Along Nature's Trail

The jack rabbit is one of the most familiar mammals of the Klamath Basin, however, I wonder how keen has been the observation of many residents to take notice that there are two species of these animals in the area. Both our jack rabbits are about the same size and in summer pelage they are gray in color, yet they are easily distinguishable from one another in that the tail of one is white, the other, black.

The first of these two jack rabbits is the Western White-tailed jack rabbit; the other is the Oregon jack rabbit. The Western White-tailed jack rabbit is noted in varying number practically all over the open country of Oregon east of the Cascades. They range over the high plateau in grassy and sagebrush country and find their way to the open slopes of the mountains above timber line.

In general, however, the range in which they are found in this abundance is the so-called "Transition Life Zone"—the great tract of country that are dominated by the Western Yellow Pine.

The scientific name of this species, in case you are interested, is *Lepus townsendi townsendi* (Bachman). Normally the rabbit would be known as Townsend's Hare had it not received the popular name of the Western White-tailed jack rabbit. The rabbit was first collected by J. K. Townsend at Walla Walla, Wash., in 1834, while Bachman described, and named the species in 1839.

This jack rabbit, like the other hares when in full winter pelage, is generally pure white, except for the edges and back of ear tips and eyelids which are black. In the low, warm valleys, however, many of these animals do not turn white in winter but become slightly lighter than in their summer attire—a sort of frosted gray.

Townsend in 1834 noted that the animals around Walla Walla did not turn white during the winter. Vernon Bailey has written about this jack rabbit as follows: "It certainly gives the hunter something the same thrill as a white-tailed deer bounding from cover or the prairie chicken bursting from the grass, and at first glance the rabbit seems twice its real size as it bounds from cover with a scintillating flash. With their puffy white tails and the white and black backs of their erect ears showing as they bound high and far, they are as remarkable for their conspicuous appearance as they are for their baffling invisibility when crouched with tails and ears down, and eyes half shut.

Their speed is about that of the black-tailed "jacks," and usually permits them to escape from all native enemies in a fair race, though not from the greyhound or from some of the larger winged hunters.

These rabbits are active all seasons of the year and their dense coats of pure white fur in winter enable them to withstand the coldest weather and the deepest snows. They burrow deep in the snowdrifts and dig long tunnels open at either end to serve as avenues of escape. In these burrows they can sit during the day, screened from the eye of the eagle and the larger hawks soaring overhead. They have many enemies from the coyote and bobcat to the eagles, hawks and owls.

In summer their food consists of dainty grasses and wild clovers along with a variety of other tender green plants. However, it would appear that grass forms the bulk of their food. In winter they eat the buds, twigs and bark of bushes and young trees. There is an ever source of winter food available to them as the increasing depth of snow serves to lift them to higher levels and brings fresh supplies of food within their reach. In times of scarcity, the tips of sagebrush, rabbitbrush and such unpalatable browse is eaten, but this is only when the more acceptable kinds of food are either exhausted or are not available.

Bailey mentions that prairie and other fruit bushes and trees are generally favorites as a source of food, along with clover, alfalfa, grains and garden vegetables. In some cases, standing crops and haystacks are seriously reduced. On the high plains of the Columbia, where they appear to reach their greatest abundance in numbers, there are times when they become almost as numerous as the black-tailed "jacks" on the lower areas. At such times these animals do considerable mischief in grainfields, alfalfa, and clover meadows and even gardens, but

Outward Harmony Reigns Among Demos Against Republicans, General Motors

CHICAGO (AP)—Resurgent Democrats boomed a multiple-voiced challenge to the Republicans today as the minority party opened a national rally here with its inner frictions hidden under an outward coat of harmony.

Former Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson of Illinois, the 1952 presidential nominee, and former President Truman led a list of Democratic notables who shouted defiance to the Eisenhower administration and promised a fighting congressional campaign next year on foreign policy, farm and big business issues.

Stevenson told a rally of Democratic women last night that "it begins to look as if we might need a crusade and I would be happy to lead it."

In this allusion to President Eisenhower's "crusade" of last year, the former Illinois Governor came closer than before to indicating his availability for the party's 1956 nomination.

Perhaps with this possibility in mind, Truman has introduced Stevenson as the "No. 1 Democrat in the United States."

Quickly Stevenson replied he didn't think there would ever be another "Mr. Democrat" so long as Truman was alive.

But at this meeting, Stevenson is the unmistakable star despite the presence here of Democrats from almost every faction in the party except Southern bakers like Govs. James P. Byrnes of South Carolina and Allan Shivers of Texas.

Truman, who lunched and dined with Stevenson yesterday sounded a call to party members to "go home and get in position so the Democrats will do what is necessary to save the country."

The former President remarked at another point that "there never is anything but harmony in the Democratic party."

Truman has urged party members

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bers to take off the gloves in criticizing President Eisenhower and his administration.

National Chairman Stephen Mitchell, not quite willing to go so far, voiced sharp criticism at a news conference of Democrats who might seek election to Congress on Eisenhower's coattails.

Although Democratic leaders in Congress generally have contended the President's proposals got approval of this year's Congress only because of Democratic support, Mitchell said he doesn't believe coattail riding will work.

"I don't know if Eisenhower will be able to help elect anybody to Congress in another year," he declared.

Rep. Rayburn of Texas, the House minority leader, predicted that next year the Democrats will be criticizing the Republicans "not for what they have done, but for what they haven't done."

Sen. Monroney (D-Okla.) said the minority party will "try to give the country back to the people and not to General Motors." The latter was a reference to the statement of Secretary of Defense Wilson that was good for the country was good for General Motors, and vice versa.

All of this firing at the Republicans served to distract attention temporarily from the party's own inner troubles, scheduled to come to a boil later in the day in a series of panel sessions preceding a \$100 a plate dinner tonight.

Sen. Douglas (D-Ill.), billed as the principal speaker, planned an attack on what he contends is big business influence on the Eisenhower administration. Douglas was to share time with 11 other party notables, including Stevenson and Truman.

The internal strife within the party centered around proposed efforts by dissident Southern members to do something about the so-called loyalty pledge adopted at last year's national convention.

Gov. Hugh White of Mississippi, a late arrival, was looked upon as the most likely author of any attack on the pledge. It could only come as a resolution, which Rayburn said there was doubt that the conference has authority to act upon in any event.
