

## Prayer Meet At Temple

A three-day ministerial prayer conference will be held Tuesday through Thursday, Oct. 6 through 8, at the Klamath Temple, 1007 Pine.

Three services daily are planned: at 10 a.m., 2:30 p.m. and 7:45 p.m. The convention will also conduct three special radio broadcasts over KFJL at 10:30 a.m. each day of the convention.

The event is a semi-annual affair with the Pacific Coast Division of Open Bible Standard Church Inc., which covers northern California, Oregon and Wash-

ington. There will be ministers in attendance from four or five states and some of the nation's finest speakers, according to the Rev. Keith L. Hume, pastor of the host church.

The Rev. Theron Tousley, pastor of a great church in Lodi, Calif., and divisional superintendent for the three-state area for Open Bible Standard Churches Inc., will preside at the conference and will speak over the air at 10:30 a.m.

As many as 200 out of town guests are expected and the local public is cordially invited to attend.

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## Issue 5 of World's Oldest Newspaper Found In U.S.

NEW YORK (U-P)—In the fall of 1821, a London printer pulled from his hand press a sheet reporting news from the continent.

"Corant or Weekly News" lasted only a few weeks, vanishing for a reason no one took the trouble to record. But six issues were tucked away in the British Museum, labeled the earliest copies extant of an English language newspaper.

Trouble was, one issue was missing—No. 5, dated Oct. 9, 1821. Back in 1812, the author of literary anecdotes, one J. Nichols, described the paper. But searching scholars in succeeding years never were able to run down the copy Nichols saw.

Today a New York rare book dealer announced discovery of this missing literary link and called it the earliest English newspaper extant (a word bibliographers love, meaning that they know it exists) outside the British Museum.

Dave Randall, head of the rare book department of Scribner's, says it was purchased five years ago in a collection but its worth only recently was established in correspondence with Folke Dahl,

a Swedish bibliographer and authority on English corantos, as the news sheets of those early days were called.

The collection was from the library of Edison Dick, Chicago manufacturer. He picked up the paper at a sale in England but knows nothing of its earlier history.

Randall put a price tag of \$10,000 on the yellowing, 9x12 sheet. The Corant carried only foreign

news because James L. then King of England, forbade publication of local affairs, which he called "trash and licentious talking in matters of state... which the common people know not how to understand."
