Lucille Ball's Activities Blamed Onto Her Grandpa

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Lucille Ball, television's top comedienne, never was a communist, says the House Un-American Activities Committee, even though she registered as one 17 years ago.

The wide-eyed star of the popular "I Love Lucy" show freely admitted to committee investigators William Wheeler that she registered March 19, 1936, to vote for the Communist ticket "because Grandpa wanted all of us to."

But she emphatically denied ever being a party member or voting for party candidates.

"There is no evidence that Miss Ball or ever was a party member," Rep. Donald L. Jackson (R-Calif.), committee member, told a news conference last night.

Ball explained he called the conference at the behest of a majority of committee members so that rumors implicating Miss Ball, 42, with communism could be scotched.

If the rumors hadn't become widespread, he added, it is unlikely the committee would have made the disclosures, since it had known for several years of Miss Ball's registration.

Ball said that there is some question as to whether Miss Ball ever voted the Communist ticket, but added that this point will be cleared up today with the release of the transcript of her testimony before Wheeler.

The same time she registered, Jackson said, she signed a nominating petition for Emil Freed, Communist party candidate for the 57th California Assembly District. He said this also was at the request of her grandfather, Fred C. Hunt, now deceased, and who, the actress said, made the political decisions in the family.

The actress was quoted by Jackson as saying that in addition to herself, her mother, Mrs. Desirée Ball, and brother, Fred H. Ball, all registered to vote Communist.

'Atomic Dust' Now Denied

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP)—Secret atomic research conducted here for 2 1/2 years involves "the absorption of radioactive elements by plants."

University of Arizona scientist Dr. Wallace H. Fuller said yesterday his work on radioactive strontium might be used to produce a powerful "dust bomb" that might cripple food supplies for a nation.

But Fuller later issued a statement saying:

"As far as I know the dust bomb is nonexistent and no dust bomb has ever been planned or produced."

He has been working under contract to the Atomic Energy Commission. The research, Fuller said, had shown that strontium is similar to calcium and that both elements are absorbed equally well by plants through their leaves or from the soil.

Radio-strontium might cause radiation sickness in animals if it were showered over forage, he said, and "man also could get it by consuming leafy vegetables."

Bibles Popular With Thieves

TULSA, Okla. (AP)—The book that commands, "Thou shalt not steal," is the one most frequently stolen, City Librarian James E. Gourley reports.

According to Gourley, six to eight Bibles are missing from his adds, "that seems to be the experience of libraries all over the country."

Cop 'Cools Off,' Protests Reward

BROOKLINE, Mass. (AP)—A policeman who went to sea for 10 days aboard a fishing trawler to "cool off," thinks his punishment—three months suspension—is too severe.

Patrolman Joseph T. McLaughlin said in his appeal to the State Civil Service Commission yesterday that he had private difficulties and needed to take the trip to "cool off."

His appeal was taken under advisement.

Trucker Honored For Aiding Cops

NEW YORK (AP)—Truck driver James Brooks says he did nothing more than any other citizen would have done in helping capture two alleged holdup men Tuesday during a 60-mile-an-hour running gun battle in the Lincoln Tunnel.

Brooks, 33-year-old Negro, was officially honored yesterday by the Port of New York Authority for showing courage in carrying two officers on the running boards of his truck to chase the holdup men.

Brooks—who drove off to work after the arrest and whose identity wasn't learned until the following day—said that he was more worried about the officers hanging on to his truck than himself.

Teacher Of Right Way Exhausts Melons

PORTALES, N.M. (AP)—Homer Parsons is a Samaritan—without watermelons.

Police caught five youngsters in his patch and he said he would have been glad to give them a melon if they had asked.

The five came back—with three friends.

Parsons, true to his word, gave them each a melon—including his last one.

Met Gets First Re-Do Since 1892

NEW YORK (AP)—New York theatergoers will get their initial look tomorrow night at the first interior changes made in the interior section of the Metropolitan Opera House since 1892.

The seating arrangement has been changed, providing less standing room and 116 more seats.

New seats and new carpeting also have been put in, and the floor has been inclined to permit a better view of the stage.

Opening at the opera house tomorrow night for a brief engagement is the British Sadler's Wells ballet.

Forgery Suspect Returns For Refund

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP)—A 26-year-old forgery suspect pressed his luck a little too far.

Officers said the man gave a department store cashier a worthless \$15 check to buy a cheap hat Thursday. He received several dollars in change.

Yesterday he returned to get a refund on that hat. That's when detectives took him to city jail.

Hull Supplants Mark Clark

WASHINGTON (AP)—Gen. John E. Hull, a desk officer for much of his 36-year military career, leaves the Pentagon soon to command troops along the uneasy truce line in Korea.

The tall, strapping Okla. was named by President Eisenhower yesterday to succeed Gen. Mark Clark as supreme United Nations commander in the Far East. Clark retires Oct. 30.

Hull, now 58, has not seen combat since World War I when, as a junior infantry officer, he won the Silver Star for gallantry during the Alsace-Marne offensive.

His World War II years were spent in the less dramatic but vital jobs of handling operations for all the far flung overseas theaters. He worked closely in this work with Gen. George C. Marshall, then Army chief of staff.

Hull became something of an expert on atomic weapons five years ago when he had charge of atom bomb tests conducted at Eniwetok atoll in the Pacific.

He also is given credit for playing an important role in the development of the Army's giant atomic cannon, one of the world's newest and most potent weapons.

For the past two years, Hull has been vice chief of staff of the Army.

Unlike many of his fellow general officers, Hull is not a West Pointer. He entered the Army through the reserve in 1917 shortly after graduating from Miami University at Oxford, Ohio.

After garrison duty and time spent in both attending and instructing at Army schools during peace time, just before Pearl Harbor he came to Washington to work with the war plans division of the General Staff.

He held top administrative posts in Washington until July, 1946, when he took command of Army forces in the Middle Pacific, including Hawaii.

He returned to Washington early in 1949 to set up weapons evaluation for the secretary of defense.

Hull got his fourth star in August 1951, when he was elevated to vice chief from deputy chief of staff for administration.

Idaho Power Admits Asking Certificates

BOISE, Idaho (AP)—T. E. Roach, president of Idaho Power Co., acknowledged Friday that his firm has applied for rapid amortization certificates on two proposed Snake River dams, but denied it would mean a write-off of taxes.

Roach's statement was in reference to a letter in which Sen. Warren Magnuson (D-Wash.) sent defense Mobilizer Arthur S. Fleming asking if Idaho Power had asked for a tax write-off on the two projects.

Magnuson, an ardent backer of federal development of the Snake, said such tax write-offs "constitute a subsidy of shocking magnitude."

Minor Earthquake Hits St. Louis

ST. LOUIS (AP)—A minor earthquake rumbled in the St. Louis area yesterday, causing widespread alarm among residents but only minor damage.

Windows rattled, dishes shook and canned goods fell from the shelves. A few cases of cracks in plaster were reported.

St. Louis University reported a "very minor earthquake lasting very few seconds."

School officials estimated the center of the disturbance near Cahokia Creek, three miles west of Edwardsville, Ill., and anywhere from five to 15 miles below the surface.

One-Cent Check Balances Account

WEST SENECa, N. Y. (AP)—A one-cent check has balanced the million-dollar tax account of this town near Buffalo.

William H. Wershin, the receiver of taxes, wrote the check to correct a shortage in his \$1,533,354.84 collections.

County Treasurer Frank A. Slade had informed him his returns showed only \$1,233,354.83.

For 24 years, Wershin had balanced his books to the penny.

He mailed Slade the one-cent check, using a three-cent stamp.

Railroad Reduces Game By Two

MICHIGAN, Mich. (AP)—Sportsmen scratched a deer and a bear today from their list of targets for the 1953 hunting season.

The deer tried to race across railroad tracks ahead of a speeding train. He didn't make it.

A bear, feasting on the deer's carcass, refused a short while later to give the right-of-way to another train. He will not be around to get shot at, either.
