Babies Locked In Auto Die

SOUTH HILL, Va. (U) — An Army sergeant and his wife saw both their babies die yesterday after returning from an afternoon fishing trip to find the children unconscious in the car in which they had been locked for safety.

By the time Sgt. H. E. McCormick and Mrs. McCormick could rush to South Hill for medical assistance, 4-month-old Harold McCormick, 17 months, died en route to the post hospital at Camp Pickett, 30 miles away, where the sergeant is stationed.

Dr. W. J. Oallin, Mecklenburg County coroner, said the younger child, apparently died of suffocation.

Army authorities at Camp Pickett said they will investigate the death of the girl.

McCormick said he, his wife and another couple locked the two children in the car on the bank of a lake at Kerr Dam yesterday while the adults went fishing. One window of the car, he told the coroner, was open slightly and the vehicle was parked within sight of the fishing spot.

Several times, the sergeant said, he noted the older child moving in the car. Then there was no movement, and the couple returned to investigate.

Serviceman Gets Death

TOKYO (U) — Airman 2d C. Sherman E. Gravitt, 21, was sentenced to death Friday for the slaying of a military police officer on Okinawa, the Far East Air Forces announced today.

The Philadelphia airman was convicted of murdering 1st Lt. Bernard Geller on Okinawa last July 28.

Geller's patrol was called to an Okinawa village near Naha Air base.

Testimony at the four-day trial brought out that Gravitt, using a stolen carbine, had wounded an Okinawan. He fired at Geller when the officer ordered him to stop. Gravitt then took a service revolver from the lieutenant and wounded an MP corporal, Wilford Warren.

The sentence is subject to review all the way to the President.

Whopping Spree; First-Aiders Tidy-Up 4,500

MUNICH, Germany (U) — Germany's biggest seasonal spree, the annual Munich Oktoberfest, ended here Sunday night, and managers claimed it beat all previous records of its 143-year old history.

They estimated that about six million visitors consumed almost 800,000 gallons of strong dark beer, and ate 16 hole roasted oen, 110,000 fried chicken and one million sausages.

Red Cross officials rendered first aid to 4,500 people and ambulances removed 95 persons from the vast Theresienwiese festival grounds who were knocked flat by the strong brew.

CHICAGO (U) — Prices on live hogs continued the downtrend of last week Monday with losses extending to 25 and 50 cents a hundred pounds. Cattle were steady to 50 cents off but vealers were steady to strong. In sheep, lambs and yearlings lost 50 cents to \$1.00 at the opening of trade.

Most barrows and gilts sold from \$22.00 to \$23.25, two loads topping at \$23.60. Sows usually sold from \$20.50 to \$23.00. Such prices were the lowest in two months. Clearance was good, however, on the 10,000 hogs estimated to be on public sale.

Choice and prime steers sold at \$24.50 to \$28.40 and good to prime heifers from \$17.50 to \$26.00. Cows and bulls topped at \$13.00 and prime vealers at \$22.00.

Native lamba grading good to prime sold on early rounds at \$18.00 to \$21.00 but these were only a few lots out of heavy run. The rest of the division was slow in getting started.

Other receipts included 24,000 cattle, 700 calves and 4,000 sheep.

Meyers Admits Vodka Guilt

Douglas Meyers, 21-year-old construction worker, pleaded guilty in District Court Monday to supplying three pints of vodka to high school students who were involved in an all-night drinking party.

Judge D. E. Van Vactor announced he will pass sentence on Meyers at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday.

The defendant was not present in court. His plea was given by Defense Counsel Ben Goddard.

In the meantime, county juvenile officers were continuing their investigation of teenage drinking. Twelve high school students have been questioned concerning all-night party last July in a Klamath Falls home. It was at this party, according to investigators, that the liquor procured by Meyers was consumed.

Juvenile Officer Francis Mathews said Monday he will confer with Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg concerning high school students he claims are guilty of moral offenses.

Last week, Elmer T. Rindal, was fined \$400 after he admitted selling beer to high school students. State liquor agents have requested the Oregon Liquor Control Board in Portland to suspend his license.

Lakeview Area Man-Made Fires Worry Foresters

Man-made fires in the Lakeview area are causing some concern, according to Jack Groom, assistant supervisor of the Fremont National Forest. He stated that patrols are finding many camp and warmup fires still smoldering after hunters have taken off in search of their game.

Six fires were blamed on hunters Sunday. The worst, a 20-acre blaze in the Big section, was brought under control last night. Two small fires in the Silver Lake district, one near Paisley, one in the Drews Valley district and another in the Big area were controlled before serious damage was done.

Due to the extremely cold nights hunters apparently are overlooking the fact that the temperature is high during the day and the humidity drops to a dangerous low at this time of the year, Groom stated.

Not all hunters are showing this disregard for forest safety, Groom officials said, pointing out that many men have left their hunting posts to report and to help extinguish the blazes started by their more careless companions.

The fire situation on the local scene was much brighter according to local KFFA officials who reported not one man-caused fire.

Entry permits are required in most areas controlled by KFFA and it is felt this has made hunters feel more fire conscious.

'TOURISTS' WANTED

ROME (U) — Italian authorities spread their nets Monday for additional members of an alleged international spy ring accused of relaying Western secrets through the Iron Curtain by means of phony "tourists." The Defense Ministry announced Saturday night that the nucleus of the alleged ring had been smashed by the arrest of seven Italians.

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Parker Admits Bum Check

Weldon Lee Parker, 34-year-old salesman who Sheriff Murray Britton declared carried a "action-packed fountain pen" pleaded guilty in Circuit Court Monday to a bad check charge.

According to reports received by Britton and District Attorney Frank Alderson, Parker is wanted in 10 states for passing spurious checks. He is specifically charged here with cashing a worthless check for \$50 at Dugan-Mest Co.

Authorities in the following states are reported to want Parker—Oregon, Illinois, Michigan, Nevada, California, Washington, Idaho, South Dakota, Minnesota and Wisconsin.

Alderson said Parker is alleged to have cashed 25 checks ranging from \$40 to \$100 each in several Oregon cities. The sheriff's office has four warrants for his arrest.

At the request of Defense Attorney J. C. O'Neill, Judge David R. Vandenberg deferred passing sentence on Parker until October 23.

O'Neill said the president of a manufacturing firm in Cedar Falls, Iowa, who employed Parker, wanted to appear in the defendant's behalf.

Drunk Driving Charge Falls

A drunk driving case on appeal to Circuit Court was dismissed Monday by District Judge D. E. Van Vactor, who held that he did not have jurisdiction.

The defendant, George M. Thorne, Klamath Falls salesman, had been convicted by a District Court jury last month.

Judge Van Vactor dismissed the case on a motion of Defense Attorney George Proctor. Proctor cited a ruling of the court in the case of Clifford Paul Fagerstrom, San Francisco marine engineer, who was freed of a drunk driving charge in the middle of his trial last week.

In the Fagerstrom trial it developed the complaint against the defendant was signed by a state policeman who had no personal knowledge of the circumstances surrounding the arrest. The officer who signed the complaint did not participate in the arrest.

Proctor, who also was attorney for Fagerstrom, said the circumstances of the arrest in that case were the same in the case against Thorne. For that reason, the court upheld Proctor's motion to dismiss Thorne.

A Year In Jail For Sleeper In Stores

Benjamin Gilpin, 45-year-old ex-convict, who failed to convince Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg that he broke into the Hann Electric Co. merely to find a place to sleep, will sleep for the next year in the County Jail.

The court Monday gave Gilpin the maximum penalty after he pleaded guilty to a charge of breaking glass in a building not his own.

The court was informed that Gilpin broke into another Klamath Falls business establishment shortly before he was apprehended in the electric store by city police.

"Weren't the sleeping accommodations satisfactory in the first place you broke into?" Judge Vandenberg asked the defendant. "You'll never be able to convince me that you were looking for a place to sleep. You were looking for money."

The court also referred to an FBI report on Gilpin which showed he served burglary terms in Washington and Nevada.

"The report also shows you have been getting arrested on drunk charges ever since 1925," the judge added. "I'm sorry the maximum I can give you is a year in the County Jail."

IS MEDICINE DESTROYING ITSELF?

Things dramatic capture the imagination, sometimes to the point of distorting the perspective. This is as true in medicine as in other fields. The sensational results with sulfa drugs and penicillin are examples.

Less dramatic, but responsible for saving uncounted lives, are the broader public health measures. Sewage disposal, swamp clearance, and food inspection are but a few of these triumphs.

The physician and the pharmacist have always been leaders in the field of preventive medicine. This fact led James Brice to observe: "Medicine is the only profession that labors increasingly to destroy the reason for its own existence."

The fight, however, it far from won. Diagnosis and treatment of disease are still the primary functions of the physician. The filling of prescriptions is our responsibility as pharmacists.

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
