Gen. Dean Asks Clemency For Pair Who Sold Him Out

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — Maj. Gen. William F. Dean is asking clemency for the two Korean civilians accused of selling him into three years of Communist captivity for \$5 rewards.

Dean told newsmen just before a homecoming celebration last night that he has cabled President Syngman Rhee of South Korea, asking him to free the two.

"I don't know if they are the ones (who turned me in) but if they are they should be freed any way," he said. "A lot of people were under a lot of pressure at that time."

Dean was captured in August, 1950, about a month after he disappeared near Taejeon, South Korea, while rallying stragglers of his overhauled 24th Division in the action that won him the Medal of Honor.

Dean also disclosed that he was taken into Manchuria by the Reds for three days in late 1950 when the Allies had all but crushed the North Korean army.

The tall, 54-year-old soldier was welcomed back by hometown citizens who knew him here 30 years ago as an auto patrolman "Wild Bill" Dean.

He was given a standing ovation by some 1,500 people at a civic reception in the Berkeley Community Theater.

A pretty blonde coed gave him lifetime passes to all athletic contests of the University of California his alma mater.

The welcome, originally planned to include a torch light parade and massed bands, was scaled down by request of Dean. The general, arrived back in America by plane Tuesday night.

Half an hour before last night's reception, Dean met personal friends and newsmen. He appeared much more rested and relaxed than on his arrival.

Speaker after speaker recalled Dean's student days here after his father moved west from Carlyle, Ill.

Dean replied: "The memory of all those happy years was a sustaining beacon."

Constant and comforting companions which helped me retain my balance. Without them I would have been lost."

Winding up his brief speech, Dean turned to his wife, Mildred, on the stage, and then nodded to his mother and daughter, seated in the audience.

"We POWs didn't suffer as much as our loved ones," he declared.
