The Holmes family had come to Idaho in 1902 to take up a homestead, and the log cabin, a one room affair, couldn't accommodate the wedding guests. So all the furniture was moved out into a tent, and the courageous (and energetic) Mrs. Holmes served a chicken dinner to all who came to see her daughters simultaneously wed.
