NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market declined Tuesday, with aircraft, railroads and high-priced oil stocks showing the widest losses.

Cruiser Sent To Colony

LONDON (AP)—Britain dispatched the 9,100-ton cruiser Sheffield from Scotland to the West Indies Tuesday sending the warship to the doorstep of her leftist-threatened South American colony of British Guiana.

The admiralty described the cruiser's departure as a "normal station move," but London newspapers already were blaming the government for the veil of official secrecy dropped over previously reported movements of troops and naval vessels toward the troubled colony.

The British cabinet met to consider the troubled situation in the colony, where colonial authorities reportedly are thinking of firing—possibly even arresting—some left-wing ministers in the local British Guiana government.

The Daily Telegraph, one of the staunchest supporters of Prime Minister Churchill's Conservative cabinet, asserted the "official attempt" had not canceled "the facts" that British warships carrying troops are steaming at top speed for Georgetown, capital of British Guiana, in an attempt to forestall a threatened Communist-directed insurrection in that colony.

British Guiana has been seething ever since the leftist Peoples' Progressive Party (PPP), led by U. S.-born Janet Rosenberg Jagun and her East Indian dentist husband, Cheddi Jagun, won a sweeping victory in last April's colonial election.

Jagun, now prime minister, and his party demand almost complete independence from British rule.

Crash Killing Two Probed

The condition of Sunday night's crash survivors was about the same this morning, according to authorities at the Klamath Valley Hospital.

Mrs. Jack Kelly, probably the most seriously injured of the hospitalized, had not regained consciousness at a late hour this morning.

Condition of Mrs. Eldon Larson was reported about the same. She regained consciousness in night and spent a fairly restful night.

Boyd Sprague Jr., driver of one of the wrecked cars, also hospitalized Sunday night, was said to be doing all right.

Oregon State Police were continuing the investigation into the cause of the accident which took the lives of Larson and Kelly. Police Sergeant Tichenor stated this morning he had requested the district attorney to ask for post mortem examinations.

No skid marks were apparent at the scene of the crash, according to state police, but from broken glass, scattered parts strewn on the highway and gouge marks in the pavement, it is alleged the Sprague car was on the wrong side of the highway.

Officers who investigated the accident Sunday night stated in their report that Sprague had told them: "I don't know what happened, I must have fallen asleep."

January Thursdays Safest On Road

CHICAGO (AP)—Hog producers failed to reduce overnight unloadings by more than 500 head and saw the market lose another 25 to 75 cents a hundred pounds Tuesday as a result. Some new two-month lows were set.

Cattle price trends were mixed. Heifers were steady to weak, but other classes were steady to 25 other cents higher. Lambs were \$1.00 lower but ewes were steady.

Most butcher weight hogs sold from \$20.00 to \$23.00, the latter the lowest top price since Aug. 6 which in turn was the lowest since April 17. Sows took \$20.50 to \$22.75. Clearance was good on the 9,500 hogs on public sale.

Most good to prime steers sold from \$20.00 to \$29.50 and choice to prime heifers from \$22.00 to \$27.00. Cows topped at \$13.00, bulls at \$13.50 and weaners at \$22.00.

Good to prime native lambs moved at \$17.00 to \$20.00 but ewes did no better than \$5.00 which was for good grade and poorer.

Estimated arrivals included 61,000 salable cattle, 400 calves, and 3,000 sheep.

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Basement Fire Damage Slight

A fire in the basement of 439 Pine at 11:24 Tuesday morning was extinguished by city firemen within minutes after they were called.

The fire started when a camp stove and half a cup of gasoline exploded, igniting a box of papers nearby. Frank Hogue, renter at the Pine Street address, was working on the camp stove in preparation for a fishing trip when the accident happened.

Smoke from the fire coming through registers attracted the attention of Mrs. Hogue and Mrs. Jennie Hurn, owner of the house, who were upstairs.

Hogue said nothing of any value was burned, although the basement was used primarily for storage.

The building is insured with the Paul O. Landry company. Monetary loss was estimated as slight.

"A fire never excites me this close to town," Mrs. Hogue said, "because I know the fire department is going to save it."

Girl Escapee Caught At Fort

Barbara Jean Thomas, 16, escapee from the Ventura State School for Girls, Ventura, Calif., was apprehended at Fort Klamath Monday by Oregon State Police.

According to the girl, she had been in San Francisco from the time of her escape June 20 until August 4 when she was married to Anthony Bruno, a member of the Air Force.

When her husband returned to his post, the girl stated, she came north along the coast highway looking for work and finally landed in Chiloquin.

By hitchhiking and walking she made her way to Fort Klamath where she asked Mrs. Amy Bressler, operator of the rooms at the Fort Klamath Hotel, for work. The girl gave her age as 19, according to Mrs. Bressler.

After being informed there were no jobs open at the hotel the girl rented a room for the night. Shortly thereafter authorities arrived and after considerable questioning she admitted she had escaped from the girls school.

State Police returned with her to Klamath Falls and she was turned over to juvenile officers who are holding her for California authorities.

Non-Aggression Of Reich Talked

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles said Tuesday the United States is discussing with Britain, France and West Germany the possibility of giving Russia assurances against revival of German aggression.

Dulles also told a news conference that the United States, in its search for solutions to East-West conflicts in the atomic age, would be glad to give Russia assurances that it would not use either Korea or Austria for aggressive purposes.

In response to other questions Dulles told reporters that recent evidence of the Kremlin attitude toward getting along with the rest of the world have not been encouraging.

Dawn Starr Indictment Questioned

A legal battle loomed Tuesday over the validity of the indictment against Dawn Starr, 20-year-old Oklahoma night club dancer accused of giving a Klamath Falls barber a bogus check for shaving her legs.

When Miss Starr appeared before Circuit Judge David M. Vandenberg to enter a plea to a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses, Defense Counsel Ben Goddard filed a demurrer to the indictment.

Goddard contends that the indictment returned by the Klamath County Grand Jury fails to state a crime. He also contends the indictment does not conform to the criminal code and contains infirmities which, if true, constitute a justification or excuse for the crime charged.

Judge Vandenberg set 2 p.m. Wednesday for hearing arguments on the demurrer.

The dancer, who claims to be a great-granddaughter of Belle Starr, started gunwoman of the Old West. She was arrested by city police Aug. 12 after she was alleged to have had her legs shaved at Pat's Barber Shop and cashed a spurious \$10 check in payment for the tonsorial service.

A plea of guilty was entered Wednesday in Circuit Court by Richard Lewis Bridwell, charged with a holdup at the Unique Market.

Under questioning by the court, Bridwell gave a lengthy recital of his career which clearly indicated crime has been his business since he was first arrested for car theft as a juvenile.

The accused gunman told Judge Vandenberg he got a bad discharge from the air corps and has been involved in several robberies. The court deferred sentence. Bridwell also was represented by Attorney Goddard.

Judge Vandenberg set Oct. 9 for sentencing Laverda Marie Colman, 25-year-old mother of five children charged with forgery. Her attorney, R. F. McLaren, made a plea for probation.

Armando S. Gutierrez, accused of entering an automobile with intent to steal, pleaded not guilty. Trial was set for Oct. 28. Attorney George Proctor has been appointed by the court to defend him.

U.S. Soldier Said To Have Joined Reds

BERLIN (AP)—The official East German News Agency said Tuesday an American soldier had renounced his citizenship and requested political asylum in the Communist-ruled East Zone because "he does not agree with the policy of the United States government."

ADN gave his name as Norman Lowell Jr., a U.S. Army announcer ment said a soldier by that name leaped from a military train last Sept. 12 while being taken from Berlin to West Germany to serve a guardhouse sentence. The Army gave his age as 23 and said his home was in Somerville, Mass.

Heart Attacks Kill 6 Hunters

Heart attacks, brought on by exertion of hunting, claimed the lives of six men in the first three days of Oregon's deer season.

Three others are dead — one the victim of a rifle shot, and two killed in an automobile accident while en route to a hunting site.

Heart victims reported Monday included William J. Llewellyn, 70, of Milwaukie, who died Monday at Vernonia. He had been hunting the day before.

Lonnie Lee McRobert, 39, of Mill City, suffered a fatal heart seizure Saturday in the Thomas Creek area 12 miles east of Seio.

Other heart victims were: Lewis A. Smith, 44, Penderosa; Earl Wilson, 68, Bend; Harry I. Hudy, 55, Salem; Jeff Linn Yocom, 38, Clatskanie.

Mrs. Clarence Barnes, about 42, of Milton-Freewater, was fatally shot when a rifle accidentally discharged in the car in the Tollgate area of Northeastern Oregon. Her 2 1/2-year-old grandson was wounded by the same bullet.

The traffic victims were Mr. and Mrs. Albert O. Weekly of Myrtle Creek. They were killed last Thursday in a highway accident while driving to a hunting area.

Still reported missing is Clarence D. Johnson, 70, of Gates who disappeared near his home Friday while seeking a hunting site.

Two hunters reported missing earlier were found. They are Earl Baumgardner, 16, Myrtle Creek, and Joaquin Carlos, 53, Richmond, Calif.

Donald A. Torgerson, 27, of Salem, was wounded while hunting Sunday in an area 30 miles east of his home.

Meanwhile, the U. S. Forest Service reported that hunters started five forest fires in the Fremont Forest, five in the Malheur Forest and one in the Deschutes Forest.

Defendants in the suit were listed as Eugene W. Marisfield, Vernon D. Tracy and Sam Blische. Neither party will recover costs of damages, the court held.

Noel Flynn, manager of the Pay Less Drug Store in Klamath Falls, stated that the local store is part of the Pay Less group which owns this injunction.

"This name has been so well established now," Flynn stated, "that it is confusing to the public to have any business of a type other than those drug stores use it."
