

### Army Suspends Several Signal Laboratory Employees

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Army announced last night the suspension for security reasons of an undisclosed number of persons at its Signal Corps laboratory at Ft. Monmouth, N. J.

It declined to give details. The Chicago Tribune press service said that among five persons suspended were two "top scientists engaged in the development of America's radar defenses against enemy attack."

The Tribune did not disclose the source of information for its copy-righted story, but said the Army's investigation stemmed from an inquiry by the Senate Investigations subcommittee headed by Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.).

The Chicago Tribune account said those suspended included "two other scientific workers and a clerical employe, similarly employed in top secret military work."

"All five men . . . have had access for years to this country's defense secrets in the electronics field," the Tribune said in a dispatch from Washington written by Willard Edwards.

The Army, in a brief statement, disclosed no names and did not specify the security charges.

"These employes," it said, "have been given letters of charges stating the reasons for their suspension. They have the right within 30 days after the receipt of the charges to request a hearing be-

fore a security hearing board."

The Chicago Tribune said the suspensions "were personally ordered" by Secretary of the Army Robert T. Stevens.

The Tribune account continued: "Thirty employes at Ft. Monmouth, in addition to those suspended, are under investigation on security grounds. A number of these will be questioned by the McCarthy committee."

"Several figures in the Rosenberg case will be involved in the inquiry. There are definite links between the former atomic spy ring and those under investigation in the present investigation."

Julius and Ethel Rosenberg were electrocuted earlier this year after being convicted of having delivered atomic secrets to Soviet espionage agents.

### Actress, T-V Executive Wed

NEW YORK (AP)—Actress Ann Rutherford, 33, and television executive William Dozier, 45, were married here yesterday at his apartment by a Municipal Court Justice.

Miss Rutherford, who was married bareheaded after leaving her velled cocktail in a taxi on the way to the ceremony, has been married once before. Dozier has been married twice before, once to actress Joan Fontaine.

BOSTON (AP)—The cafe refrigerator looked full of delicious steaks and chops when Chairman Mary E. Driscoll of the licensing board inspected it.

She was checking to see if the cafe had a legitimate food business required for a cafe liquor license.

Mrs. Driscoll smiled at the proprietor and left the cafe. "But when I got to the sidewalk, I felt there was something peculiar about all those steaks and chops," she said yesterday.

She returned and took a closer look at the display.

### Autopsy Ordered In Smog Death

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The coroner has ordered an autopsy to determine if smog caused the death of a 69-year-old woman last Saturday.

The woman, Mrs. Gertrude L. Call, died in an area which was heavily permeated by smog that day. Her physician, Dr. J. V. Barrow, wrote on the death certificate that Mrs. Call died of "mild cardiac infarction due to heat and smog."

Infarction means lack of proper blood supply. "I certainly think that smog was the cause of Mrs. Call's death," said Dr. Barrow, former president of the Los Angeles County Medical Assn.

### 'Frisco Ball Park Bid Made

REDWOOD CITY, Calif. (AP)—San Mateo County Wednesday got into the major league wooling act with a bid to San Francisco to locate its ball park down here if it gets a franchise.

Both San Francisco and Los Angeles have been virtually promised major league franchises in the next few years if they make proper preparations, chiefly adequate stadia.

County supervisors Tuesday prepared to name a seven man committee—including former big league stars Ty Cobb and Gus Suhr, county residents—to push their bid.

Supervisor William M. Worder proposed a big league park be built near Bay Meadows race track 20 miles south of San Francisco.

### Tribes May Keep Liquor Bans

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M. (AP)—It looks as if Indian leaders of New Mexico aren't as eager as their white brothers to okay sale of liquor to tribesmen.

The historical white ban against selling firewater to Indians was knocked out by New Mexico voters last month.

But the Indian Bureau office says there is no indication native officials of 24 tribal communities under its jurisdiction plan, likewise, to approve liquor sales on reservations.

### Hearing Speed-Up Sought As Hells Canyon Reopens

WASHINGTON (AP)—A speed-up was suggested Tuesday as questioning of a witness by a Power Commission lawyer ran into its second day at Hells Canyon hearing.

Examiner William J. Costello suggested off-the-record conferences might expedite cross-examination of witnesses at a hearing on Idaho Power Co.'s applications to build three dams in the Snake River.

He interrupted FPC attorney John C. Mason during questioning of E. A. Woodhead, Idaho Power Co. engineer, on cost estimates for the proposed power projects to make the suggestion.

After Mason, public power attorney

will question Woodhead, one of Idaho Power's main witnesses and an engineer with its firm and its predecessor for 47 years.

Other company witnesses available for cross-examination Tuesday, as listed by Idaho Power attorney R. P. Parry, include: Bernard Williams of Morrison-Knudsen Co., Boise, Idaho, who testified his firm would construct the three dams; Arthur Lamed, New York consulting engineer; R. F. Gale, Idaho Power vice president, and H. Loren Thompson, Portland, Ore., consulting engineer.

Woodhead also was questioned Monday by Mason. He stood by his estimate that Idaho Power's dams could be built for 133 million dollars and hinted the cost might be less.

This compares with an estimated 400 million dollars for the federal Hells Canyon project which has been proposed near one of the sites sought by Idaho Power on the Oregon-Idaho border.

Woodhead said the company's advance cost estimates traditionally have been liberal. Its final revised estimates for completed projects, he said, usually are lower than the preliminary figures.
