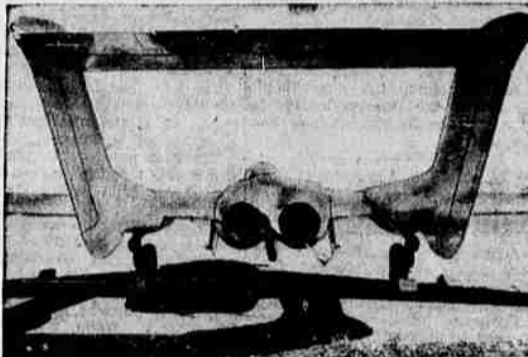

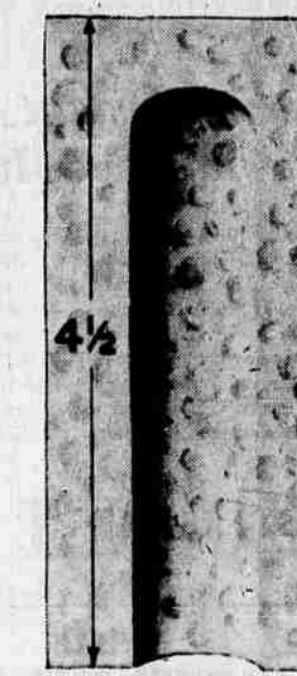

Joppa Brother Locals Strike

PADUCAH, Ky. (AP) — A rival bloodshed, steered clear today of ironworkers union local, fearful of pickets of Local 595 of Paducah picket lines set up by a rebellious brother local at the strikebound plant.
Ray Armstrong, organizer for Local 758 of Cairo, Ill., said his men would not attempt to pass Joppa, Ill., steam electric power because "that would mean blood shed." He added: "We'll let the law take care of that. If one life is lost, that would be too many."
The AFL Ironworkers' International created Local 758 to take jurisdiction of Joppa after Local 595 defied an order to end the strike, reportedly the 39th since
