Patton's Widow Killed Thrown From Horse
HAMILTON, Mass. (AP)—Mrs. Beatrice Ayer Patton, widow of Gen. George S. Patton, famed World War II 3rd Army commander, was killed Wednesday when thrown from a saddle horse.
Rushed from the bridge path accident scene, she was pronounced dead upon arrival at Beverly hospital.
Mrs. Patton's death was the third major tragedy in the family in recent years.
Her husband was killed in a collision between his jeep and another vehicle while serving in Europe. Their daughter, Beatrice, wife of Army officer John K. Waters, died about a year ago unexpectedly.
Mrs. Patton, 67, was riding with 30 friends in a drag hunt sponsored by the exclusive Myopia Hunt Club.
Riders reaching a check point noted her absence. They returned over the course and found her on the ground, her rideless horse nearby. The spirited mount apparently had balked at a jump, throwing her.
Authorities believed Mrs. Patton died instantly from head injuries. The accident occurred on the estate of her brother, Frederick Ayer, Boston broker. The riding group had left the Ayer home shortly before 8 a.m.

LIQUOR SALE BRINGS ARREST
An all-night drinking party in which more than a dozen teenage high school students participated was brought to light Wednesday with the arrest of a 21-year-old youth for giving intoxicating liquor to minors.
The accused is Douglas Meyers, 614 North Third St. Juvenile officers say he provided three pints of vodka for the teenage party. The complaint was signed by Wesley Guerdian.
Juvenile Officers Francis Mathews and Fay Blackmer said that they made an intensive investigation of beer sales to teenagers with the cooperation of inspectors of the Oregon Liquor Control Board. They said a grocer who has been supplying beer to high school students will be arrested late Wednesday.
Mathews said Meyers' arrest resulted from an investigation of a party held at the home of a high school girl on July 17. He charges Meyers provided three pints of vodka which was consumed during the night by the students. The party was staged while the parents of the girl were out of the city on vacation.
"A deplorable situation was brought to light," Mathews declared. "Delinquency on the part of parents as well as children was responsible."
Mrs. Blackmer said that boys and girls who were at the party told her that besides the three pints of vodka, 18 bottles of beer were consumed.
Meyers was arraigned Wednesday morning before District Judge D. E. Van Vactor. His attorney, Ben Goddard, asked for additional time to enter a plea. Judge Van Vactor set the case for pleading on Oct. 5. Three high school students were named in the complaint as recipients of the liquor. He is supposed to have provided.

ADAMS GUERNSEY HERD TO AUCTION
One of the well known herds of registered Guernsey cattle in the west will go on the auction block Saturday, Oct. 31, at Adamsdale Farm on Homedale Road. The herd was established by the late Dr. P. C. Adams of Klamath Falls over 15 years ago, and is being sold in settlement of his estate.
Dr. Adams was at one time a director of the Oregon Guernsey Breeders' Association, which will hold a meeting at the Winema Hotel on the night preceding the sale. The state organization voted to sponsor and supervise the final transaction, and its sale committee members will be here to assist in the event. Clayton Nyberg, Tualatin, is president, and Ben H. Newell, Salem, secretary of the state group.
Also in attendance will be Elmer J. Meadows of Portland, northwest representative of the American Guernsey Cattle Club. He will identify registrations and report the details to the national organization, which has its headquarters in Peterborough, New Hampshire. It is expected that one or more directors of the national group will come to Klamath Falls in recognition of Dr. Adams' standing as a breeder of purebred Guernsey cattle.

PICCARD PLUNGES TO RECORD DEPTH
ABOARD THE CORVETTE PENICE, Off Ponza Island, Italy (AP)—Prof. Auguste Piccard and his son Jacques rode their 52-foot diving box "Trieste" deeper into the sea today than living man ever has gone—to a depth of almost two miles.
The Italian navy said the Swiss-born scientist, conqueror of the stratosphere, and his son touched the bottom of the Tyrrhenian Sea in the record plunge of 3,150 meters, or 10,334 feet.
That plunge a little more than doubled the record of 1,560 meters (5,095 feet) two French naval officers set Aug. 12 off Toulon.

NO CONTACTS, NO NEW INFO ON KIDNAP
KANSAS CITY (AP)—Cold-blooded kidnapers, apparently adopting delaying tactics, today kept the fate of 6-year-old Bobby Greenlease from his anguished parents.
The child, son of a millionaire automobile dealer, was abducted two days ago while attending class at the French Institute of Notre Dame De Sion, a private school. A spokesman for the family said no contact with the person or persons holding the boy had been made. The father, Robert C. Greenlease, has said he believes professional criminals are involved, making it more likely Bobby will be released unharmed.
Police reported they had obtained no new information that would lead them to believe they are on the right trail.
Greenlease, through a banker friend, made arrangements to obtain cash at any time of the day or night should the need arise.
Robert Lederman, a business associate and spokesman for the family, said the whereabouts of the child is a mystery.
"We have received about eight telephone calls during the day from cranks who say they have the child," Lederman said yesterday. "I talk to the persons making the calls and ask them questions about the appearance of the boy or what he was wearing."
"That ends the conversations because they don't know the answers. On several occasions the telephone rang and there would be nobody at the other end when we answered."

TRUCKMAN DIES; MONEY MISSING; TEXAN ARRESTED
Following an all day drinking party in the section gang cars of the Great Northern Railway at Chemult Tuesday, Oregon State Police were called to investigate the death of a Mexican extra gang worker.
Augustine Plasencia, about 50, who, with three other truck workers, had been imbibing wine was found dead on a cot by authorities. He apparently died in his sleep.
Following the death of Plasencia and before the arrival of State Police a white man was seen throwing a wallet into the stove at the other end of the car. This was retrieved by another Mexican and was found to contain papers and identification cards belonging to Plasencia, but no money was found. Plasencia had cashed a pay check earlier for \$90.
The white man who gave his name as Raymond, 43, Carriyo Springs, Texas, was later apprehended in the town of Chemult and was brought to Klamath Falls and placed in the County Jail. He is charged with being drunk on a public highway and disorderly conduct. His hearing is set for 1 p.m. today.

Ike Gets Sore When Quizzed on Durkin

WASHINGTON (AP)—With a flash of anger, President Eisenhower said Wednesday he never has knowingly broken an agreement with any associate. The statement was made in reference to the resignation of Martin Durkin from his Cabinet.
Squaring his jaw, Eisenhower told his news conference that anybody in the room had evidence to the contrary he could have the floor and present it then and there.
Durkin, who quit as secretary of labor, told the AFL conference that the President backed down on an agreement to recommend changes in the Taft-Hartley law.
Eisenhower himself, said Wednesday for his own version said at first he would not give because it has always been policy to avoid comment on individual acts.
Then, eyes flashing, the President said that to his knowledge he has never broken any agreement with any associate in his life. He asserted the truth is no agreement actually had been reached.
It was then that he said if anyone present had contrary evidence—meaning evidence of any broken agreement—he could have the floor and make a speech.

Farran Sex Case Dropped

Circuit Judge Ralph M. Holman of Oregon City Wednesday dismissed a child molesting charge against Lyle M. Farran, former Gem Stadium grounds keeper.
The action was taken at the request of District Attorney Frank Alderson who said he could not produce sufficient evidence to convict the defendant.
Judge Holman acted in the case after Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg disqualified himself. Judge Vandenberg took this action following dismissal of a jury which became hopelessly deadlocked in the case. Farran was tried on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a 9-year-old girl. Judge Vandenberg withdrew from the case when Alderson filed the dismissal motion.
In sustaining Prosecutor Alderson's motion to dismiss the charge, Judge Holman said:
"The motion will be allowed. You can't make people try a lawsuit when neither side wants to try it."
Farran was arrested June 24 on complaint of the parents of the child involved in the case. He was subsequently indicted by the County Grand Jury and has been held in the County Jail ever since.
When questioned by Judge Holman, Defense Counsel J. C. O'Neill said:
"I have no objection to this charge being dismissed. Will the court order my client released from custody?"
Judge Holman complied.

Woman Worries About Call To Romanian Sister

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Mrs. Fedora Berman says she made the mistake of asking her sister in a long-distance telephone call to Bucharest, Romania, whether she would like to come to the United States.
"Oh yes, yes," her sister, Dr. Antoinette Teodorescu, a physician, was quoted as replying yesterday.
Mrs. Berman said the conversation was immediately cut off, indicating that it was being monitored.
Mrs. Berman said it was the first time she had been able to converse with her sister in years and that now she feared for her safety.
About four years ago, she added she got a telephone call through to her brother in Odessa, Russia, and hasn't heard from him since.
