

New Deal Wing Of Democrats Wins In New York Primary

NEW YORK (AP)—The New Deal wing of the Democratic party in New York administered a resounding defeat to the conservative branch in scoring a near clean sweep of city primary elections yesterday.

Manhattan Borough President Robert F. Wagner Jr. rolled up almost a 2 to 1 margin over incumbent Vincent R. Impellitteri for the nomination for mayor.

Wagner's candidacy also won nomination in the two contests for other city-wide offices and in three of four contested races for nomination as borough president.

With returns totaled from 4,260 of the city's 4,392 election districts, Wagner led Impellitteri by 335,413 to 176,003.

The election represented a major triumph for such nationally known Democrats as Rep. Franklin D. Roosevelt Jr., Sen. Herbert H. Lehman and Averell Harriman, former mutual security director.

School Signup Beats Forecast

"The top prediction made last spring regarding school enrollment was to match last year's enrollment this year—but the numbers have gone way over the prediction," Arnold Gralapp, public school supervisor said this morning.

Enrollment according to schools at the close of the past week totaled 2,459 in elementary schools, against 2,387 last year; 1,322 in the high school against 1,257 in 1952.

A breakdown into schools follows: Conger, 218; Fairview, 340; Front, 129; Junior High, 277; Mills, 714; Pelican, 271; Riverside, 160; Roosevelt, 360.

At Klamath Union High School, as of Sept. 10, 423 freshmen were enrolled; 374 sophomores; 313 juniors; 212 seniors.

"The numbers are still climbing," Gralapp said.

The enrollment report was given at a meeting of the Board of Education Monday evening.

Other business on the agenda concerned individual teachers in the schools. The Board accepted the resignation of Mrs. Walter Smith, first-grade teacher at Mills, and approved the election of Mrs. Rose Wedge as second-grade teacher at Fremont. Mrs. Wedge is a graduate of State Teachers College, Bridgeport, Mass.

In School District 2, three elections were made: Mrs. Carole Ro-maine, home making; George Keough, Spanish and English; Roy Tidwell, Wildcat assistant coach. Keough has his M.S. from Western College of Education in Colorado and at present is working on his doctorate at Stanford University.

The audit report was distributed to board members, and according to Gralapp, "finances are excellent."

Gym bleachers have been provided for the high school to increase seating space at basketball games.

Americanization classes for adults will continue at the high school this winter under Donald Ross.

Plans for a stairway from the west entrance of the high school on Alameda have been submitted to Architect Howard Perrin. Bids will be called for soon.

Driver education classes will get underway promptly on Alameda, the board announced.

School board members are invited to attend a regional meeting of the State School Board Members Association to be held Oct. 5 in Medford. This is the first regional meeting the association has held.

The outcome appeared to curb an attempted political comeback by former Democratic National Chairman James A. Farley.

The voter turnout was surprisingly light, although control of both the city and state party machinery was at stake. The total Democratic vote ran well below the record 800,000 cast in 1937.

The victory apparently cemented control of the city and state party leadership in the hands of the Manhattan (Tammany Hall) and Bronx Borough chieftains.

Impellitteri won as an independent in 1950 after being snubbed when the party considered a candidate to complete the unexpired term of resigned Mayor William O'Dwyer.

This year, however, the five boroughs which make up the city split in choosing a candidate. The conservative wing, including leaders of Brooklyn, Queens and Staten Island, backed Impellitteri.

In the beginning this shaped up as a test of strength for the late Bronx political boss Ed Flynn, who had been chief spokesman for the city and state party many years.

Flynn died last month, however, and this threw open the position of chief spokesman regardless of the primary's outcome.

Farley, who split with President Franklin D. Roosevelt over the third term issue in 1940, pitched in on Impellitteri's side.

Regardless of whom the Wagner faction chooses to succeed Flynn as national committeeman, it seemed likely that he will be a powerful voice in the state's 94-vote delegation to the next presidential convention.

This faction is also expected to dominate the selection of a Democratic candidate for governor next year.

These developments could prove of great significance to the political future of Roosevelt.

He has been mentioned as a possible candidate for the presidential nomination in 1956 and is widely rumored as a gubernatorial possibility next year.

In the Nov. 3 general election, Wagner, who is the son of the late author of the New Deal Labor Relations Act, must face three other candidates who were nominated without opposition today.

They are: Harold Riegelman, the Republican designee; Rudolph Halley, the Liberal party choice; and Guyford T. McAvoy, nominee of the left-wing American Labor party.

Halley became known to millions of television viewers as quizmaster for the Kefauver Crime Committee two years ago. He is the outgoing president of the City Council.

The city's registered Democratic voter strength of 2,135,000 outnumbers the Republicans by more than 2-to-1. The Liberal and Labor parties have only fractional registrations.

All four party nominees for Manhattan borough president are Negroes.

Falls Man Named Realtor Director

Vice presidents: Taylor W. Treese, secretary; and W. Thomas Stoddard, treasurer.

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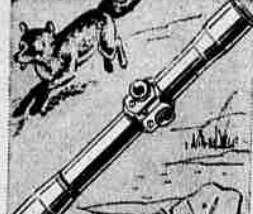

"Splicing Your Home Movies"

You've got your vacation movies back, or are awaiting the return of the film; and now it's time to consider, "what about splicing home movies?"

Splicing (cutting film and cementing strips together into long rolls) is both interesting and easy. There are numerous reasons for splicing film. You may want to rearrange scenes to give them a story sequence. Or you may just want to combine a number of films for a longer show.

Whatever your reason for splicing films you will find it easy and inexpensive. The equipment need is simple and varies in price from \$1.80 to \$14.95. Projectors such as the Keystone Model 109 have the splicer unit built right in their bases.

More elaborate equipment consists of three separate pieces:

1. The splicer, used for the actual cutting and cementing of the film.
2. The movie rewinds, geared cranks used for winding film from one reel to another.
3. The movie editor or viewer, a miniature screen on which the film is projected for easy viewing and selecting of scenes to be cut and spliced.

As for what size reels to use—the main consideration is time. If you want a longer show—so you can sit back and admire your "masterpiece"—use a 300- to 400-foot reel. For shorter films, the smaller reels.

Below is a list of the show time for each size reel. You decide which suits your purpose best:

- 50-foot reel—4 1/2 minutes showing time (this is the reel size of new film).
- 200-foot reel—16 1/2 minutes showing time.
- 300-foot reel—25 minutes showing time.
- 400-foot reel—33 1/2 minutes showing time.

Splicing is fun when you relax and enjoy doing it. It's easy and increases the pleasure which is always yours in personal movies.
