is later this year than usual, and the effect of a possible early frost would materially effect the pack, it was decided that later developments might necessitate a change in this percentage.
 Roy Snabel, Redmond, newly elected committee chairman brought out during the meeting that 95 per cent of all Russets grown in the U.S. are marketed under an agreement order. Montana is the only state producing a large acreage of Russets not under marketing provisions.
 The proposed committee budget for the coming season was slightly revised from the original to total anticipated expenditures of \$14,440.
 Bob Eaton, field representative of the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration's Portland office, was present in an advisory capacity.
 Plans are under way for a meeting in mid-September in Boise or Caldwell, Ida., of potato committees from the West Coast Potato areas, to coordinate proposed agreements and regulations.

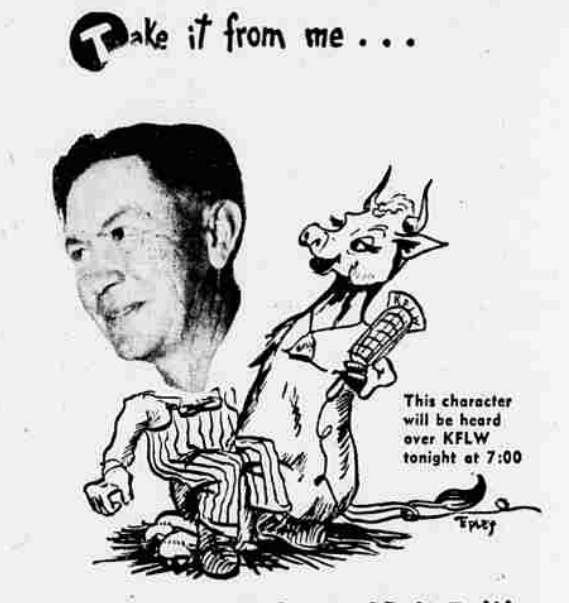

Alfred Drake Of 'Oklahoma' Fame Declines Film Offers

 HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Alfred Drake, here for a pre-Broadway run in "Kismet," is warding off movie offers that come his way. He doesn't want to repeat his film fiasco.
 Drake presents a dazzling performance nightly in the Oriental fantasy that will hit New York this fall. The former star of "Oklahoma!" and "Kiss Me Kate" has been talking to a couple of picture makers about picture work. But he expects to turn down their proposals.
 "I like the stage," he explained, "and I think I'm fairly accomplished at it. I don't want to repeat the mess I got into the last time I signed for pictures."
 Drake was snapped up by Columbia after he made his hit in "Oklahoma!"
 "I was expecting to be drafted," the actor explained. "I thought I had better pick up some easy money before I had to leave for the Army. So I signed. Then it turned out that I was AF. But I was stuck with the Columbia contract."
 "Harry Cohn (Columbia boss) had me into his office. He asked me what kind of pictures I would like to make. I said that I wasn't handsome—I would never give Tyron Power or other glamor boys any competition. I told him I was at home in costumes. Perhaps this had something to do with the fact that my forebears are Italian or because of a juvenile idolatry of Douglas Fairbanks Sr."
 "I sat for 10 weeks, doing nothing but drawing a handsome salary. Then they told me I was going to do 'Tars and Spars.' They put me in a costume, but it was a sailor's uniform! I looked like a million other guys in the same fix. 'The only good thing in the picture was Sid Caesar. I was awful. After that, I turned down script after script, even though I had no right to do so under my contract. Still they kept me under salary."
 "Finally Cohn called me into his office. 'Don't you want to make pictures?' he asked. 'No,' I replied. So he let me go."
 Drake went back to Broadway and continued his string of successes. He may have another one in

"Kismet." Most of the L.A. critics agreed with the elements of success and that Drake is tops on the musical stage.
 "The show has reached the point where the people know the changes have to be made, but everyone hesitates to make the first move," Drake observed.
 It would appear that he has confidence in the show. He grew his own beard for it, which would seem to indicate he thinks it will last beyond the eight-week tryout in Los Angeles and San Francisco.
 "Actually, I grew it for my own comfort and safety," he said.
 "Having had experience with a variety of beards on the stage, I know how they can itch."
 "Besides, I read about a singer at the Metropolitan who swallowed his m u s t a c h e s not long ago. Damned near choked to death."
