## Miller Sued For \$250,000

A suit for \$250,000 was filed against W. D. Miller and the Willard Hotel Co. late Friday in Circuit Court by Leland Wilson Scarlett, former manager of the hotel.

The plaintiff alleges he entered into an agreement with Miller to acquire a half interest in the hotel. He also states that it was agreed the plaintiff would become vice-president and general manager of the hotel.

Scarlett further states that Miller employed him on June 30, 1952 as general manager of the hotel at a monthly salary of \$500 plus board, room, laundry and personal expenses.

Subsequently, the complaint states, the hotel was sold to Frank Hofus.

Scarlett claims he was damaged in the amount of \$250,000. The action was instituted by U.S. Balentine, counsel for the plaintiff.
