Stengel Looks To Next Year

NEW YORK (AP) — Prof. Casey Stengel, the only manager in the history of major league baseball to win five straight World Series, held court in his office at the Yankee Stadium Monday.

The players still were whooping it up after beating the Brooklyn Dodgers in the sixth and deciding game. When a manager can do what Stengel has done, everyone listens.

"This club has a good chance to win the pennant in 1954—unless the other clubs get stronger."

"Me retire?" rasped the professor. "I have no intention of retiring."

CONGRATULATIONS Only a few minutes earlier, Casey had stood in the middle of the dressing room accepting congratulations and trying to make himself heard above the din of a slew of reporters, photographers, television cameramen and well-wishers.

"That was the best ball club we've played in the last five years," he shouted, referring to the defeated Brooklyn Dodgers.

The Brooklyn dressing room was not as much like a funeral parlor as you might expect. Chuck Dressen can take defeat and he never loses his sense of humor.

BRASS When he returned with the rest of the brass from the Yank clubhouse where he congratulated the winners he told the assembled group:

"I told Stengel: 'You got what you wanted, your fifth straight championship, and you deserved it.' Then he started talking and I never got a chance to say another word."

While the rest of the Dodgers dressed wearily, Capt. Peeewe Reese, who has been on the losing side five times in these Yank-Dodger classics, philosophized:

"Oh, well, I guess I'll get another shot next year. Know something? I've been saying that for 13 years."

And the way the Yanks are doing, he'll be saying it 13 more.

WOLGAST'S CONDITION 'Critical'

CAMARILLO, Calif. (AP) — The little man who held the world's lightweight boxing title from 1910 to 1912, Ad Wolgast, is critically ill in a state mental hospital that has been his home for years.

Wolgast, who won the title by a technical knockout over Battling Nelson in 40 rounds, is suffering from an upper respiratory infection. Doctors have been trying to ward off pneumonia. Wolgast, now 65, has been quite feeble for the last year or so.

BRAIN INJURY Wolgast specialized in a rugged offense and could drop an opponent with either hand. It may be that the punishment he absorbed caused a brain injury. He spent most of his life in asylums, being first adjudged insane in Michigan in 1916.

Wolgast's title bout with Nelson, known as "The Durable Dane," was a finish match, with Nelson getting \$15,000 and Wolgast \$2,500. The bout was held at Port Richmond, near San Francisco, Feb. 22, 1910.

CONFIDENT Wolgast, confident that he could outlast Nelson, bet heavily on himself and won \$20,000.

Stengel's Boy

Martin's Ninth-Inning Single Gives Bombers Fifth Straight

NEW YORK (AP) — It was right and proper that the player whom Casey Stengel loves above all his other Yankees should have stroked the ninth-inning single which won the deciding game of the 1953 World Series and made the Old Professor the only manager in the history of the game to win five straight world championships.

If the grizzled strategist could have picked his man to lace the one-out drive into center field that gave the Bombers their thrilling 4-3 victory and crushed the resurgent Brooklyn Dodgers, you may be certain that his choice would have been Billy Martin, the hard-bitten little scrapper he managed at Oakland and whom he sooner or later brings into almost every conversation.

MIXED FEELINGS Even Chuck Dressen of the Dodgers might have had slightly mixed feelings when he saw Martin lay into Clem Labine's second pitch and watched Hank Bauer heading for home with his ground-eating stride. Dressen also holds a soft feeling for the kid who buried his hopes. By one of baseball's choice coincidences, he managed the boy he refers to as "that tough little

monkey" the year before Casey did at Oakland.

Only three nights ago, after Martin had made himself something of a goat by attempting to score a run that wouldn't have meant anything and getting thrown out at home to end the fourth game, Chuck sat long in his private dressing room at Ebbets Field and talked about the batter from the coast. His words were all in admiration, even when he told of having had to slap a stiff fine on Billy for swearing at him. The \$200 jolt was rescinded after Martin apologized, somewhat reluctantly.

UNFAVORITE It should not be assumed from any of this that everybody loves the series hero, whose nose is riddled in grandeur only by those of such noted figures as Eddie Arcaro and Jimmy Durante. The Brooklyn players, themselves, hold the young man in very low esteem. He is, in fact, their unfavorable Yankee because they consider him a popoff and all-around smart alec.

After what must have been seen yesterday by many millions, including \$2,370 who paid to be frozen blue in a sudden change of weather, it can only be accepted that the Yankees are supposed to win

World Series and that the present Brooklyn team, however good, is destined to wind up with the losers' share.

While the Brooks went down in six games this time instead of the seven they normally insist upon, they were by no means outclassed nor brought disgrace to the National League. Their lack of pitching depth finally told on them, as it figured to do, but they proved themselves the stout hitters that their averages promised and they never quit punching.

HOME RUN Few who saw it will forget the heart-stopping home run that Carl Furillo dropped into the right corner with one down in the top of the ninth to score Duke Snider ahead of him and tie the score at 3-3. There have been few more dramatic wallops, considering all of the circumstances, and it was no fault of the National League's batting champion that he didn't emerge the game's big figure instead of Martin.

Consider the buildup to Furillo's blow. The Yanks had been leading, apparently by a safe margin, from the game's opening minutes. They were in front by 3-0 after two innings, and the Dodgers finally had

scored a loner off young Whitley Ford in the sixth only because Jackie Robinson took charge with a double, stole third without drawing a throw and raced in on an infield out.

That was all the Dodgers had managed going into their last time at bat under the lights. Their chances looked even slimmer when Stengel, playing strictly a hunch, brought Allie Reynolds in to relieve Ford to start the eighth.

SINGLE Junior Gilliam, first Dodger to face the Chief, nearly knocked one into the right field seats and, after two were down, Robinson pumped a single to left. That brought up the dangerous Roy Campanella, whom Reynolds had hit on his throwing hand in the first game, and the air became electric. But Reynolds breezed a third strike past the Brook catcher, letter high, to end the inning.

So the Yanks felt cozy going into the ninth—more so after Gil Hodges fled out to short center. When Snider worked Reynolds for a walk, Yogi Berra went down. That brought up Furillo, who previously had hit Ford for a double and a single. The man from Pennsylvania's coal region first

brought the crowd up yelling with a punch down the right line which barely blew foul, and then, with the count 3 and 2, he socked the next one in there.

HUGGING When the din finally died down and the Dodgers quit hugging one another, Reynolds struck out Billy Cox and Labine in fast succession to close the inning. Baseball scientists might find fault with Dressen for having let Labine bat where a pinch hitter could have been useful, but the right-hander had checked the Yanks for two innings of relief at that point, and, besides, Chuck was running short of pitchers.

His guess, at any rate, proved a bad one. Clem walked Bauer, the first man to face him in the Yankee half. Berra lined one into Furillo's hands close to the right barrier. Mickey Mantle barely got his bat on a pitch and popped a dribbler to the left side of the diamond which Billy Box got his glove on but couldn't handle. Bauer racing to second.

And there was Martin, the brat. The first pitch he let go past for a called strike, which he didn't like. The next one he belted squarely into center field. Snider came tearing in to take it on the hop, but didn't even bother to try to throw to the plate. Bauer, one of the fastest base runners in the game, couldn't have been tagged with a rocket gun.

MAULING The Dodgers' all just trudged in slowly toward their dugout, tired and weary, while the Yankees caught Martin out near first base and gave him a fine mauling.

Reynolds, having permitted the tying run on Furillo's blast, gained credit for his seventh World Series victory when Billy took him off the hook. That gives the Chief a tie with a Yankee right-hander before him, Red Ruffing.

The sad figure of the contest was Carl Erskine, the trim Dodger right-hander who fanned a record 14 Yankees in the third game. He didn't have the same stuff after only two days' rest, and the Bombers got to him in a hurry. His failure to do it again doomed the Dodgers.

Reynolds May Join Mize in Retirement

Reynolds, the New York Yankees' great right-hander told newspapermen after yesterday's final World Series game he would quit if his back failed to improve over the winter.

"My back has been bothering me ever since I hurt it in that bus accident last July," he said.

JOHNNY MIZE

"I've had muscular spasms, on and off, ever since. For a time, I couldn't even run, let alone pitch."

IMPROVED "My back improved somewhat in the hot weather but I reinjured it again pitching the World Series opener. I was greatly upset then because the muscular spasms returned. However, it wasn't as bad as I thought and I was able to pitch again although I knew I'd never be able to start another series game."
