5 Medicine Lake Hunters Arrested

Five California hunters have been apprehended in the Medicine Lake area since the opening of the deer season in California. The men were charged with carrying loaded guns in cars on a public road.

The arrests were made by federal officers working out of Klamath Falls in cooperation with game wardens of the California Department of Fish and Game.

Four of the men appeared before Judge W. J. Kelone, Tenant, and pleaded guilty to the charge. They were: Theodore Offner, 20, Oakland; John William Codner, 41, Castro Valley; Carl Vernon Williams, 38, Anderson; Clark Tom Ung, 43, Los Angeles. Each man paid a fine of \$25.

The fifth offender, Raymond Bernard Bauchou, 46, San Francisco, appeared before Judge F. Standardt, Greenville, Calif., and paid a similar fine.

Ford, CIO Union Sued by 3 Women

DETROIT (AP)—Three women, claiming to represent 105 others, filed a three million dollar suit against the Ford Motor Co. and the CIO United Auto Workers yesterday, charging they were discriminated against because of their sex.

Neither Ford nor the union had any comment.

The women claim they were laid off in 1949 at Ford's River Rouge plant and men hired to replace them.

East Coast Dock Strike Threatened

NEW YORK (AP)—The International Longshoremen's Association (ILA), faced with increasing defections to a new AFL union, today threatened a strike which could detonate full-scale dock war with the rival group.

The ILA, ousted from the AFL a week ago for failure to cleanse itself of racketeering, posed the walkout threat for a minute after tomorrow midnight in contract negotiations with eastern shippers.

While the ILA dealt with em-

ployers, it also had to meet inroads from the new International Longshoremen's Association, AFL (ILA-AFL), which was chartered by the AFL after the ILA was ousted.

Latest blow to the ILA came last night when two locals with 1,500 men bolted it to join the ILA-AFL. A third local started the secession movement here a few days ago. There also have been

defections elsewhere.

The ILA also was reported in the throes of an intra-union squabble for leadership. ILA President Joseph P. Ryan checked into French Hospital yesterday for observation.

Violence could explode before the strike threat deadline as the ILA-AFL pushes its organizing attempts, described as raids by the orphaned ILA, or the waterfront could continue tense with special

details of police maintaining an uneasy calm between the two factions.

The defections of locals to the ILA-AFL leaves branches in the ILA's potential strike front. It means there might be action by ILA members to make a tieup 100 per cent effective. The result would be the first direct test of strength between the rival unions.

Negotiations between the ILA and the New York Shipping Association took a sudden turn for the worse yesterday, with ILA negotiators increasing their demands and making the strike threat.

Hospital Grants At 3 Sites Okayed

PORTLAND (AP)—The State Board of Health Saturday approved requests for federal grants for hospital construction totaling \$210,000.

They include \$155,000 for a new 35-bed hospital at Springfield, \$40,000 for an addition to the Morrow County Hospital at Heppner, and \$15,000 for an addition to the Curry County Hospital at Gold Beach.

The grants would be made under the Hill-Burton Act which requires approval of the project by the State Board of Health and also that \$2 in local money be raised for each \$1 contributed by the government.

The board also announced that \$179,902 had been granted in Hill-Burton funds to aid in construction of the Holladay Park Hospital at Portland.

The board heard a report on polio in Oregon by Dr. Samuel E. Osgood, state epidemiologist. He said the number of cases this year was about 25 per cent less than in 1952, and that there have been four polio deaths so far this year, compared with nine in 1952.

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
