Returned Prisoner Relates Snow Does Not Kill Lice Harbored in Winter Clothing

The horror of Three Fingers Ridge, the lack of medical care, the terrible, infected wounds, the lack of sanitation, the suspense of listening to creeping Chinese enemies and crawling lice have all been left behind in the hills of Korea by Hospitalman Third Class Ted Paillette, 20, of the US Marines, but he'll never forget his experiences.

As a US soldier, Ted is home from a Communist prison camp and has already started putting back the pounds he lost while he waited years in a mud hut for release. He weighed 180 pounds when he went overseas in Sept. 1952, 118 when released after a diet of rice and potato water.

Ted, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry B. Paillette, 2007 Wantland St., is the youngest son in a family of eight children. He arrived last week by boat at San Francisco where he was met by members of his family.

He went into the service Nov. 2, 1950 and was sent overseas in Sept. 1952, going directly to Korea and the front lines, seeing his first ac-

tion in the Samichon Valley. For 13 days—soon after he ar-

Korean Assembly Meets at Seoul

SEOUL (AP) — The South Korean National Assembly today met in Seoul for the first time in three years.

A hundred ten assemblymen of the 182-man legislature attended the first session held at the war scarred capitol since the outbreak of the Korean War in June, 1950.

President Syngman Rhee did not attend or send a message.

An assembly spokesman said today's meeting was "only the continuance of the 16th session and there is not much new."

The legislature met during the war years in the provisional capital of Pusan.

Convict Charged With Murder

HUNTSVILLE, Tex. (AP)—A State Prison inmate serving a 90-year robbery sentence is charged with murder as a result of a fatal stabbing at the Wynne State Prison Farm yesterday.

The charge was filed against Charles G. Doholow, 44, after the death of Marcus Lewis Dennard, 59, Fort Worth.

Dennard, serving 12 years for burglary from Tarrant County, was stabbed with a homemade knife in one of the tanks (dormitories) set aside for the physically handicapped or ailing.

cats and dogs, brought by the Chinese, cooked in thick yellow grease. They were always hungry and though stomachs revolted at the fare, "a hungry man eats what he can get," Ted said.

They were given lots of Communist literature, written in Russian and Chinese. They saw no American papers or magazines.

Two suits of light summer clothing were issued by the Chinese, and one padded outfit in winter that harbored lice. Many of the boys put these suits in the snow in the hopes of killing the crawlers but heat soon revived them. They made their own socks of old T-shirts and washed these in small pans without soap. They had no shears, no razors, or toothbrushes. Tennis shoes were issued for footwear.

In November of the year he was captured, Ted's parents were notified by the war department he was missing in action. They heard in May after the first Korean prisoners were released, that Ted was living. No other news came from him, nor did Ted hear from his family.

Ted praised the Red Cross blood program that saves the lives of many fighting men. He saw both plasma and serum albumin, a dehydrated derivative being used by medics when men are under fire.

Speed with which injured are moved by helicopter is little short of miraculous, Ted said. Flyers went in under heavy fire, picked up five or six wounded and flew to first aid stations, reaching places that appeared inaccessible.

There were American prisoners in British and American prisoners in the camp where he was located and his "next door neighbor" was Lowell Snapp, Merrill.

Returning enlisted men are serving out the remainder of their enlistment periods with choice of locations nearest home made by the returnees. Ted has asked for Tongue Point at Astoria and will be discharged next July 2.
