Father Denies Contact Made

KANSAS CITY (AP) — A spokesman for the family of Robert C. Greenleaf, father of kidnapped 6-year-old Bobby Greenleaf, Friday denied published reports that contact had been made with the kidnapers and a ransom demand received.

Several newspapers in other cities have published reports the family has been in contact with the kidnapers through a newspaper want ad, and that a demand for \$500,000 ransom had been received. The report also was broadcast on a television program.

"No figure has been mentioned. We have not been in contact with the kidnapers," said Robert Ledterman, business associate of Greenleaf and spokesman for the family.

The ad which caused speculation appeared in the personal column of the Wednesday afternoon Kansas City Star and read: "M: Will meet you in Chicago Sunday, G."

Ledterman, speaking for the family, said: "I don't know anything about the ad. I haven't seen it."
