Grains

CHICAGO (AP) — Soybeans enjoyed a brisk demand on the board of trade Tuesday, the rest of the market had a pretty steady look, particularly toward the finish.

Buying of soybeans followed a Commerce Department report of smaller stocks of beans at mills than a year ago. Beans could not hold their best gains, which at one time extended to more than 3 cents.

Wheat moved ahead with beans at one time on hopes of export business and a slight pick up in flour demand. The bread grain retreated late in the session. Feed grains, particularly corn, had a few weak spots.

Wheat closed 1/4 lower to 1/2 higher, Dec 1 1/4-1/2, corn 1/4 lower, Dec 1 1/4-1/2, oats unchanged to 1/2, 2 cents lower, Dec 1 1/4-1/2, soybeans 1 1/4-2 1/2 higher, Nov. 2.62 1/2, and Lard 10 cents lower to 3 cents a hundred pounds higher, Oct. 15.30.

CHICAGO LIVESTOCK CHICAGO (AP) — Even though the country pulled back on hog supplies Tuesday, the market lost another 25 to 50 cents in slow trading.

Prime factors in the decline were this week's religious holidays and spotty work stoppages in packing plants. Many buyers were missing from the market faced with these prospects of poor demand.

Cattle were steady to 50 cents lower and sheep steady to 50 higher.

Most butcher weight hogs sold from \$24.00 to \$25.00 with about two loads topping at \$25.15. Sows took \$21.25 to \$23.50.

Good to prime steers ranged from \$19.50 to \$29.50 and choice and prime heifers from \$22.50 to \$26.00. Cows topped at \$12.50.

Spring lambs, grading good to prime brought \$18.00 to \$21.00 while good grade ewes ranged downward from \$5.50.

Salable receipts were estimated at 7,000 hogs, 5,000 cattle, 400 calves and 2,000 sheep.

SYRACUSE, N. Y. (AP) — The modest home of Peter L. Pratt has a gleaming new coat of paint, and 11 members of Local 31, Painters Union, have a glow in their hearts. Union officials learned recently that Pratt, who is over 70 and nearly blind, was trying to paint the house himself. He relied on his sense of touch to tell what had been painted.

One morning after Pratt had left for his job in a hospital laundry, the 11 volunteers converged on the house, brushes swinging. By the end of the day, all but a small area was finished. The union said it would provide a gallon of paint and men to complete the job.

School Strike Over Water Ends

FAYETTEVILLE, W. Va. (AP) — A one-week strike against an "inadequate water system" at the Fayetteville Consolidated School ended yesterday when 105 students returned to their classes.

Sanitation and school board personnel assured parents that service would be improved to the Negro school, officials said.

The parents had asked for city water service and new toilet facilities. Children had not attended classes since last Tuesday.

Shirley Temple To Have Baby

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP) — Shirley Temple is going to have a baby next month.

The former movie actress, now married to Charles Black, said the birth of her third child will be by Caesarean section here, where she herself was born 28 years ago. The Blacks have a daughter, Susan, 5 1/2 years, and a son, Charles Junior.

Judgment Against Basketball Fixer

NEW YORK (AP) — A tax judgment of \$924,313 has been made against Salvatore Solazzo, convicted basketball fixer, income tax evader and gold smuggler.

Judge Eugene Black in the U.S. Tax Court yesterday approved the judgment, sought by the government. It calls for \$596,229 in back taxes for the years from 1943 to 1947 and \$328,084 in fraud and other penalties.

Solazzo is now serving 8 to 16 years for bribing basketball players.

578 Undesirables Ousted This Year

WASHINGTON (AP) — A rundown on the Justice Department's program for getting undesirables out of the country today showed 578 aliens so classified have been excluded since the start of the year.

Dep. Atty. Gen. William F. Royster commented, in a speech prepared for an Immigration and Naturalization Service conference, "We can well be proud of these figures and the number which will follow in the ensuing months."

Of the total, 535 were described as criminal, immoral, or narcotic addicts, and the 43 others as subversive.

Justice Department officials said today that when the Republicans took over on Jan. 20, they inherited from the Democratic administration a "preferred list" of proposed exclusions which included 98 racketeers and 33 subversives, mostly Communists.

Officials said this elite group has now been expanded to cover 131 accused as racketeers and 142 as subversives, a total of 273.

Of these, 3 notorious hoodlums have been actually deported. 50 other persons are under deportation orders, 34 are undergoing denaturalization proceedings in the federal district in which they live, and the others are in various stages of investigation or litigation.

Cigarette Machine Held Message Only

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP) — Burglars who broke into a cigarette machine at a drive-in movie last night found themselves outsmarted. Instead of money in the coin box, there was a note which read: "Note to burglar—emptied every night. Tell your friends too.—The Management."

RED ARSENAL

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP) — The Nationalist Interior Ministry's Ta Tao News Agency, which claims underground contacts on the China mainland, said Tuesday Russia is developing the satellite state of Outer Mongolia as an arsenal for Red China.

School Census To Be Made

A census of people between the ages of four to 18 inclusive will get under way Oct. 5 under direction of Harold Ashley, clerk of School District No. 1.

Ashley made this announcement at the regular meeting of the Boards of Education Monday night.

The annual census is required by school law.

"It is important to get the information as complete as possible since a large portion of school money is determined by the school census," Ashley said.

The Oct. 5 census affects only people in School District No. 1, which includes the area from Barclay Springs on the north, all of Lakeshore Drive, all of South 6th to Swan Lake Moulding Co., on the south; Greensprings Drive to the Ashland-Weed Junction on the west including all of Lindley Heights; Avalon and Austin off Shasta Way to but not including Arthur on the east. OTI is also included in School District No. 1.

It was also announced that four or five local members will attend the Regional State School Board Meeting to be held Oct. 5 in Ashland.

Enrollment in Klamath Falls public schools as of Sept. 28 numbered 2,469. The corresponding figure last year was 2,378. There are 1,393 in the high school compared with 1,279 in 1952. Enrollment figures show a decided increase in the last five years, with more to come as increased numbers of elementary school pupils reach high school age.

Music in both junior and senior high is elective. Enrollment in senior high constitutes approximately one-fourth of the student body. Enrollment in junior high is considerably over one-half of the student body, according to Andrew Loney, director of music education.

KUHS Orchestra Lauded in Bend

The Klamath Union High School orchestra of 61 members returned from the Oregon Music Educators convention in Bend last Saturday evening carrying words of praise from all the music educators in attendance.

Walter P. Smith, orchestra director, was particularly complimented on the way in which he conducted the clinic and demonstration following the orchestra's program.

In addition to Smith, Dr. Elwyn Swarts of the University of Idaho and Dr. Bert Christiansen, Central Washington College of Education, used the orchestra for clinical purposes following Smith's presentation. Questions were asked by music educators as to the kind of organization used in Klamath Falls to build such an orchestra.

BALTIMORE (AP) — Dog Catcher Edgar T. Benton had just captured a little black dog here yesterday when he was pulled out of his truck and assaulted by Edward Simpson Sr.

Simpson, 25-year-old Negro, told Magistrate William F. Laukaitis he had lost his head in the excitement. He was fined \$10 for assault and \$10 for interfering with Benton "in the performance of his duties."

Benton, who was on the ground when rescued by police, told the magistrate: "This was nothing, Your Honor, compared with what we have to put up with from the women. Some of them come after us with brooms."

Production Of 2 Jets To Be Hiked

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of the Air Force Harold G. Tamm says some of the money saved in recent cutbacks is going into stepped-up production of the latest type jet planes—the B52 bomber and F100 fighter.

When he announced the decision last night, Tamm said he hopes Air Force cutbacks have been completed and the department can concentrate on pushing manufacture of planes which show most promise.

Extensive tests, he said, convinced authorities that the giant Boeing bomber and the fast North American fighter would perform satisfactorily.

Tamm gave no number of aircraft to be ordered, but said the accelerated B52 production would mean an increase of 25 to 40 per cent in the monthly totals of such aircraft turned out.

Hand of Sheriff's Brother Crushed

Wallace Britton, brother of Sheriff Murray Britton, was under treatment Tuesday at Klamath Valley Hospital for a crushed hand.

Britton was working at Waldrip Brothers ranch near Lower Klamath Lake. His hand became entangled in a belt on the pusher combine. He lives at 1928 Etna.

Man Lives Through 13,000-Volt Shock

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Edward Cooper, 40, a Philadelphia welder, was climbing down an iron girder supporting a roof over a transformer platform yesterday when the back of his neck touched a copper rod carrying 13,000 volts of electricity.

He was stuck to the girder until an automatic circuit breaker shut off the current. He then dropped unconscious to the platform.

Rescuers lowered him to the ground and he was taken to a hospital in fair condition.
