

Senator Hits Point 4 Aid

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Ellender (D-La.), back from a 45,000-mile trip, said today he had found the Point Four program of technical assistance to underdeveloped nations being converted into an economic aid program.

The Point Four program is not being limited to imparting American know-how, he said. Instead, he asserted, many costly capital investments are being made by impatient and overly ambitious administrators. The senator declared this appeared to him to be a misuse of funds and that he was determined to find out where the money came from.

Ellender told newsmen that unless a halt is called, he thinks Congress will sour on the program and deny funds for carrying it on.

On a trip that took him around Africa, to southern India, Ceylon, Singapore, the East Indies, Australia and New Zealand, the senator said, he also had found waste in the overseas information program and in U. S. embassies and consulates.

Ellender said he had no appointment to talk with the President about it tomorrow.

He said he felt American Point Four advisers were trying to do too much too quickly. "They think and teach them our ways overnight," he said.

In some countries, he said, "our advisers are proposing so many projects that it would overtax the economy of the host country to carry them out." He added that, as a result, there is a tendency for this country to step in and supply needed capital.

In one case, he said, this country is paying half the cost of building and equipping an agricultural college. In another, he said, the United States is paying 40 per cent of the cost, or 10 million dollars, to reclaim desert land, ultimately to be sold to farmers, with proceeds going to the host government.

He said that in another case the United States agreed to pay half the cost of building 25 houses for American technicians, but so far the United States has spent \$150,000, the host country \$40,000 and only nine houses have been finished.

Six Children Die In Fire

MARLBORO, Vt. (AP)—Six children perished last night in a fire that wiped out the family's two-room home, into which they had moved only yesterday.

Two other children were rescued by a baby sitter.

The dead are Caroline Hescock, 6; Diane Hescock, 5; Marilyn Hescock, 4; Earl Hescock, 1; Lucille Bohl, 9, and Roger Seaton 9 months.

Mrs. Dorothy Seaton, 15, who lived in the same house and who was watching the children in the absence of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Hescock, rescued Dennis Bohl, 8, and Cathy Hescock, 2 months. She suffered serious burns.

Mr. and Mrs. Hescock were in nearby Wilmington to pick up the rest of the furniture from their previous residence.

The Bohl children are Mrs. Hescock's by a previous marriage and neighbors said Mrs. Seaton is Hescock's daughter by his own previous marriage.

Fire officials believed the fire started in a pantry but could not learn its exact cause.

Witness Trio Pleas Innocent

PORTLAND (AP)—Three Jehovah's Witnesses pleaded innocent to charges of failing to report for the military draft when arraigned in Federal Court here Tuesday.

They are among 16 who will be tried on similar charges in December. All contend they are entitled to designation as ministers.

The three arraigned were Charles William Clemmer, 22, of Central Point; Henry Eugene Seelen, 25, Salem, and Edward E. Smithers, 23, Coos Bay.

The cases are expected to be carried to the U. S. Supreme Court.

More British Warships Rush To South American Colony

LONDON (AP)—Britain readied her second largest aircraft carrier, the 33,000-ton Implacable, today to rush reinforcements to the West Indies. Government spokesmen said the troops would protect British Guiana against "Communist intrigues."

Three other warships—the 5,000-ton cruiser Superb and the 1,600-ton frigates Bigbury Bay and Burghhead Bay—already were steaming at full speed carrying troops to the troubled colony on the northeast shoulder of South America. The 9,100-ton cruiser Sheffield sailed from Scotland yesterday for the West Indies.

In its announcement last night, the Colonial Office said a Red plot possibly aimed at setting up a Communist-dominated state was afoot in the colony.

"This would lead to bloodshed," the statement warned. It added:

"In view of the latest developments, Her Majesty's government felt it necessary to send naval and military forces to Georgetown (the colony's capital) with the utmost dispatch in order to preserve peace and the safety of all classes."

The statement broke a five-day official silence on events in British Guiana, where the majority People's Progressive party (PPP) is pressing for greater independence. The British governor, Sir Alfred

Savage, reportedly is considering the dismissal of some of his left-wing ministers.

A Colonial Office spokesman told newsmen that the Communist movement in British Guiana is run by the U. S.-born wife of Prime Minister Cheddi Jagan, the former Janet Rosenberg. She is the executive secretary of the PPP.

Both Jagan and his wife, however, have denied they are Communists. They met while Jagan was studying dentistry in Chicago and she was a student at the Cook County Hospital School of Nursing. School records listed her home as Detroit, Mich.

Reports from Georgetown indicated the colony was tense but quiet. The Executive Council held its usual weekly meeting in Georgetown yesterday with Gov. Savage presiding. Jagan was among the ministers attending.

British Guiana's troubles have been brewing since last April when the PPP won a sweeping victory in the first election under the new constitution.

The party has demanded constitutional amendments to make almost all places in the colony's legislative and executive bodies elective by removing most of Britain's appointive representatives from the Legislature and Executive Council (cabinet).

Youth Seized After Gunfight

CHICAGO (AP)—A youth who police said killed a boy and wounded a patrolman was captured without a struggle last night, nearly 24 hours after he escaped from a police station.

Carey Robinson, 19, sought since Monday night, was seized by detectives in a flat near his own West Side home.

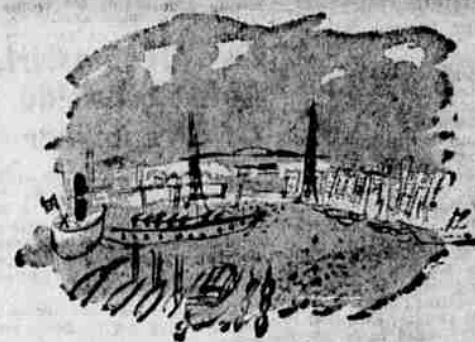
