COLE SLAW

Combine 4 cups shredded cabbage which has been crisped in ice water and 1 cup seedless or seeded grapes, halved. Moisten with a dressing may by mixing together 1 cup sour cream, 4 tablespoons fresh lemon juice, 4 tablespoons sugar, salt and pepper. Serve in lettuce cups and garnish with grapes.

Dry the seeds thoroughly and preserve in an envelope. Arrange in a file with a picture of the flower and something about where or how it was enjoyed during the summer. This seed collection becomes a cherished gift at Christmas for some dear friend or relative. If you have a pen friend in another country, this collection may be sent to her.

Intermediate Girl Scouts may wish to carry the project into badge work. It partially fulfills requirement 14, Home Gardener. It can be combined with part of the nature requirement for Second Class rank if six flowers are learned.



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
