Douks Parade Around Again

KRESTOVA, B.C. (AP)—A week-end that included home burnings and a parade of naked people ended with only the light of several flickering kerosene lamps to mark the dwellings of Doukhobors in this odd community.

During Sunday, some 50 men and women staged a parade in the nude, starting and ending at a crude meeting hall, a converted barn, where they had held a meeting to consider the arrest of 148 Sons of Freedom Doukhobors last Wednesday.

Five homes were put to the torch earlier, four Saturday at the headquarters of Freedomite activity and one at nearby Glade Sunday. The burnings followed the pattern of "Sons" activity in their long quarrel with man-made laws.

The nude parade, nothing new in this area, consisted largely of elderly persons who did a circuit of the village which comprises one unpaved street and a few clusters of unpainted homes.

They chanted Russian hymns and prayed for the welfare of the 148 who are in jail at Vancouver on charges of contributing to juvenile delinquency by parading in the nude.

Mrs. Annie Podmeroff, from her place in procession, explained to a female reporter that part of their demonstration was a plea for the return of their leader, Stefan Sorokin, bearded immigrant generally recognized as spiritual leader of the group who is in Uruguay.

Freedomites believe he is trying to organize a new home for their unhappy people, who legend says, will never live happily in one place for more than 40 or 50 years. They have been in Canada since the beginning of the century, and unrest among them is common.

Lucille Ball Glad She's Clear

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Lucille Ball and Desi Arnaz went back to work Monday preparing another "I Love Lucy" show for television, glad that the storm has subsided after disclosure that she once registered to vote the Communist ticket.

After reports of the matter had circulated, the House Un-American Activities Committee last Saturday released the transcript of Miss Ball's testimony before a committee investigator in Hollywood last Sept. 4.

During the questioning the TV actress admitted that in 1936, under the urging of her grandfather, the late Fred C. Hunt, she registered to vote the Communist ticket. Miss Ball said her grandfather was a Socialist and that she and her family tried to keep him happy in his declining years.

Miss Ball said that as she recalled she didn't vote that year. However, committee investigator William Wheeler said her affidavit or registration showed that she voted in the primary that year. "I am not a Communist now," Miss Ball testified. "I never have been. I never wanted to be."

Weeper's Trial Being Pushed

TEHRAN, Iran (AP)—Iran's pro-royalist government pushed plans Monday for a court martial for former Premier Mohammed Mossadegh. A government spokesman said the army court's members already were questioning the aged premier and that his trial would not be secret "unless the court decides otherwise."

The Shah officially ordered the court martial Sunday. His action removed Mossadegh from the jurisdiction of Tehran's military governor and formally put him in the Army's hands.

Reds See Truce Hopes in Indochina

TOKYO (AP)—The Communist Peiping radio hinted broadly Monday that a negotiated truce is possible in the long and bloody Indochina war.

The demand for peace from people throughout the world "forced the American aggressors to stop the war in Korea," the broadcast declared. "Their power can force the imperialists to abandon their arms in Vietnam."

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More Clergy Denials Drawn

NEW YORK (AP)—A congressional report on alleged Communist activities of some clergymen has drawn new criticism and denials from members of the ministry.

The comments fell upon the House Un-American Activities Committee, which last Friday released testimony taken at secret hearings in New York in July.

Witnesses—three of whom said they were former Communists and successful examples of red infiltration of religion—were quoted as saying the Communists plotted to plant hundreds of followers among the clergy. The three ex-Reds are Manning Johnson, Benjamin Orlow and Joseph Zack Kornfeder, all of New York.

Among those named in the testimony as involved in such a plot were the Rev. Dr. Harry F. Ward, the Rev. John Haynes Holmes and the late Rabbi Stephen S. Wise and Judah Magnes.

Sunday in New York two prominent Jewish leaders—Dr. Israel Goldstein, president of the American Jewish Congress, and Rabbi Maurice N. Eisendrath, president of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations—called "fantastic" the testimony concerning Rabbi Wise and Magnes.

The Goldstein-Eisendrath statement added that to charge Rabbi Wise and Magnes "with having taken instruction from the Communist Party and having collaborated with it is a contemptible and vile desecration."

The Rev. Mr. Holmes, pastor of the community church at Park Avenue and 35th Street in New York City, denied any collaboration with Communists in a statement he issued Sunday night at Kennebunk Beach, Maine. He said any statement to that effect "are absolutely false."

Dr. Ward sent a letter Sunday to Rep. Velde (R-IL), chairman of the House Un-American Activities Committee. Dr. Ward on Friday issued a statement calling the committee testimony about his alleged Red activities absolutely false.

Many of those clergymen named in the committee testimony issued denials Saturday. A few could not be reached for comment.

DANES WITHDRAW
COPENHAGEN, Denmark (AP)—Denmark resigned from the United Nations committee on non-self-governing territories Monday, declaring that Greenland—her only colony—is now part of Danish state territory.

Funny Why Crooner Ray Just By-Passed Hollywood

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—It's just about a year ago that Johnny Ray first came to Hollywood to make the biggest splash since the 1938 flood. Helped by Marion Davis' famous party, the cryin' crooner broke all attendance records before or since at Ciro's. And the figures are not press agent inspired. I was there.

Thus, it is puzzling why Ray by-passed Hollywood on his current trip west. He is quite bitter about it.

"I may play here again but right now I don't care if I never do. I thought I had made friends out here but the same people turned out to be my nastiest detractors. Man, I don't know what I could have done to make enemies out here but I sure got them."

He declined to name names but commented:

"I guess I'm not thick skinned enough to ignore what is said and printed about me."

Johnny denounced stories which reflected on his moral behavior and hinted that the gossip spread about him helped to cause the breakup of his marriage to Marilyn Morrison after seven months.

"I'm really crazy about Marilyn yet and I'm sorry that our marriage didn't work out. She used to hear all these stories about me from people I thought were my friends. I know she didn't want to believe them but I guess they upset her. They couldn't do otherwise."

"But you got to work at a marriage to make it last. In this crazy showbusiness world and I never got a chance to work at it."

"And then maybe I made some mistakes. I seldom drink except when I get real confused. Maybe that hurt some because I confuse easily."

His wife used to travel with him on the road but had to give it up after a miscarriage.

Johnny played the Del Mar Hotel here one weekend and then by-passed Hollywood to go to Las Vegas for an engagement. He scored heavily there too, aided, he

admits, by an audience that felt like crying with him after losing their wads at the gambling tables. His new act features a lot of rhythm songs plus his tent meeting histrionics. Audiences, he says, still want him to cry.

Johnny maintains that his crying is not an act, that the songs affect him emotionally.

Detroit Studies Sales of "Continental" Studebaker

DETROIT—Studebaker, which was a big factor in setting early-postwar auto styles, may now be setting the pattern for the next few years.

Its 1946 model, designed with lavish use of glass by Raymond Loewy, was the first completely redesigned postwar car. The South Bend, Ind., concern made no further major change until its current 1953's; with these it introduced low, rakish "Continental" styling. Also designed by Loewy, the new model cost \$27 million to introduce, double the 1946 cost.
