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Patricia Medina Fed Up With 3-D: Aim Too Poor

HOLLYWOOD (U.P.)—Patricia Medina, one of England's loveliest, is one actress who doesn't care if she ever makes another 3-D movie. "I'm through with 3-D," she asserts. "Or rather, I should say that 3-D is through with me." Her reason is the most novel yet. "My aim is too poor," she explains. Much has been written about 3-D but always from the audience point of view, the discomfort of glasses, and the continual ducking. Now comes Miss Medina with the first complaint, to my knowledge, from the players' side. Patricia's last try at 3-D was at Columbia, where she worked for

producer Sam Katzman in "Drums of Tahiti." Katzman is a great gimmick man and it followed that his 3-D picture would be loaded with gimmicks. One of them called for Pat to pick up a cold cream jar and hurl it toward the camera, ultimately to splatter over bespectacled audiences. She failed miserably. Finally, the director said to skip it until the end of the picture.

"Here I was, an actress with 10 years of English and American experience behind me, wadding up as a complete idiot on the set. "It was pathetic. Some of my friends among the crew took great pains to help me. Some even cheered me on the sidelines but I was hopeless."

At the end of the shooting schedule, the director tried again. This proved even more embarrassing. Patricia, technicians rigged up an elaborate cord arrangement whereby she could not possibly toss the jar out of camera range. "This really hurt because this sort of treatment is usually reserved for child and animal actors. But even with the cord I failed. I doubt if they can salvage any of the takes for the movie."

"The director was very kind. He assured me he wasn't critical of my acting ability but hinted that I would have to improve my throwing arm if I wanted to continue in 3-D."

The experience so unnerved her that when producers Boo Fellows and John Wayne wanted her for their "Flunder of the Sun," she didn't even ask about the role. "All I wanted to know was whether it was flat or 3-D. Thank heavens, it was a good old flat."

Earth Tremor Buries Machines

TERRACE, B.C. (U.P.)—An earth tremor which split open a section of land along a railway construction project jolted northern British Columbia Wednesday. Heavy machinery was buried and one man was known to have been injured. Six thousand yards of earth tumbled into a crack that opened at Alwyn Creek Trestle, six-mile point on the Canadian National Railway's Terrace-Klimalat rail project. The tremor lasted two or three minutes in this area, 450 miles north of Vancouver, B.C. Identity of the injured man and details of his injury were not known. The earthquake occurred at approximately 5:30 a.m. Pat.

Wash. Prison Board Hit

MONROE, Wash. (U.P.)—A Washington State Reformatory employee criticized the State Board of Prison Terms and Paroles and recommended that the entire staff of the institution be put under Civil Service in testimony before a legislative committee Wednesday.

Lt. James Gray, who was in charge of two of the cellblocks at the time of the destructive Aug. 20 riot, said penalties given prisoners who escape and are recaptured are not severe enough, because the (Parole) Board doesn't give them additional time for escaping," he said.

"Give them (inmates) some time. Then they won't escape."

Under questioning by Sen. Neil H. Felt (R-Tacoma), committee chairman, Gray said he believed the entire institution, including the superintendent, should be put under Civil Service and a merit system should also be established.

Siskiyou Opens Schools Sept. 8

DORRIS — Siskiyou county schools will open Tuesday, Sept. 8. A preliminary test is the annual county teachers' institute, at the Yreka High School Sept. 2-4, with Eddie Roberts, county superintendent of schools, in charge. According to Harry Beck, principal of Butte Valley High School, there will be two new teachers this year, with seven of last year's faculty returning including himself. Beck has called a meeting of his teachers for 9 a.m. Sept. 5, at the high school.

He also states that the new California state law requires a minimum of 175 school days. Previously the law required a minimum of 170 days.

The new teachers this term will be C. Jean McDonald of Aberdeen, Wash., who taught last year at Moses Lake, Wash.; and Ralph Kenneth Cleveland of Gazele, who will teach his first year. Miss McDonald received her training at South Dakota State College and the University of Washington and did graduate work at the University of Oregon and University of Colorado. She has had seven years of high school teaching experience. At BVHS she will teach commercial subjects, journalism and girls' physical education. She will live at the home of Mrs. E. E. Ramsey.

Cleveland is a graduate of Yuba Junior College and San Jose State College. He has a wife and three children, one of whom is in grade school. They are living in one of the Kenneth Goodman apartments. Cleveland will have all shop classes and industrial arts.

Ernie Plunni, vice-principal and coach, will also teach chemistry and Algebra I and II. In addition to taking care of attendance, Mrs. Fannie Dennison's subjects will be English II, English IV, Bookkeeping and Home Economics I. Jane Lambert will teach English I, band, chorus, individual music instruction and study hall.

Robert Durbin will have two periods of boys' physical education, general mathematics, public speaking, practical mathematics or a section of Algebra I, and will have charge of the library. Robert Marrs will teach art, general science, civics, U.S. history and two study hall periods. Floyd Reese will have two sections of biology, practical mathematics or Algebra I, driver's education, social studies and study hall.

In addition to his duties as principal, Beck will teach military science (cadets), and a class of civics and senior orientation. Custodian of the school is A.V. Jacobson.

Suburban Variety Store Opens

"Downtown prices in a suburban area with ample parking space" is the aim of the new Thrifty Variety Store adjacent to the Suburban Drug on South 6th.

Owned and operated by brothers Harry G. (Bob) and Walter B. Waggoner, the new store joins Suburban Drug and is closely connected with it. Suburban Drug opened about a year and a half ago under the management of Bob Waggoner and Al Irvin. Its aim is to take care of human and animal health; general merchandise is taken care of in the Variety store.

"We want to run a good, clean drug store, but we also want to handle things people want and need," said Bob Waggoner in explaining the need for a separate Variety store.

The new Variety stocks sporting goods, home workers' hardware, children's apparel, men's work shirts and socks, a baby department, year-round toy department, sheets, a complete line of school supplies—"as many lines as possible," in Bob Waggoner's words.

The 3,000 feet of floor space accommodates cabinets and shelves for the merchandise. Walls are lined with Philippine mangrove. All fixtures in the store were designed and built by the two brothers.

Future plans include a warehouse to be built behind and to the side of the drug store, and a grand opening of the drug and variety stores in about 30 days.
