### Lawmakers Sign Up For Meet

WASHINGTON (AP) — An estimated 250 lawmakers from 34 nations began registering for the annual Inter-Parliamentary Union meeting.

The meeting will get under way tomorrow. President Eisenhower will address the delegates Friday.

General debate and discussion of international problems, including the necessity and effects of technical and financial assistance to needy nations, will take up most of the public sessions on Saturday, Monday and Tuesday.

Next Wednesday's closing session will concentrate on the right of peoples to self-determination, and on election of officers.

Organized in 1889, the union has for its stated purpose promoting the peaceful settlement of disputes among nations, conciliation and arbitration.

### French Boycott U. N. Committee

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — French delegates boycotted the U. N. Political Committee today to dramatize their contention that the world organization has no business debating the troubled situation in Morocco.

A spokesman said France would not even issue a statement blasting the opening of debate on the question in the 60-nation committee.

A year ago the U. N. assembly called on France to negotiate with Moroccan authorities "on an equal basis" toward developing free political institutions. France refused to heed the resolution, contending that the affairs of her North African protectorates are domestic French problems.

Asian and Arab delegates—highly conscious of colonialism—contend that developments in disturbed Morocco make another U.N. try necessary.

### Economic Distress Seen in Washington

SPOKANE (AP) — Rep. Don Magnuson (D-Wash.) here on an Inland Empire tour, said Tuesday "there are numerous signs of economic distress in the state of Washington."

"Lumber is in bad shape, unemployment is up 35 per cent from a year ago, building is at a low tempo and dealers report that farm machinery is not moving," he told a reporter.

Magnuson said the number of people turning out for his meetings indicates "a Democratic party revival in the state."
