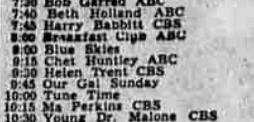

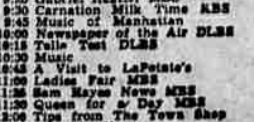

## World's Speed Record Re-won

THERMAL, Calif. (AP)—Streaking an average of 753.4 mph, the Navy's new F4D Skyraider interceptor has won back the world's measured course record for the United States and now will be given further tests at sea.

Lt. Cmdr. James B. Verdin, 35, youthful looking combat hero of both World War II and Korea, piloted the jet flying-wing-type Douglas plane to the new record Saturday about 150 feet above the hot sands along Southern California's Salton Sea.

On each of his four arrow-straight passes over the 5-kilometer (1.863 mile) course, Verdin averaged each mile in less than five seconds. His fastest pass—761.414 m. p. h.—was only 31 less than the speed of sound along the course, where the mercury read 98.5 degrees. Some speed varies with temperature and altitude.

Verdin and the Skyraider erased the 737.3 m. p. h. record set by British Cmdr. Mike Lithgow in a Vickers Supermarine Swift at Liby only last Sept. 25.

During the 20 minutes between takeoff and landing at El Centro Auxiliary Naval Air Station, the nine-ton Skyraider, powered by a Westinghouse J40 turbojet engine, used approximately 2,500 pounds of the jet fuel, a gasoline-kerosene combination. While on the run, Verdin turned on his afterburners, in effect an extra engine carried in the aft part of the plane for short bursts of speed.

"There was a real boof when I turned those afterburners on," said the pilot. "Everything was wide open. I couldn't tell exactly, but I believe I was flying between 100 and 200 feet (altitude) on each pass."

Douglas Aircraft Co. officials say the Skyraider is capable of supersonic speeds at higher altitudes. Men have flown faster than 753.4 m. p. h., but not under the low-level, sustained flight regulations of the Federation Aeronautique Internationale.

Verdin, a Miles City, Mont., native, won the Navy Cross for valor in dive-bombing missions in F4U Hellcat fighter planes during the second battle for Leyte Gulf in World War II. He presently is stationed at Patuxent River, Md., testing new Navy planes.

## Controversial School Blown Into Creek

MANCHESTER, Ky. (AP)—The main issue in a student strike in rural Clay County has blown over a hillside into a creek 20 feet below.

The single room frame schoolhouse, came to rest on its side last Thursday and from all indications will remain there.

Wilk Collet, spokesman for parents who pulled their 30 youngsters out of classes Monday because the structure was "dangerous," said he will ask the state to have an investigator inspect it and confirm the need for a new one.

Collet also said there was one teacher for eight grades. A new teacher showed up Monday, he added, got a glimpse of the building and "then went to Cincinnati to look for employment."

Claiming the community was promised another school four years ago, he asserted: "The children will stay out until arrangements are made for a new school. We want it built this fall."

## Penny-Padding Motorist Caught

WHEELING, W. Va. (AP)—A wheeling motorist has been arrested for allegedly attempting to stretch a penny beyond its original purpose.

Henry Christopher posted bond after being charged with wrapping a tin foil or cellophane around a penny to approximate the size of a nickel and inserting the coin in a city parking meter.

## Episcopal Head Back from Tour

NEW YORK (AP)—The Rt. Rev. Henry Knox Sherrill, presiding bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church, returned early today from a six-week tour of church missions in the Far East.

The bishop and his wife arrived on the same flight with Frank B. Starzel, general manager of The Associated Press, back from a survey of the news cooperative's bureaus in the Far East.

## Van Heflin Politely Turns Down Chance to Enter TV

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—This season established film stars like Ray Milland, Joan Crawford, Loretta Young, Joan Fontaine, Ida Lupino and Joan Fontaine are taking the big leap into television. But here is one actor who has politely declined TV offers—Van Heflin.

"My agents get between four and five offers a month for me to do TV series," he remarked. "I have given instructions to turn them all down. I have my reasons.

"There's no doubt about it. TV is competition to the movies. Since I have been keeping busy in films, I see no reason why I should compete with myself by being on the home screens.

"I feel a certain loyalty to the movie business. It has treated me quite fairly over the years, and I don't want to do anything that might hurt it. I feel also that my film career would be endangered if I ventured into TV on a major basis. I know that it would hurt me considerably in the legitimate theater, which I am most interested in."

Heflin observed that acting suffers on TV, whether it is done live or on film.

"You simply can't do your best work under such circumstances," he said. "An actor has to grow into a role. Rehearsals are completely inadequate on live TV. Films for TV are still much improved. You're still racing against a time clock. So much film has to be made to embellish and create."

The actor admitted that many of his craft are seeking TV because of the lag in film production for theaters.

"I may find that I'll be hunting for jobs too," he remarked. "But I'd return to the stage before I tried TV. You can make good money by touring. Good new plays are hard to find, but you can do as Katharine Cornell, the Lunts and Helen Hayes have done over the years—if they can't find new plays, they bring out a good old one, tour extensively, then bring it into New York for a limited run."

Heflin has done only three things on TV. He appeared for Robert Montgomery in "Arrowsmith," which he hoped to create interest in for a film remake. He did a patriotic reading as a gesture for an old friend, Ken Murray. Last season he appeared on "Toast of the Town" in a scene from "The Shrike." It was a kickoff for a six-month tour in the play.

"I plan to limit appearances on TV in the future to two or three a year, no more than that," he said. "I think it's dangerous for a film actor to appear more often. There is a definite resentment on the part of the public over having to pay for something they have been getting free. If they see an actor on their home screens, they resent having to pay to see him in a theater."
