PANMUNJOM (AP) — Another 150 Americans, mostly sergeants and officers, were freed today amid indications the Communists may send back up to 500 more Americans than the 3,313 originally promised.

The Reds also released 250 South Koreans on this 27th day of the Korean War prisoner exchange.

The Communists promised to send back 400 prisoners tomorrow — 100 Americans, 25 British, 20 Turks, 5 Australians and another 250 South Koreans.

One of the Britons to be handed over Tuesday will be Lt. Col. James P. Carne, top-ranking British officer held by the Communists, Red newspapermen said.

1 1/2-Hour, 40-Mile Chase Catches Hit- & Runner

CHICAGO (AP) — Louis Gawlik, 39, was a man with a mission.

When he saw an oncoming car knock a woman down at an intersection, he wheeled his own automobile around in pursuit.

Ninety minutes and 40 miles of dark alleys later, he overtook the fleeing car when it ran out of gas. His yells brought police.

The seized driver, Arthur Kneip, 58, denied striking the woman, Mrs. Mary Garbrecht, 53, but police said they found a fragment of her slip on Kneip's fender.

Kneip posted \$465 bond for appearance in auto safety court Oct. 8 on charges of drunken driving leaving the scene of an accident and failure to yield right of way to a pedestrian.

Mrs. Garbrecht is in a hospital with injuries to her head, hips and legs.

Gawlik told police he stuck to the pursuit because his father was killed nine years ago by a hit-and-run driver who never was apprehended.

Fugitive One Of State's Boys

PORTLAND (AP) — Robert George Thompson, fugitive Communist nabbed by the FBI in California Thursday, was born at Grants Pass and was educated in Portland schools.

He left here in 1933, the year he is thought to have joined the Communist Party.

Since then he spent a year in Russia, fought in the Spanish Civil War, was active in the Young Communist League in Ohio and New York, and was in 1945 a member of the national board of the Communist Party.

He won the Distinguished Service Cross in action on New Guinea with the U. S. Army.

Viet Nam 'Little Farmer' Becoming Landowner Fast

HANOI, Indochina, (AP) — The "little farmer" is getting a break in Viet Nam.

He's becoming a landowner just about as fast as he wants to take over a property and cultivate it himself—for himself and his family—instead of being a tenant-farmer.

Viet Nam's chief of state, Bao Dai, former emperor of Annam, has declared that "the hour of exploitation of brother by brother" in Viet Nam has passed.

To make sure that is so, the Council of Ministers of Viet Nam has promulgated four sweeping ordinances—and more are on the way—to form a set of laws to be known as the "Farmer's Code."

The code is aimed at splitting up big land holdings and putting little farms into the hands of the little farmer.

There are about 14 million acres of farm land in all of Viet Nam and a goodly share of this total is in the ricefields of the north and south. Rice is the big crop in this country, with the Red River Delta in northern Indochina being one of the biggest producers in all of Asia. But there also is heavy planting of vegetable crops.

Since the state of Viet Nam was formed a little over a year ago, around three million acres of rice and other farm lands have been sliced out of big holdings and handed over to peasants.

Under Viet Nam's land reform laws, no property owner with more than 250 acres of land can refuse to sell part of his holdings upon request to any single Vietnamese farmer.

States Collect \$68 From Each Citizen

WASHINGTON (AP) — The 48 state governments last year collected a record \$10,452,000,000 in taxes—an average of \$68.04 from each American.

Reporting this yesterday, the Census Bureau said the fiscal 1953 total was 685 million dollars more than was collected in the previous year. Most states end their fiscal years on June 30.

The bureau noted that the figures do not include local government taxes, which on a nationwide basis total nearly as much as state revenues.

If the farmer doesn't have the money to buy a strip of land for himself, the Vietnamese government steps in and helps him financially. Cung Dinh Quy, minister of agriculture, told a news conference recently the government has set up a special credit of 30 million Indochinese piastres (a piastre being worth about five cents) to aid the little farmer. Loans must be repaid within 10 years and bear 8 percent interest annually.

There's a limitation on how much land the peasant can buy. That's fixed because of the quality of the lands involved and their location. For instance, in the densely populated, wedge-shaped Red River Delta of northern Indochina, a peasant may buy from 30 to 90-acre farms. In central Viet Nam, he may acquire 37 to 112-acre strips. In southern Viet Nam, he may buy from 75 to 250-acre holdings.

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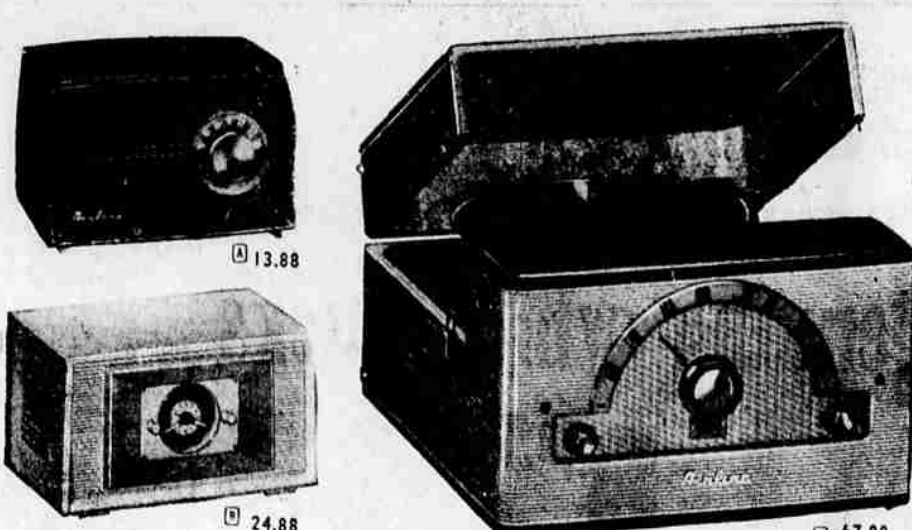
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
