Another Blast In Strike Town
 PITKIN, La. (AP)—The second dynamite explosion in five days last night rocked this community, eight miles from the strike-torn paper mill town of Elizabeth.
 State police said the blast took place 200 yards from the Pitkin High School gymnasium where about 500 persons were attending a fair and rodeo. No one was reported injured.
 State police said the dynamite apparently was thrown from a moving car into a ditch near a residence.
 The town of Elizabeth and surrounding areas have been the scene of violence since September, 1952, when AFL employees of the Calcasieu Paper Co. and the jointly-owned Southern Industries, Inc., walked off their jobs in a contract dispute.

Embattled Caine Sailing Again - To 80 U.S. Cities

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—The embattled USS Caine is sailing again, this time for the stages of 80 American cities.
 In a curious reversal of the usual turn of events, "The Caine Mutiny," which was recently made into a movie, is going on the road in a stage version. Whereas the film contains most of the book, the play will be only the trial and the hotel celebration thereafter.
 A stellar crew has been assembled for the show. Henry Fonda, veteran of service in the real Navy and "Mister Roberts," is appearing as the brilliant defender, Barney Greenwald. Lloyd Nolan plays the infamous Capt. Queeg, and John Hodiak is the thoughtful mutineer, Lt. Maryck.
 The show is being directed by a onetime crooner named Dick Powell, who more recently has turned director and producer of movies. Author Herman Woude, two-thirds of the way through his fourth novel, interrupted his work to adapt his novel to the stage.
 The whole works was put together by Paul Gregory, a young man who looks like an actor but is producer of such hits as "Don Juan in Hell" and "John Brown's Body."
 I dropped in to see this noted crew at the Musicians' Union Bldg., where rehearsals are under way. The large hall echoed with speeches. Loose-limbed Fonda stalked around Nolan, who was being interrogated on the witness stand. Defendant Hodiak, realistic in a close crewcut, was being questioned in a corner by an actor playing the prosecuting attorney.
 This sort of thing went on until Director Powell showed up from his movie duties. He greeted everyone warmly, especially a hopeful actor who was waiting to try out for a major role. Gregory and Woude came in and the actor was given a run-through in the part.
 When the actor left, his possibilities were discussed. The general agreement was that he might make the grade.
 "He looks the part," reasoned Powell, "and that's important. We've got to type-cast in this play, because we have so little time to establish the characters. They have to look what they are."
 Woude told me that it wasn't possible to transfer the book verbatim to the stage. "The reader has the advantage of having read 300 pages of narrative before he gets to the trial," he explained.
 Gregory said that the show will play a pre-opening engagement in Santa Barbara, Calif., and then premiere in San Diego Oct. 14. About 80 cities, mostly one-nighters with a few week stands, will be played. The show will brave New York Jan. 18.
 "If we aren't ready for New York by then, we never will be," Gregory said.
