

Court Holds Blasters Liable

SALEM (AP)—Blasting operators who cause damage upon another person's land are liable for damages, the Oregon Supreme Court ruled Wednesday.

The court ordered a new trial in the Lane County damage suit of Mr. and Mrs. Charles J. Bedell, who sued K. L. Goulter & Co. Circuit Judge G. F. Skipworth had thrown the case out of court, proved that the Goulter company

was negligent in its blasting operations. The Supreme Court, in an opinion by Justice Hall S. Lusk, said it isn't necessary to prove negligence in such a case.

"One who engages in blasting operations which set in motion vibrations and concussion of the earth and air which reach to another's land and shatter his dwelling commits a trespass, no less than one who accomplishes the same result by the propulsion of rocks or other material," Justice Lusk wrote.

Other action by the court included:

L. E. Shelton, appellant, vs. E. L. Paris. Appeal from Douglas

County. Suit for damages for injuries received in a logging operation. Opinion by Justice William C. Perry. Judge Carl E. Wimberly, affirmed, with no damages awarded because the suit was filed too late.

Out-of-Season Elk Costs \$600

MITCHELL, Ore. (AP)—Two Portland hunters paid \$300 fines each for killing an elk out of season. Mrs. Hattie Harnden, justice of the peace in this Wheeler County community, said Wednesday.

She said Jesse Dare and Tom Low pleaded guilty to illegal possession of elk and paid the fines. The men were arrested by three state patrolmen, Roger Herenden of Fossil and Verne Boyer and Egil Tolian of Prineville.
