Haymes 'Out' May Be Treaty

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A copy of an 1855 treaty between the United States and crooner Dick Haymes' native Argentina, injected into his deportation proceedings, may get him an indefinite postponement of the case.

Haymes' lawyers told U. S. Judge Peirson M. Hall yesterday that under the treaty the singer is entitled to have a special constitutional court impaneled to hear the case.

Judge Hall said the points raised were important and that sufficient time must be taken to decide them. He set a hearing on the petition for Sept. 21.

Judge Hall suggested that the Immigration Service might continue indefinitely its deportation hearing, continued last Wednesday to Sept. 28.

Haymes' lawyers also have asked an injunction to stop the deportation hearings, Haymes was not in court yesterday, having returned to Nevada for night club appearances.

The government is trying to deport the singer on the ground that he became ineligible for citizenship by claiming exemption from military service as an alien during World War II.

17 Areas Keep Rent Controls

WASHINGTON (AP)—Federal rent controls, effective a month ago in some 1,400 communities, will remain in force only in 17 areas Monday.

The Office of Defense Mobilization (ODM) yesterday announced decontrol, effective then, of four areas formerly classed as critical and parts of three others.

Areas fully decontrolled were Sidney, Neb.; Hawthorne, Nev.; Knobster-Sedalia, Mo.; and Braidwood-Joliet, Ill.; part-area decontrol was announced for Laclede and Phelps Counties, Mo., Dale County, Ala., and a portion of Beauregard Parish, La.

Bank Won't Say What Accused Teller Got Paid

YORK, Pa. (AP)—A 59-year-old father of two children is free on \$5,000 bond today pending appearance in Federal court on charges of embezzling \$20,550 from the York County National Bank.

Earl G. Smyser, head teller at the bank where he has worked for 28 years, was arrested yesterday by FBI agents. The FBI said bank officials discovered the shortage late Thursday night.

At a preliminary hearing last night before U. S. Commissioner Horace G. Potts, Smyser was quoted as saying he took the money over a period of 10 years to educate his children—both now grown—and for everyday living expenses. Bank officials refused to disclose the teller's salary.

Bank President William C. Bell said the loss has been covered by the insurance company which holds the bank's surety bond.

'Bear' Killing Suspect Cited

PERCE, Quebec (AP)—A burly 29-year-old prospector-woodman today faced trial on a charge of murdering one of three Pennsylvania hunters whose bear-growth remains were found last month in the Gaspé wilderness bush.

A provincial magistrate's court last night ordered Wilbert Coffin, the last man known to have seen the three Americans alive, to stand trial in the death of 17-year-old Richard Lindsey, of Hollidaysburg, Pa.

Young Lindsey's remains were found in the bush 65 miles west of Gaspé along with those of his father, Eugene H. Lindsey, 47, and a chum, Fred Clair, 20, of East Freedom, Pa.

The court's decision was announced by Magistrate Joseph Duguay following 12-hour-long preliminary hearings in which 17 witnesses testified throughout the proceedings.

No date was set for the trial but it will be held during the fall session of the Queen's Bench criminal assizes.

Tough Sergeants Freed by Reds

PANMUNJOM (AP)—Tough American sergeants who were separated from their men in North Korean prison camps because of their outspoken resistance to communism began coming home today.

Among the 145 Americans freed today at Panmunjom were 36 non-commissioned officers from the sergeants' compound at Camp 3, Chongsong, North Korea.

M. Sgt. James C. Goelzer, 37, of New Albany, Ind., who was captured six days after U. S. ground troops went into action in Korea in July, 1950, said:

"As long as the sergeants were allowed to stay with their men, the Communists had no success preaching their propaganda."

Two Australian officers, three Turks, and 250 South Koreans also were returned. One Australian, a Mustang pilot, was the first Australian airman captured.

The Allies returned 2,400 North Koreans.

Bull Scatters Infantry; Tanks Put Him In Ditch

CAMP DRUM, N. Y. (AP)—An angry bull routed a squad of reserve infantrymen yesterday but found himself overpowered when the tanks moved in.

The foot soldiers crossing the bull's pasture on reconnaissance problem, scattered when they saw him charge.

The squad leader set up his command post in a tree and call for reinforcements over a walkie-talkie radio. Three tanks rumbled in.

Mechanized warfare was too much for the bull. He took cover in a ditch—and was unable to get out.

An ordnance wrecking truck hauled him up. Then the truck, tanks and infantrymen staged a strategic withdrawal.

The men, all from Brooklyn and Long Island points, are on two weeks of summer maneuvers at this northern New York camp.

Theater Borrows Hollywood Gimmicks

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Who says the stage can't learn from the movies? The living theater is the original 3D, of course, but it is also borrowing some film innovations. One of these is stereophonic sound. That's the gimmick of having loudspeakers placed at several places behind the big screens and through out the theaters, so the sound seems to come from all directions.

Producer Edwin Lester adapted this technique for his new show "Kismet." In the opening scene, a chamber of Bagdad calls the faithful to prayer. Other voices carry the call to both sides of the theater and even in the balcony. It's highly effective.

A current magazine article mentions that the movie industry is the nation's third largest. This is a myth that has been preserved through the years, although the listing is usually given as fourth.

The Motion Picture Almanac reports 219,000 full-time workers in the film industry in 1951. The Department of Commerce listed motion pictures' share of the national income of 1949 as 40 cents of every \$100.

Does that sound like an industry that is the country's third largest? ...

This is the tourist season in Hollywood, and the studios are swamped with requests to see the sets. Most of the hopefuls are turned away in disappointment. Only those with exceptional pull are allowed to get beyond the studio gates.

Warners seems to be going all-out in discouraging visitors. The reception room is equipped with a booth of darkened glass, a security visible studio policeman sits behind the glass and receives requests via a two-way microphone. It's something like visiting day at San Quentin.

This may be testimony of the state of the union. Folks predicted that Jane Powell's career would dive after she broke up her marriage and started dating Gene Nelson, with whom she co-starred in a movie.

Apparently her career isn't suffering. The latest popularity poll of Motion Picture magazine shows that Jane has zoomed to No. 1 position.

Fear of Growing Old Slows Solving Aged's Problems

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Grandma needs a medical specialist just like junior, says the head of a scientific society devoted to helping the nation's senior citizens.

"Families should have a dependable family geriatrist for their elder members," comparable to junior's pediatrician, Dr. E. V. Cowdry, told the Gerontological Society last night.

The St. Louis scientist deplored the lack of full-time experts in diseases. He described some of those now practicing as excellent—others as "half-baked."

The fear of growing old is hampering the solution of problems facing the aged, Dr. Cowdry declared.

"Because of this phobia, we like to turn away from old people and their difficulties, and concentrate instead on starry-eyed children," he said.

"Our nation is not discharging its duty to the increasing millions of citizens who face with trepidation their declining years."

However, social and medical scientists in final sessions of the three-day meeting presented these findings from research projects aimed at relieving that trepidation:

1. A proper diet of milk products can lessen incidents of arthritis in body joints (osteoarthritis).
2. Atherosclerosis—the condition which often leads to heart attacks and apoplectic strokes—may be caused by a deficiency of heparin, a chemical normally found in the liver and lungs.
3. Educated persons get smarter as they get older.

Dr. L. M. Cromwell, San Diego, said results of his experiments with 309 osteoarthritis showed "the older people who hadn't liked milk products had more osteoarthritis than their counterparts who had liberally used them."

Dr. Hyman Engelberg of Los Angeles said his research—if confirmed—would show that atherosclerosis or hardening of the arteries is a heparin-deficiency disease just as diabetes in many cases results from insulin deficiency.
