Yankees Lose 2nd To Tribe

Charlie Grimm better check with Charlie Dressen on which astrologer he reads.
If he doesn't, the stars may get the National League pennant race all confused.
Milwaukee Charlie celebrated his 35th birthday yesterday and his horoscope, as compiled by one New York stargazer, claims his present frustration is only temporary and that everything will be okay in two weeks.
Grimm, who hasn't conceded anything to the Brooklyn Charlie even though his club trails Dressen's club by 9½ games, might interpret this prediction as meaning the Dodgers are still alive and the Yankees are due for a fall.

HITCH
The big hitch is that Dressen has a birthday coming up Sept. 20, soon enough that his horoscope at the moment is the same as Grimm's. And Brooklyn Charlie's "slight frustration" presently is the fact his Dodgers are as close and yet so far from clinching their second straight pennant. If everything clears up for him, too, in the next two weeks, as the astrologer suggests, it could only mean the Dodgers would be in.

Certainly this would seem much more likely. Although the Braves have played excellently—winning 24 of 34 in the last month—the Dodgers have played better—26 victories in 32 games over the same period.
The clubs won last night.

The Braves beat the New York Giants 3-1 with Warren Spahn winning his 19th game. Brooklyn batted four home runs for the second game in succession, whipping Cincinnati 9-7. Pee Wee Reese hit two, Carl Furillo one and Roy Campanella one.

The Dodgers now have tied the National League record of having four hitters with 20 or more home runs in the season. Campanella's drive, his 33rd, equalled his all-time major league high.

Curt Simmons of the Philadelphia Phillies blanked the Chicago Cubs on four singles 6-0 and St. Louis edged Pittsburgh 10-9.

In the American League the New York Yankees dropped their second straight to Cleveland 3-2 but didn't lose any ground to the Chicago White Sox who also defeated 4-3 to Boston. St. Louis defeated Philadelphia 8-3 and Washington jumped Detroit 7-4. The Yanks lead by 9½.

RALLY
The Cardinals rallied after Pittsburgh exploded for seven runs in the fifth inning. A pinch hit single by Red Schoendienst with the bases loaded in the seventh provided the winning run.

Steady Eddie Lopat of the Yankees lost his third game of the season in bowing to Cleveland. Al Rosen's 34th homer tied the count in the sixth and the Tribe got the winning tally in the seventh when Bobby Avila singled, stole second and scored on a double by Bill Glynn.

Boston's victory over Chicago was only the fifth for the Red Sox in 18 games (this season, Jim Pierall drove home the winning run with a triple in the seventh).

Dick Krychelski starred as the Browns swept their three game series from the Athletics. He drove in four runs with a double, triple and home run.

Mickey Vernon, Washington's 35-year-old first baseman, increased his league leading batting average to .329 with two singles and a home run against the Tigers. He scored two runs and drove in two.

Guy Munsell, letterman end, suffered a re-occurrence of a shoulder separation injury in last night's scrimmage on Modoc Field. The Pelican griddler was shelved part of last season with the same injury.

Karns Inks For H&N Tennis Meet

It's official now that Ken Karns will defend his Herald and News tennis title in the three-day meet that opens a week from today at Moore Park.
The net veteran who dominated local tennis courts for many years but has since moved to Redding, sent in his entry blank to the newspaper yesterday.

He'll team in mixed doubles with Kay O'Bryon, women's singles champion, who teamed with Karns last year to capture the mixed doubles title.

Karns, now 36 but showing no signs of letting up, will nonetheless have a considerably tougher time picking up his fourth championship in this fast-growing annual event.

Williamson, a mainstay in this tourney, has also entered. Karns had to whip the Eureka, Calif., shotmaker for the title last year.

Don Megale, the only other player besides Karns to win the Labor Day singles title—the ex-Oregon State Mighty Mile now in the armed service won in 1949 and 1951—won't be here.

Karns' other wins were in 1948 and 1950.
In addition to Williamson, Norm Merrill, Portland, state high school champion, and Ray Gorney, Eureka who is an ex-Israel Davis Cooper, have signed to play.

Entries have just begun to come in. Harry Todd, tourney chairman, expects a record field before the week is out.

In addition to Karns and Kay O'Bryon, Klamath's Ronnie Lowell and Earl Brooks will put their 1952 doubles title on the line and Redding's Terry Wagner will aim for his second straight junior singles crown.

EVENT OUT
Wagner teamed with Bruce Dinger last year to win the junior doubles title, but that event has been dropped off this year due to a lack of younger players.

Ruth Hagelstein, Klamath Falls, an improved player who this year won the city title, is expected to give Kay O'Bryon a fight for the blue ribbon.

But Kay has won the championship every time she's shown here—the last three years—and her experience could pay off in a fourth straight title.

The PCL standings show Los Angeles 15½ games behind pace-setting Hollywood, but the Angels must not be reading the newspapers.

Hollywood is having no end of trouble trying to win its cross-town "championship" from Stan Hack's club.

The Stars sent out their star rookie, George O'Donnell, after his 20th victory. The Angels beat him, 2-1, as their own Calvin Coolidge McElish threw a three-hitter, shortstop Gene Baker hit his 20th homer and catcher Les Peden drove Baker in with the winning run in the eighth on a scorching double to right.

So, now, Hollywood has only a 16-14 bulge in games played, and with three to go the Angels could wind up with a 17-16 margin for the season.

For 4½ innings Oakland and San Francisco played a really tight game with the score 1-all. San Francisco then went wild, scoring 14 runs in three innings to whip the lowly Oaks, 15-2. Tony Ponce, who came to the Seals from Oilers, scattered six hits, fanned five Acorns and issued only one walk. Bill Howerton rapped him for a homer, his 27th of the season.

Faulk, Riley Meet In U.S. Amateur Finals

PROVIDENCE, R.I. (AP)—Mary Lena Faulk only had her own golf clubs, she might have made a shambles of the 1953 U.S. Women's Amateur championship.
As it is, she's rated no worse than a toss-up against Polly Riley in Saturday's 36-hole final for the 63rd championship.

All through this tournament, the lean, jut-jawed Thomasville, Ga., girl has been playing with a set of irons borrowed from juco Peggy Kirk, and a once-discarded set of woods and putter. And through the five rounds she scored better than anyone in the tournament.

CLUBS HOME
After losing to Philomena Garvey in the semi-finals of the British Amateur championship last June, Mary Lena shipped her clubs home by boat.

She's still waiting for them and that's why she had to use the makeshift set when she returned to competition after a long rest.

The new ones almost failed her Friday in her semi-final match against 16-year-old Margaret (Willie) Smith of Mexico.

She got off to a rocky start and lost the second and third holes—after going 29 straight holes without losing one—and then went three down with a double-bogey five on the fifth hole.

She fought her way back to a 3 and 2 victory over the calm, red-haired Guadalupe girl.

LETDOWN
Against Miss Riley, a muscular five-footer whom she had met on three other occasions, Miss Faulk won't be able to afford a letdown.

Polly, who has come through the hardest quarter of the draw, had another rough match, Friday against Mrs. Philip J. Gudone of Montclair, N.J., but pulled it out on the 19th green after catching up at the 16th.

Both of the finalists are 27 years old; they both work as bookkeepers—Polly for a Fort Worth law firm; Mary Lena in her father's automobile agency.

And they're both in the final of the national championship for the first time.
