

# Gale Storm Can Handle T-V, Radio, Normal Family Life

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — How can a TV and radio star maintain a normal family life and stick to a schedule that would tire a lumberjack?

That's the problem that faced Gale Storm when "My Little Margie" happened along and changed her life a year ago. The show, which appears on CBS radio Sundays and NBC TV tonight, came up when she was a fulltime wife and mother and part-time actress. Now the situation is reversed.

When she's making the TV films, she's up at 5:30 in the morning six days a week. Between the spurts of film production, she records the air show with her co-star, Charles Farrell. Any spare time she has left over is taken up with her official duties as honorary mayor of Sherman Oaks, publicly, etc. Last summer she also scored a smash as a night club singer in Las Vegas, Nev.

"I'm busy, all right," sighs Gale, who is just as pert and pretty in person as she is on TV. "I may be rationalizing—I'm an expert at that—but I think all this activity is good for my family.

"When I do have time to devote to my boys, I can give my full attention to it. A lot of full-time mothers see their kids so much that they never really appreciate them.

"And because I am so busy, the boys get more companionship from their father than other boys generally do. That's all to the good."

The boys are Philip, 10, Peter, 7, and Paul, 6. Their father is Lee Bonnell, who gave up a limping film career to become a crack insurance salesman.

When "My Little Margie" made such demands on her time, Gale had to hire a housekeeper. (Gale said she is a "medium lousy" cook herself and now has almost forgotten how.) To make up for her absence, dinner-time is devoted to the boys.

"When I was working in pictures, the boys couldn't understand why I had to be away," she explained. "I'd make a movie that wouldn't be out for six months or more. But now they understand why I'm gone. They can hear the radio show on Sundays and watch the TV show on Wednesdays. They take a pride in 'My Little Margie' themselves."

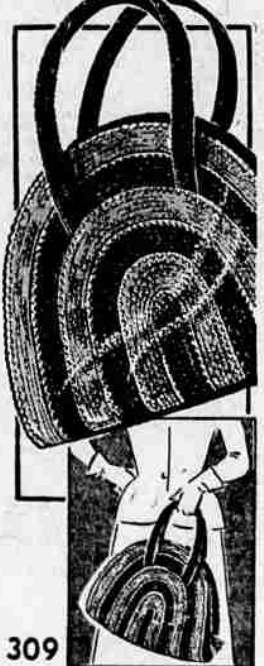

## Modoc Bull Sale Oct. 4-5

**CEDARVILLE**—The tenth annual Modoc County Range Bull Sale will be held this year on Oct. 4 and 5.

The Bull Sale is one of the most important sales in the west today. Cattle buyers and breeders alike look forward to the Modoc sale as a criterion for future sales.

This year's sale features the largest group of bulls ever sold at the sale. There are 122 head of Hereford bulls including 15 polled Herefords. Eleven head of Shorthorn bulls and for the first time an offering of eight Angus bulls from the herds of M. L. Doty, Cassel, Calif., and Dale West, Malin, Ore.

The Surprise Valley Sheriff's Air Posse will kick the festivities off Saturday night with the Annual Bull Sale dance in the fair hall. Sunday, Oct. 4 will feature the grading of all bulls by Rubie Albaugh, livestock specialist of the University of California at Davis, Sedge Nelson, Farm Advisor, Siskiyou County, and Brunel Christensen, Rancher and Supervisor from Likely.

All bulls grading below the two minus grades will be eliminated from the sale. Once again the health restrictions will be so that all bulls will meet the standards of all adjacent states.

The Bull Sale committee announces that the popular buffet dinner and bar will again be featured Sunday evening.

The annual barbecue with the labor furnished by the Cedarville Rotary Club will be cooked this year in the worlds largest sheepherder oven and served at 11:30 Monday morning preceding the bull sale which starts at 1:30 p.m.

This year's sale will be held in the new bull sale pavilion, and the auctioneer's duties will once again be handled by the very talented Howard Brown of Woodland, Calif.

**NEW RADAR Undergoes Tests**

**NEW YORK (AP)**—Experiments on a new type radar system are nearing completion in the polar region. The system is designed to give at least six hours of warning should enemy aircraft approach via the North Pole.

The Western Electric Co., handling radar work under government contract reported yesterday that the initial installations are near Barter Island, Alaska, about 1,200 miles from the pole.

Western Electric said the radar apparatus operates independently of human attention.

## Army Target: Gls' Pen Pals

**WASHINGTON (AP)**—The Army, with an eye to unintentional leaks of military secrets, is trying to discourage soldiers from exchanging letters with unknown persons, including "pen pals" and chain letter correspondence.

A new regulation says personal mail from known correspondents is something highly desirable, but that:

"Consideration must be given to the known fact that subversive elements have employed personal correspondence channels for propaganda purposes and for the accumulation of information which may be interpreted into intelligence at value to an enemy or potential enemy."

## Entertainer Fined On Driving Counts

**CHICAGO (AP)**—Hal Block, radio and television figure, was convicted of speeding and driving without a driver's license yesterday and was fined a total of \$30 by Municipal Judge George B. Weiss.

Judge Weiss dismissed a drunk driving charge against the 40-year-old entertainer after policeman Robert Dwyer testified that Block's car was not weaving in and out of traffic on the Outer Drive June 23.

Block said he had had "one or two beers" before he was arrested. He testified he increased his speed because he believed another car was following him and he feared a holdup.

**ALBANY, N. Y. (AP)**—Everything points to a light vote in the 6th District of Albany's 9th Ward on election day Nov. 3.
