Ag Department Backs Away From Non-Discrimination

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Agriculture Department, in the face of a storm of Southern protest, has backed away from its requirement that banks which make farm price support loans promise not to practice racial discrimination in employing personnel.

Assistant Secretary of Agriculture John H. Davis, who is president of the Commodity Credit Corporation said last week the non-discrimination clause no longer would be required. He said the decision was made on "a question of fact"—that employment was not involved, since lending agencies generally handled the loans without increasing their staffs.

The acrimony over the non-discrimination clause began only recently when Southerners discovered it has been contained in a lending agency agreement since May.

Secretary Benson said in South Carolina earlier this week that he regarded the clause as "unnecessary."

But Walter White, executive secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, said that if the President allowed the non-discrimination clause to be dropped "he might as well disband immediately the government Contract Compliance Committee." This group was set up recently to check on observance of non-discrimination by government contractors.

Davis called in reporters late yesterday and gave them a statement announcing it will be entirely optional with banks whether they sign the anti-discrimination pledge.

"They can scratch it out and we'll accept the contract," he said. Davis said he presumed some Southern banks already have signed the pledge—perhaps without reading the fine print. He was asked whether they could exchange their contracts for another without the clause.

"We'll have to study that out when it comes up," he commented. Gov. James F. Byrnes of South Carolina, who backed Gen. Eisenhower in the last presidential election, wrote the President Aug. 27 saying many banks would refuse to sign agreements containing the non-discrimination clause.

White called reversal of the order a "humiliating capitulation" to Byrnes.

"Full responsibility" for inclusion of the controversial clause in the contracts is being assumed by solicitor and one of Benson's first appointees, Karl D. Loos, the department's appointees.

Southern Oregon College Sept. 16 Starts Enrolling

ASHLAND, Oregon—Enrollment procedures will get underway at Southern Oregon College in Ashland, Wednesday, Sept. 16, according to Registrar Mabel W. Winston.

Registrations for freshmen students will be taken on Saturday, Sept. 19, and Monday, Sept. 21. The fall "Fresh Days" program will get underway on the 16th, in preparation for the first quarter. All new freshmen students arrive on campus that day and will be housed in the college residence halls. The following day the frosh will turn out for an eight o'clock assembly in the college auditorium at which will be given the college guidance and counseling tests.

Friday, Sept. 18, is to be devoted to meetings between new students and faculty advisors as well as general campus orientation. Registration for classes will be held the next morning followed by a picnic and campfire program in the evening, Mrs. Winston said.

Sunday will be given over to a progressive dinner for freshmen at faculty homes, leaving the dormitories empty for incoming permanent residents of the halls.

The second official registration day and the last day to register without penalty will be on Monday Sept. 21. Classes will begin on Tuesday.

Many room deposits have been received from students expecting to come to the college who have not filed an application for admission. Applications must be accompanied by transcripts from school previously attended as well as the health record card required by state law. A ten dollar deposit is needed for freshmen men and all women students living in college dormitories. A fee of \$7.75 will be paid by temporary residents.

Veterans advisor Harold Cloer advised veteran students to obtain certificates of eligibility from their Veterans' Administration office.

Fees for residents of Oregon at the college are \$40 per quarter or \$50 per quarter for non-residents.
