Freed POW Not Wanted By Wife, Her New Husband

LEXINGTON, Tenn. (AP)—Attractive Ava Nell Cogburn and James Hern, a tall ex-Marine, married last summer, two years after her husband, Sgt. Jimmie Cogburn, was reported missing.

Friday Sgt. Cogburn was released by the Communists. Mrs. Hern said she will divorce the sergeant and remarry Hern. The 24-year-old brunette said she was "happy and surprised" to learn Cogburn was alive.

"But," she added, "I don't love him in the way I love James." She said she hadn't heard from Cogburn since he was taken prisoner in July 1950. Hern said he would "stick by Ava Nell—I love her."

"It's worth all the embarrassment and trouble we'll have to go through to know the sergeant is okay," he said. "I only hope we can settle this with the least amount of fuss."

Cecil Manley, Mrs. Hern's father, also promised to stand by the young couple.

"They didn't mean to do anything wrong," he said. "They're young and happy making a good home together, and I'll do what I can to help them."

The sergeant and Mrs. Hern are the parents of a 6-year-old boy, James Danny.

Other officers named were Ben W. Fortson Jr., Georgia, vice president; Gene D. Smith, Pennsylvania, treasurer; Helen Ladner, Mississippi, secretary, and Beatrice Roach, New Mexico, corresponding secretary.

From Lakeview—Mr. and Mrs. Louie Ellis and daughter Gail, were visitors from Lakeview Saturday. They spent the day shopping here.

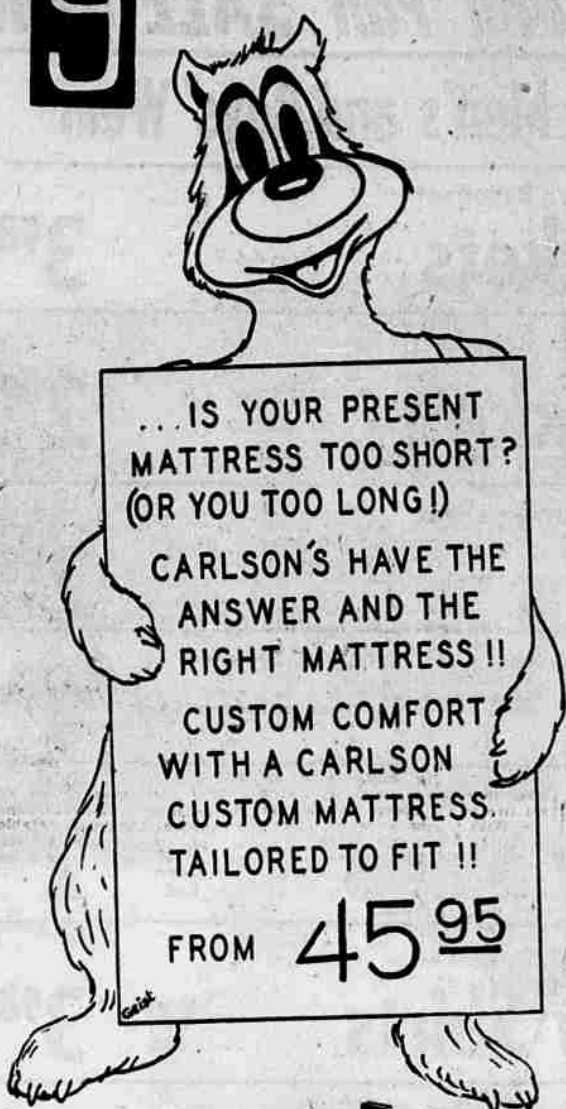

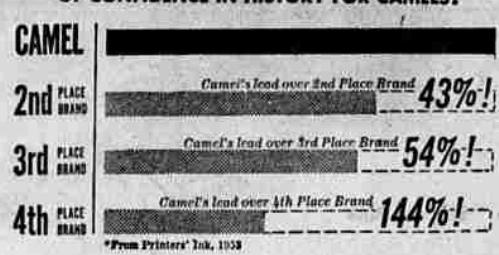
