Farrans Trial Delay Seen

Judge Ralph M. Holman of Oregon City, slated to preside in Circuit Court here to rule on a motion to dismiss a child molesting charge against Lyle M. Farrans, former Gem Stadium grounds keeper, told Herald and News Monday he may not be able to appear here for three weeks.

Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg last week disqualified himself to act further in the case. Farrans is charged with contributing to the delinquency of a nine-year-old girl. Judge Vandenberg dismissed a jury that became hopelessly deadlocked when Farrans was tried Sept. 10.

When District Attorney Frank Alderson filed a motion to dismiss the case, Judge Vandenberg disqualified himself.

Judge Holman was named by Chief Justice Earl C. Latourette of the Oregon Supreme Court to supplant Judge Vandenberg in the case.

CHICAGO (AP) — Fine weather over the week end brought in the largest number of hogs for a Monday since June 22. Prices buckled 25 to 75 cents a hundredweight in the adjustment to the supply. Cattle were steady to 50 cents lower and sheep steady to \$1.00 higher.

Most butcher weight hogs sold from \$23.00 to \$25.15, several loads and lots topping at \$25.25. Sows took \$21.50 to \$23.75 mainly but a top price touched \$24.00. Clearance was good.

Good to prime steers and yearlings usually sold from \$19.00 to \$28.50 but a few loads in the upper price register made \$29.00 to \$30.00. Good to prime heifers were worth \$18.00 to \$23.50.

Cows sold downward from \$13.00, bulls from \$15.75, and choice vealers from \$20.00.

A load of choice and prime shorn spring lambs topped at \$21.00 with good and choice kinds getting \$18.00 to \$20.00. A load of choice and prime fall-born yearlings made \$17.00 while ewes sold at \$6.00 and below.

Estimated arrivals included 10,000 hogs, 19,000 cattle, 500 calves, and 3,000 sheep.

Bevan Wants Churchill Quit

MARGATE, England (AP)—Aneurin Bevan, fiery leader of the opposition Labor party's left wing, wants recently ailing Prime Minister Churchill to get on with his country's business or get out of office.

Bevan, who apparently has reached a truce for the present with his more moderate Laborite colleagues, trained his guns on the ageing Conservative Prime Minister as the Labor party opened its annual conference.

Churchill recently took an enforced rest from his official duties vacationing on the French Riviera after having taken up the reins of government again. He is expected to return to London Wednesday.

As 3,000 Labor delegates cheered, Bevan at a party meeting yesterday paid homage to Churchill's call last May for high level Big Three talks with Russia, but added:

"We think it is a disaster that the initiative started last May has not been followed up. And we say that the future of the human race cannot be jeopardized because the British Prime Minister is sick and that if Churchill is unable to do his duty, he should resign."

"We say, therefore, to the Conservative party that if you cannot get leaders who are capable of leading this country in the councils of the world, clear out."

Skeleton Found; Aug. 9 Death Date

PORTLAND (AP) — Police found the skeleton of a man in the suburbs of northeast Portland Sunday and tentatively identified it as that of Jerry Bryant, 24.

Bryant disappeared from his nearby home Aug. 9. He took a shotgun with him. The same kind of gun was found near the body.

Florida's Governor Shows Improvement

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—Gov. Dan McCarty is showing improvement in his bout with pneumonia but is still on the critical list in a hospital here.

Attending physicians reported late last night that the 41-year-old governor's condition was less critical than on Saturday when he ran a temperature of 99.2 and his heart action became irregular.

At last report, McCarty's temperature was normal and his heart rhythm had become steady again. He is still under the oxygen tent in which he was placed Sept. 22.

Administration May Request Freeing Of Atom Information

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Eisenhower administration probably will ask Congress next year for authority to give America's allies some secret atomic information as an aid to the Western defense buildup.

Administration officials are reported to feel that development of the defense of Western Europe requires disclosure of more information.

The whole question has been under study and debate in the government since before the Eisenhower administration took over in January.

The decision probably rests primarily with the Joint Chiefs of Staff, but it involves participation of the White House, State Department and Atomic Energy Commission.

Dixie Leader Against Aid

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Russell (D-Ga.) said today he will support "reasonable" foreign military aid requests in the next Congress but wants this country to get out of the economic assistance field.

The Georgia Democrat, unofficial leader of a Southern Democratic bloc in the Senate, said in an interview he wants military aid limited to those countries which show concrete ability and willingness to help rearm themselves.

"I have a strong feeling, and I am sure it is shared by many of my colleagues, that we ought to get out of the field of giving economic aid to foreign countries," Russell said.

His views on this score coincided largely with opinions voiced previously by Senators Knowland of California, the Senate Republican leader, and Lyndon Johnson of Texas, the Senate Democratic chief.

Russell, a member of the Senate Appropriations and Armed Services committees, said it will be up to the Foreign Operations Administration to lay before Congress proof that each nation for which it asks aid is doing its full share toward rearmament.

"We can't afford to assume the responsibility for rearming any country, no matter how vital that country is to Western defenses," Russell said. "We must have concrete evidence that the individual country concerned is putting forth its full efforts in its own behalf."

Russell said he is interested in learning how much the United States is putting up in a proposed billion-dollar outlay for the manufacture of ammunition in Western Europe. North Atlantic Treaty Organization headquarters announced this program last Friday, but the amount of the U. S. contribution was not divulged.

"It would certainly be carrying things too far for us to pay the total cost of manufacturing ammunition abroad," Russell said.

"Instead of entering this kind of a program where we buy the ammunition they make and then give it back to them, it would be wise to encourage our allies to make their own ammunition."

"They have the manpower and materials to do it and we have been furnishing them the machines."

Under certain conditions, this government may provide nonweapon atomic information to friendly nations, and it was learned over the weekend that it may furnish Belgium with technical help toward developing an atomic power plant for industrial uses.

As far as information is concerned, Allied headquarters in Europe announced last April that groups of Allied officers would be given atomic information necessary for military planning and operations. But responsible informants here said such information can be provided to them—essential information which has been publicly released—is not adequate for strategic planning and for training purposes.
