

Victim Slain By Kidnaper

The body of the 6-year-old son of a multi-millionaire Kansas City family has been found in a shallow grave at St. Joseph, Mo., about 55 miles from Kansas City. In Washington, FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover says that 37-year-old Carl Austin Hall, one of the alleged abductors, has admitted that he shot the boy.

The FBI disclosed that a \$600,000 ransom had been paid to the kidnappers by the child's father.

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Parasips, Beets Await State Head-Count

DOYLESTOWN, Pa. (AP)—Construction on the Pennsylvania Turnpike's 33-mile extension to the Delaware River rolled along smoothly until it reached Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Ponczek's eight-acre farm in Bucks County.

Nobody, Ponczek said, was going to tear up his truck farm. The turnpike commission sought, and was granted, an injunction permitting work to continue across Ponczek's farm.

But first, Judge Edwin H. Satterthwaite ruled yesterday, the state must count all the parasips and beets growing on the land so the Ponczeks can be properly reimbursed for sacrificing the vegetables to progress.

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SPANISH SKULLS? White rocks? A. S. Clawson was not quite sure when he first noticed these objects under a cedar tree in a clearing north of Lincoln. Investigation disclosed these are two huge puff balls, identical to the small variety often found in lawns. The larger one is 36 inches in circumference; 14 1/2 inches across. They were found at a 5,000 foot elevation while Clawson was on a hunting trip. He is an engineer on the Southern Pacific and lives at 2021 Homedale.

WASHINGTON (AP)—There are now 577 trumpeter swans in the United States, six more than last year. The trumpeter swans were once threatened with extinction in this country and at one time in the early 1900s this species was believed actually to be extinct.

Secretary of Interior McKay said Tuesday a recent count showed 410 of the trumpeters in Montana, 159 in Wyoming and Idaho and eight in experimental areas in Nevada and Oregon, where the swans had been transferred in an attempt to establish new breeding colonies.

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Bobby's 7th Dead-Victim Kidnaping

KANSAS CITY (AP)—The slaying of 6-year-old Bobby Greenlease is the seventh major kidnaping since 1900 in which the victim was killed.

The most famous case in recent years was the kidnaping of Charles A. Lindbergh Jr., 19-month-old son of the noted flier. The baby was seized March 1, 1932, and the body recovered May 12 after a ransom of \$50,000 had been paid.

Other major kidnapings since 1900 included: Edward A. Cuddey Jr., 10, Omaha, seized Dec. 18, 1900; returned Dec. 20, ransom of \$25,000 in gold paid.

Marian Parker, 12, Los Angeles, seized Dec. 15, 1927, returned Dec. 17, ransom of \$1,500 paid.

Michael Katz, Kansas City, seized March 18, 1930; returned March 19, ransom of \$200,000 paid.

Mrs. Nell Donnelly, Kansas City, seized Dec. 17, 1931, returned Dec. 18; ransom demand of \$75,000 not paid.

Charles Boettcher II, Denver, seized Feb. 12, 1933; returned March 1, ransom of \$60,000 paid.

Miss Mary McElroy, Kansas City, seized July 22, 1933; returned May 28, ransom of \$30,000 paid.

William Hamm Jr., St. Paul, seized June 15, 1933; returned June 19; ransom of \$100,000 paid.

August Luer, Alton, Ill., seized July 10, 1933; returned July 15; no ransom paid.

Charles F. Urschel, Oklahoma City, seized July 22, 1933; returned Aug. 1; ransom of \$200,000 paid.

Brooke Hart, San Jose, Calif., seized Nov. 10, 1933; body recovered Nov. 26; ransom demand of \$40,000 not paid.

Edward G. Bremer of St. Paul, seized Jan. 17, 1934; returned Feb. 8; ransom of \$200,000 paid.

William F. Gettle, Los Angeles, seized May 10, 1934, returned May 14, ransom not paid.

George Weyerhaeuser, 9, Tacoma, Wash., seized May 24, 1935; returned June 1, ransom of \$200,000 paid.

Charles Matson, 10, Tacoma, Wash., seized Dec. 27, 1936; body found Jan. 11, 1937, ransom of \$200,000 paid.

Peter Levine, 12, New York, seized Feb. 24, 1938; body discovered May 29, no ransom paid.

Charles Bailey Cash, 5, Princeton, N.J., seized May 28, 1938, body recovered June 9; ransom of \$10,000 paid.

NEW YORK (AP)—A pileup of tons of cargo melted today as longshoremen set North Atlantic ports humming once again after a five-day strike.

Work resumption started yesterday after the government obtained a 10-day Taft-Hartley labor law injunction in the wage dispute.

Many of the estimated 60,000 to 65,000 striking members of the International Longshoremen's Ass'n. (ILA) answered work calls on piers from Portland, Maine, to Hampton Roads, Va.

In New York, the work return was quiet and generally without serious incident although a new AFL strike—the AFL International Longshoremen's Ass'n. (ILA-AFL)—pushed its battle to win control of waterfront labor from the now independent ILA.

A number of companies last night ordered overtime work in an effort to clean up the backlog of cargo.

DETROIT (AP)—Patrick V. McNamara as a Board of Education member is advocating that interschool athletic competition be abolished in Detroit unless rowdyism is stopped.

McNamara told the board yesterday: "If the stabbings, shootings, and beatings of last fall and demonstrations like 'those witnessed last weekend continue to be a part of the after-school game celebrations, I am in favor of banning the entire high school competitive athletic program.'"

Fifty-two boys and girls were arrested last weekend after Pershing High School's victory over Eastern for various forms of rowdyism.

At least one shooting and several stabbings and gang fights followed 1952 high school football games here.

DETROIT (AP)—Chief Justice Earl Warren says he considers himself "a conservative liberal one who will confine his liberalism to practical conservative thinking."

The former California governor, who was sworn in Monday, also says he "will put personal and party politics behind me for the remainder of my life."

Warren's statements were contained in a filmed television interview carried Tuesday night on the CBS network "See It Now."

The new chief justice, whom President Eisenhower has termed a "middle-of-the-roader," said in the interview:

"I think of what Lincoln once said. Someone asked him how he classified himself. He said: 'I am a very slow walker, but I never walk backwards.'"

Warren added: "And so I like to feel that while I, too, am a slow walker, I always like to walk forward and it is always a sad day for me if I go to bed at night thinking we have not made some progress."

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Pair Held; Most Of Ransom Found

KANSAS CITY (AP)—The body of kidnapped six-year-old Bobby Greenlease was found in a lime-filled grave behind an ivory-covered St. Joseph, Mo., cottage Wednesday and the woman occupant of the house was arrested with a male companion for his abduction and death.

Police said they had recovered a major portion of \$300,000 ransom which Bobby's 71-year-old multi-millionaire father had paid over for the safe return of the child who was kidnapped here Sept. 28.

St. Louis police identified the couple under arrest as Mrs. Bonnie Brown Heady, 41-year-old divorcee, and Carl Austin Hall, 37-year-old paroled convict.
