Man Better After Plunge

NEWPORT, Ore. (AP) — James K. Mueller is recovering here from injuries suffered in a 250-foot car plunge from the Coast Highway last Thursday, freed from the delirium in which he cried out, "Dick, why do you want to kill me?"

And "Dick," his automobile agency partner, Richard E. Thomson, said from a jail cell he would be his own attorney when he appeared in Circuit Court Tuesday for a pre-sentence hearing.

Thomson pleaded guilty to a charge of assault with intent to kill. But he will call character witnesses when he goes up for sentencing, he said.

There was no clear indication of the motive. In his statement, Thomson said an "obsession hit me."

It happened as he and his partner were driving back from Portland early Thursday. He said he told Mueller to stop the car for he was becoming car sick. As the car slowed, he hit Mueller on the head with a length of pipe. The two men fought. Then, he said, he suddenly was worried, the fight stopped and he prepared to take the dare Mueller to a doctor.

But, he said, he lost control of the car, started down the steep bank 500 feet above the ocean at Cape Poulweather. He fell out 50 feet down. Mueller fell out on a ledge 350 feet down. The car then made the final plunge from a sheer cliff into the sea.

Thomson said he had no motive, just the "obsession," and denied a \$10,000 insurance policy the partners had on each other's life was a factor.

GI Held In Oregon Death

MOUNTAIN HOME, Idaho (AP) — A 31-year-old enlisted man who told officers he may have killed Alvin Karpis, a notorious gangster, is being held in protective custody at Mountain Home Air Force Base.

Ly. Lyle Harrell of Oregon State police said Thursday the man being held describes himself as a friend of Karpis, whose nude body was found on a sandbar on the Oregon side of the Snake River Sept. 8. Speilcher had been beaten, his arms and legs bound and his mouth taped.

Harrell said the enlisted man, whose identity was not disclosed, claims that two nights ago he was attacked at the edge of Mountain Home.

The man was quoted as saying he was a possible mental case. The Oregon State policeman said during questioning about Speilcher's death the man said "It's possible I may have done the killing myself."

The Mountain Home airman has been taken to a psychiatrist for further examination.

Airforce Gives Sergeants Boost

RAMSTEIN, Germany (AP) — The U. S. Air Force, reversing its usual drive toward the newest in warfare, set out Thursday to turn the clock back to the "good old days" when sergeants were the backbone of the service.

The Air Force began a campaign "to increase the participation of non-commissioned officers in the administration of the command, and their responsibility to lead and train enlisted airmen."

Opening the drive in the 12th Air Force headquarters here, Maj. Gen. Dean C. Strother deplored the fact that "the stature of the average NCO before the second World War has suffered through the war-inspired rapid expansion of the Air Force."

"Why, back before the war," Strother told a committee of seven NCOs, "a newly commissioned officer depended on the experience and devotion to duty of the veteran NCO to put him on the right track."

Two Drowned Bodies Found

KETCHIKAN, Alaska (AP) — The remains of two women, grisly evidence of the tragedy that befell five persons in a plane which disappeared Aug. 17, were found yesterday on the beach 35 miles southeast of here.

One was the body of Mrs. Ellis Hall, wife of the wealthy 54-year-old Albuquerque, N. M., oilman who piloted the plane when it left here on a flight to Bellingham, Wash. The other was identified only as one of the couple's two daughters.

Another of the daughters, Hall and Patrick Hibben, 17, still are missing.

The Hall girls were Joann, 20, daughter of Mrs. Hall, and Elizabeth, 21, Hall's daughter, both by previous marriages. Mrs. Hall was a former Democratic national committeewoman for New Mexico.

Man Jailed For Month of Sundays

RENO (AP) — Richard B. Ehler is going to jail for a month of Sundays.

Justice Laurence Layman, who found the 38-year-old car washer guilty of reckless driving, sentenced Ehler to spend every Sunday in jail from Sept. 20 through April 18.

The judge spread the sentence out so Ehler could keep his job and avoid hardship on his family.

Date of Beatrice Spared 2nd Chance

PUSAN, Korea (AP) — Pvt. Edmund J. Modoff of Boston, a statistician with the Port Transportation Division here tells this on himself:

Last April at Camp Breckenridge, Ky., he had a date with a WAC corporal named Beatrice. He told Beatrice he wouldn't mind being sent to the Far East.

Two days later he was on his way to Korea.

Beatrice, it seems, was a special orders clerk in the adjutant general's office at Breckenridge.

Rat-Poison Killer Hanged

MANCHESTER, England (AP) — Mrs. Louisa Merrifield, 46, went to the gallows today for murdering her 79-year-old employer with rat poison. She was the first woman hanged in Britain in four years.

Mrs. Merrifield was caretaker nurse to Mrs. Sarah Ann Ricketts, an aged widow who died shortly after naming Mrs. Merrifield a beneficiary in her will.

Mrs. Merrifield's husband, Alfred, 70, was accused with his wife but was released after a jury failed to agree on a verdict in his case.

Red Writer Sees All POWs Returned Except Refusers

PANMUNJOM (AP) — Red Correspondent Wilfred Burchett said today the Communists have returned all Allied war prisoners "except the handful which won't go back."

The Australian-born correspondent for the French newspaper L'Humanite said Communist officials are carefully checking a list of 3,404 men, including 944 Americans, the U. N. Command says were prisoners but were not returned.

Capt. James A. Van Fleet Jr., son of the former 8th Army commander, definitely is not a prisoner, said Burchett, who often speaks unofficially for the Communists.

"I made an exhaustive search of prison camps in North Korea for him," Burchett said. "We knew a B26 crashed in flames that night he disappeared and all the men were lost."

Young Van Fleet was piloting a B26 bomber when he failed to return from a mission over North Korea in April, 1952.

Burchett said most of the names on the Allied list of 3,404 missing are there because of "faulty book-keeping" by the Allies.

The Reds have not officially replied to the U. N. demand for an accounting of the missing men.

The correspondent presumably did not refer to a group of airmen he acknowledged earlier were held by Red China. The Communists claim all were shot down over Manchuria.

Burchett identified among this group Capt. Harold Fischer Jr., of Iowa City, Iowa, a double U.N. jet ace whose name appears on U. N. list.

Allied airmen were not permitted to cross the border between North Korea and Manchuria, but
