Initial operation last week with 10 potatoes being run through the plant at present are from growers Dale West and G. W. Osborne and Sons.

County Pound Contract Let

Alex Floren, Klamath Falls contractor, was low bidder with \$11,617.12 on the projected county animal shelter and caretaker's cottage, it was announced Saturday by Judge U. E. Reeder of the County Court.

The construction contract was awarded to Floren by the County Court late Friday. Other bidders were E. N. Alt and Charles Kern.

It is expected work on the project will be started within two weeks. The new animal shelter will be located adjacent to the City Dog Pound.

Decision to build the dog pound was reached by county officials after an investigation by the Herald and News revealed impounded dogs were being subjected to inhumane treatment.

After the Herald and News published photographs showing stray dogs cooped up in dilapidated auto bodies at 5146 Miller Ave., a citizens committee appeared before the County Court and demanded action.

Three Indicted Plead Guilty

Three persons indicted by the County Grand Jury have pleaded guilty in Circuit Court.

William Clyde Baggett, 33, admitted he stole a used suit from the Clothes Mart. He also told Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg that he served 32 months in the Alabama State Prison.

Homer Gene Perry, 18, who is also wanted by military authorities in California for impersonating an army corporal and collecting his pay, told the court he was guilty of stealing \$250 from the Snack Bar at Gilchrist.

A charge of breaking glass in a building not his own was admitted by Benjamin Gilpin. He was found hiding in the Hahn Electric Store by city police. Gilpin said he served time for burglary in the Nevada State Prison.

Judge Vandenberg will pass sentence on the three defendants Monday.

Fat Chance City'll Get U. S. Building

A combination courthouse and postoffice building to cost \$1,190,000 was listed Saturday among government projects "eligible" for construction by the General Services Administration in Washington.

The Klamath Falls project is among 88 scattered throughout the country.

An Associated Press dispatch from Washington states, however, that the list means little unless Congress appropriates construction funds. The AP adds that Congress has paid little heed to such reports in recent years and no money for such work has been appropriated since prior to World War II.

Klamath Falls has a modern postoffice but there are no facilities for the United States District Court when it convenes here.

The court will hold a session here beginning Oct. 13 in the Klamath County Circuit courtroom.

New Section Added To Spud Exhibits

MERRILL—A new section has been added to the potato exhibits at the Klamath Basin Potato Festival Oct. 23 and 24.

Eligible are students in any Klamath County High School, 7th grade and up.

Regulations require that potatoes entered be selected by the student from his own place of residence, but not necessarily grown by the exhibitor.

First prize is a cup, which goes to the student's school, and a \$10 cash award for himself; 2nd place award is a \$5 cash award to the student.

Exhibits are to be 50 pounds of Commercial U.S. No. 1 Netted Gems, not washed, and must be School gym by 7 p.m. Thursday delivered to the Merrill High Oct. 22.

Fire Costs Rancher 12 Tons of Hay

About 12 tons of baled hay was burned Friday morning at the Bruce Gaddis ranch on the Crystal Springs road southeast of here.

Prompt arrival of two fire trucks from the Suburban Fire Department kept the fire from spreading to the main ranch buildings.

One side of an implement shed was burned and some damage done to the roof. This shed was covered by insurance, but the hay was not.

Origin of the fire is not known. Estimated damage was set at \$500.

Cycle Daredevil Dies from Act

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP)—A Tennessee motorcycle daredevil died last night of a brain injury suffered Tuesday night in an accident during a state fair performance.

Robert Haynes, 27, Nashville, never regained consciousness. His cycle struck a restraining cable in the drome during a race. He was thrown off and the machine crashed into his head.

Law Scholarship For M.D. Still Goes A-Begging

EVANSTON, Ill. (AP)—A three-year law scholarship worth \$2,500 so far has gone begging at Northwestern University.

School officials have found scores of qualified candidates—but none of them want it.

In the past 30 years, Northwestern's medical school has had only one of its graduates go on to study law.

Besides the switch in lifetime goals, it would require three years of law school on top of the seven years of special study that led to the medical degree.

The grant for the unusual scholarship was made by an unidentified Evanston man who was involved in a complicated medical-legal case some years ago. A Northwestern spokesman quoted him as saying he searched in vain for a lawyer with sufficient medical knowledge to handle the case.

Merchants Assn. Meets Wednesday

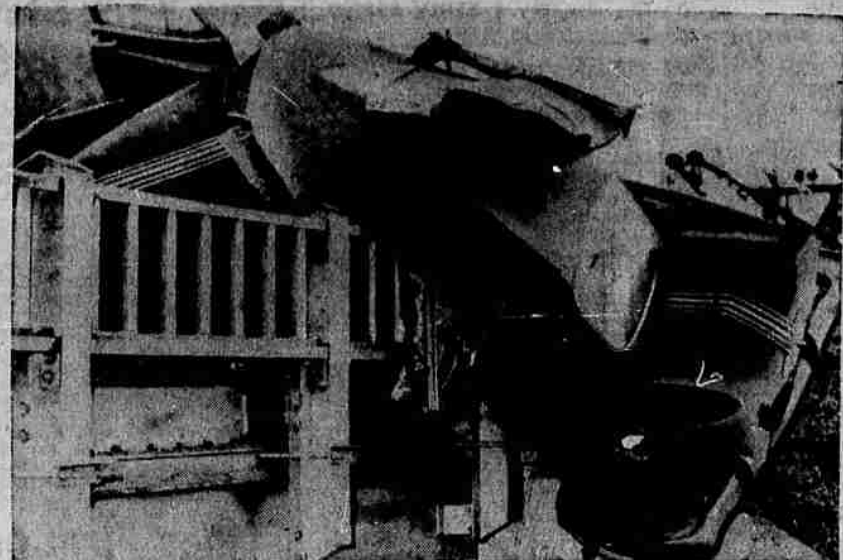

Forest Rentals Bring \$36,142

County Treasurer Annabelle Newton announced Saturday that the county has received \$36,142.16 from the federal government in receipts from forest rentals and sales of timber in forest reserves. The funds are for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1955.

Mrs. Newton explained that under the law each county is required to divide the money with 75 per cent going to the road fund and 25 per cent to the school fund.

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3 Restricted Areas Opened

Deer hunters who wish to go farther afield will again be able to make weekend use of the Mill, Rickreall and Boulder Creek watersheds this year, according to Art Einarson of the Oregon State College fish and game research unit.

The 40,000-acre area west of Dallas, closed for hunting in '50 and '51, will be open again this year on Saturdays and Sundays only during the buck deer hunting season, Oct. 3-16. Camping will not be allowed.

All hunters are requested to have their deer counted and weighed at one of three checking stations; Blackrock Camp, Rickreall Creek and Mill Creek, which have been set up by the Oregon Cooperative Wildlife Research Unit from OSC.

Purpose is to check the results of the two-year hunting closure of the area.

The unit is interested in the blacktail buck distribution and workers intend to compare the weights of deer taken on newly burned-over land, newly-logged land and old burns and climaxed or mature vegetation.

Einarson reports the study is being made possible through the courtesy of the privately-owned lumbering interests in the area and is in assignment from the Oregon State Game Commission.

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
